

# Ethanol train gets stamp of approval from MassDOT



Millions of gallons of ethanol may be passing through Somerville in the years to come.

The Massachusetts Department of Transportation has all but given the green light for an ethanol train to pass through Somerville, by releasing an impact study that outlines the proposed route. However, the confirmation depends on whether the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection will sanction the operation.

The notion of freight trains carrying hazardous material through Somerville has activists and residents outraged about a hypothetical accident that could occur from a derailment.

Millions of gallons of ethanol would be expected to pass through Somerville every year. Opponents of the ethanol freight trains have dubbed them "bomb trains."

Rep. Denise Provost (D-Somerville) shared her disapproval of the transportation risks associated with the volatile commodity. "What's happening, in my view, is that a terrible and dangerous proposal is moving ahead with inadequate oversight," she said. "I would speculate that people are feeling justifiably alarmed."

The ethanol train would

# Author urges use of 'Playborhoods'

On Tuesday, March 19, over 60 people, mostly Somerville residents, gathered in the Aldermanic Chambers at City Hall to discuss how to find safe spaces for Somerville's children to play, and to unite.

The catalyst for the discussion was Mike Lanza, Stanford graduate, California native, father of three, and author of "Playborhood: Turn your Neighborhood into a Place for Play."

In his book, Lanza writes that today's children, due to high daily rates of digital consumption, overly structured days by children's authority figures (schools, after-school, sports, family), and the tendency of families towards privacy, have far fewer safe play spaces where they, not any authority figures, can determine how, where, and when to construct and perform their preferred forms of play. Not only does Lanza tie this trend to increasingly rising rates of childhood obesity, anxiety, and depression, he also refers to a larger problem of a childhood-developed reliance on exterior motivation versus finding one's Continued on page 21

Only 15%? I would have thought that to be much higher from the people I Know. Maybe I just hang around the poor folk of Somerville.


## m hellen says:

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# **Coffee with Steve Roix**

In a quirky coffee shop named Ola, located in the heart of Ward 1, newly appointed school committee representative, Steve Roix, sipped on Columbian coffee and reminisced about his arrival to Somerville.

Roix, now 39 years old, used to live Worcester with his wife before he moved to Somerville in 2004. But prior to his relocation, Roix had already started looking for dog parks. He had two mutts at the time, now they are both 12 years old. The first person he contacted was Michele Bisco of Som Dog, a non-profit organization advocating for canine rights.

"Michelle sort of recruited us into lobbying for the dog parks," Roix recalls. "That was before the Nunziato Field Dog Park was open, and long before the Zero New Washington Street Dog Park."

Roix used to call former Alderman Bill Roche all the time, and "bug him" about getting a dog park in Ward 1. "And that's how he knew who I was originally," Roix says. "That was my introduction to Somerville politics."

"When Zero New Washington Street finally appeared, a lot of people don't know this, but, Bill Roche was the one that identified that property to us when we were looking for a place to get a dog park in Ward 1," he recalls.

The city of Somerville was originally planning on selling the land at Zero New Washington

Street, according to Roix.

"I think the moment when I kinda fell in love with Somerville was when I started a petition to convince the city that they shouldn't sell that land, they should make a park out of it!"

Roix took the petition around to neighbors. "I just took a lined sheet of paper, wrote something at the top, and started walking around my neighborhood... and some other people ended up helping me, but we ended up getting about 360 signatures on the petition."

Knocking on doors that year, Roix got to know Ward 1 and fellow neighbors. "With a lot of people, there was language barriers, and there was other people that were sorta old-timey

Somerville people that had grown up there," Roix remembers."I told them what the petition was for, and they looked at me like I was a little crazy, and they laughed, but they mostly signed it, anyway." Zero New Washington Park opened in November of 2010.

During a recent Board of Alderman meeting, a resolution was submitted for a new program that would allow off-leash dogs into more parks during designated hours.

"I think there's some merit to expanding access to dog owners into more regular parks, but you have to have the resources to hold the dog owners accountable," Roix says. "I wouldn't mind seeing that done as a pilot program."

Somerville Community Access Television launched a website that streams Channel 3 over the Internet to the world. WWW.scatvsomerville.org allows users to watch the live stream and select individual programs for on-demand viewing.

Users will also find up to date news about events, the SCATV Facebook feed, classes, featured programs, art gallery exhibits, and more. Members can now post crew calls on the site and pay on line for classes and to renew their memberships.

The website was developed by Somerville web designer Meagan O'Brien, a multi-talented artist who also works part time for the Somerville Arts Council. O'Brien created the site in Wordpress in collaboration with the SCATV Board of Directors and staff.

The website presents a lively and changing view of all the activities that go on at SCATV, Somerville's community media center, which is celebrating 30 years of service this month.

I can strongly relate to the poll and Editorial piece on road closures in Somerville in the current issue of the Somerville must be aware of the closures in who relies on the MBTA buses to get me to Somerville or Cambridge or Boston.

Far too many times we are diverted because of the closure of Davis Square because of a road race (5 or 6 a year?), an arts festival, the Honk festival, and the like, from being able to get to Harvard Square on the Route #96 bus, or even to Davis Square on the Route #94, to get to the Red Line and continue our trip.

And most often this is because the City of Somerville has failed to notify the MBTA of the road closures in advance of the events, certainly something the City should be able to do since it er services to the events taking place there.

Too many times the MBTA has told us that they were not aware of the closures far enough in advance to be able to post notices at the Davis Square station, or even on their web site, to notify bus passengers that they might be late in arriving for their appointments, jobs, meetings because of an extensive roundabout trip to Route 16 and then back to Massachusetts Avenue to get to Harvard (which, by the way, by-passes all those un-

knowing passengers waiting at the bus stops that the buses will never get to because of the closures and detours.

buses cannot be allowed to travel towards Davis Square and take a left turn onto Morrison Avenue to bypass Davis Square, only about a block or so from the Red Line, and let passengers off there who need to get to the Red Line? This used to be the procedure, until the Square was closed further up and we were told to get off about ten blocks from the Square and walk to the Red Line from the Powderhouse Rotary.

And now, as mentioned, this past closure had the #96 bus

turn right from Winthrop Street in Medford onto Boston Avenue [about TWENTY blocks from Davis Square!] - from where MBTA well in advance, and also News as a resident of Medford order to provide police and oth- Is there any reason that the the bus driver told us that we allow buses to turn left at Morcould walk those TWENTY blocks to Davis Square for the red line if we chose to do so -- or go roundabout to Route 16 and then back to Mass. Ave. on the bus, where people were told to get off at Porter Square (!) and take a train back to Davis Square if that is where they needed to go, or a train from Porter if they needed the Red Line going towards Braintree or Ashmont.

> Surely the City of Somerville has more kindness to bestow on its neighbors from Medford than such ridiculous schemes

when we once were able to get as close to Davis Square as Morrison Avenue. Please notify the rison to avoid events blocking Davis Square for the sake of the elderly and infirm who are simply unable to deal with such foolish thoughts as walking ten, let alone twenty, blocks to get to where they must go for weekend work and meetings.

# Heated words result in street melee

Police were called to 74 Walnut St. late Sunday night on a reported street fight in progress.

Upon arrival, officers noted that a group of men were fighting in the middle of the street and that traffic was gradually backing up.

Officers grabbed two of the brawlers, Kirby Calixte, 20, and Sean Manuel, 18, and hand-cuffed them for safety. Two oth-

er men, Jonathan Tracy, 48, and David Hatch-Bernier, 44, were taken aside to cool off as well.

Tracy, who had sustained a cut to his hand in the fight, reportedly told officers that while he and Hatch-Bernier were driving along Walnut St. both Calixte and Manuel, who were crossing the street at the time, had said something to them as they drove by.

Tracy further alleged that

when they were stopped at a nearby traffic signal, Calixte came up and reached in through the window and removed the vehicle's keys, thus instigating the fight that ensued.

Officers questioned Calixte, who offered a differing version of the events that took place.

Calixte reportedly told police that as he and Manuel were crossing Walnut St., the other men's car nearly sideswiped them as they drove past at a high rate of speed, nearly striking another one of his friends.

Calixte claimed that this is when the fight broke out, according to reports.

Witnesses questioned by police reportedly said that more men were involved in the fracas but they had fled as the police arrived.

The witnesses reportedly indicated that Tracy and Hatch-Bernier were the primary aggressors, and that Calixte and Manuel attempted to avoid a fight at first.

Hatch-Bernier, Calixte, and Manuel were all placed under arrest and charged with affray common law.

Tracy was hospitalized for the injury to his hand and will be summonsed at a later time.

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

# Seizing the opportunities

I want to talk this week about seizing opportunities.

During the past decade, Somerville has become a model city. We have no shortage of other communities asking about how we did it. They want to become healthier places to live. They want thriving local business districts. They want to deliver a higher quality of life to their residents. In short, they

like what they see when they look at Somerville, and they want to imitate many of the things we do. I tell them you really need to rally your entire community behind a shared vision. I also tell them it is critical to seize your opportunities.

When we go in to rebuild a park or playground, we don't just plant a few trees and put up a swing set. We make sure we build something that can enhance the neighborhood around it for decades to come.

The same logic applies to Assembly Square. It has become a beehive of construction activity, and will become a bustling neighborhood and business district, because when the opportunity to transform that area of the city presented itself, we seized it.

The reality with many of the projects we undertake is that they represent once-in-a-generation opportunities. It takes years of legwork, often involving multiple state and federal agencies, to get the funding for some projects. We either seize those opportunities to enhance our city, or we let them fall to another generation two or three decades from now.

Beacon Street is one of those once-in-a-generation opportunities. For over a decade, Somerville has worked to secure funding for the project, which started as a standard repaying job. But as the decade went on, the corridor changed, the city adopted its first Comprehensive Plan, SomerVision and we adjusted Beacon Street to look toward the future illustrated by Somer Vision.

As everyone has heard me say on many occasions, our guiding principle is to make Somerville a world-class place to live, work, play and raise a family. We want nothing less than that for Beacon Street.

Some people have reservations regarding the proposed cycle track, but let me reinforce that it is just one piece of a larger picture, and this picture is not new. It is the picture illustrated in SomerVision and emerging on East Broadway where the new streetscape project will enhance pedestrian and bicycle access, beautify the area, and emphasize that this section of our city is a destination rather than a cut through to other communities.

We are seeing significant investment in East Somerville as a result of this vision. Projects are moving faster than we ever imagined possible. Businesses are viewing East Somerville as one of the hot, up-and-coming places in the greater Boston region, and clamoring to relocate or expand here. And all of this is happening because we seized our opportunity to reinvigorate that area of our city. We're following the same winning game plan on Beacon Street. We're making it more accessible for all; motorists, pedestrians, cyclist and transit users. Research shows that res-

# Saving the Golden Moment for Somerville's Artists

For decades Somerville's underused industrial buildings have provided super cheap spaces for musicians, dancers, theatrical and circus performers, sculptors, painters, tinkerers and every manner of casually creative folk to practice, network and grow their craft in the urban landscape.

In successive waves Somerville's artists invested their energy in our community, claiming the city as home with the fierce, local pride learned from their blue-collar neighbors.

The creative economy proved itself to be an important partner in the economic development of Somerville. Reused garages to funky buildings not much fancier than a dog house, from a simple metal shed barely able to keep out the elements to old big brick buildings that evoke a robust manufacturing past, these industrial properties were built for work and Somerville's artists are doing that with increasing seriousness. With entrepreneurial energy rooted in an offbeat sensibility, Somerville's creative workers are building small scale businesses of promise.

For example, we're seeing significant changes over in the former Ames complex, a business that was once Somerville's largest employer. The expanses that rolled out envelopes, manila folders and metal filing cabinets for offices across the country is filled now with an eclectic assortment of thriving businesses from silkscreen printers to guitar builders, collaborative roboticists to acrobats and rock climbers.

While modest from the outside, there's impressive innovation taking place inside. Just last month one of the companies at the Artisan's Asylum raised over one million dollars in less than a week to bring their invention into production.

But this golden moment of Somerville's creative businesses paying cheap money to collaborative or passive landlords can't last forever. These industrial areas where artists and other creatives work are no longer forgotten corners.

The growing market for new housing and commercial development, along with the new transit improvements, means that proposals to overhaul these properties, once deemed unfeasible, are being marked among the list of wise investments.

Somerville's crumbling industrial architecture is the nest that nurtures Somerville's creative class. Studios and workshops in these marginal, quirky spaces fueled our city's renaissance and as this wave of development grows these spaces are increasingly endangered. Somerville's artists could very well fall victim, as has happened in other cities, to the gentrification they helped to create.

How might Somerville's creative class respond?

Get serious about the business of your art so you have the financial means to weather the storm. Create a business plan. Plan for the future of your creative enterprise.

Get serious about real estate. Property owners are the gatekeepers of a neighborhood, so Somerville's artist community needs to get hold of the keys. It's too late to start organizing when the For Sale Continued on page 11

ted the Ville.

By the way, I never heard anyone in Somerville ever use the word grinder or hoagie when talking about a submarine sandwich. It was a sub. You had just better made sure you had lots of napkins if you ordered extra oil.

One of my favorite stories is of my Somerville High School days when I would skip a class and bolt over to Nan's Sub Shop across the street. When I came back reeking of onions I'd get bagged for hooking class. My friend Pat Scrima could never pop over to Nan's during school because...Nan was his mom!

Angelina's Sub Shop posed the same dilemma for me when I was at The Western Junior High School on Holland St. By the way, Angelina's has kept their consistent high standards of quality for as long as I can remember. There's nothing like a savory taste to bring back happy memories of the old days.

Nan's Sub shop is no longer in business but it was quite the favorite hangout back in the day. It got me thinking about those yummy "sangwich" shops that we loved in our younger days.

Di Tuccis, across from The Highland Café (Virgie's) had delicious subs as did Ma Magoos which was at Central and Highland. Bobby Di Tucci is running his rug and upholstery cleaning company and you can still see him around (if you drip your sub on your carpet, give Bobby a call!). If you look above the Crowley's Liquor sign in Ball Square, you will see the Todi's sign. Todi's had delicious subs. His mother used to make the sauce and you could always expect some entertaining conversation from Todi. Ross Bluin used to make the biggest subs you have ever seen at McKinnons back in the 90's. My dad used to call them bombers. There was enough meat in one of those subs to feed a family of four!

There was a sub shop called Leo's that was also in Ball Square. Ma Magoos was across from Sunnyhurst Farms (which is also gone) at the corner of Central and Highland Ave. J and S was on Cross Street and White Sport was in Magoun Square on Medford St. (there was a White Sport in Union Square too I think). 3D's was also in Magoun. Caputos was at the corner of School St and Somerville Ave. DiNittos was on Somerville Ave. near where Bradlees (Target) was. Minute Sub shop was at the corner of Broadway and Barton.

Do you remember Joe and Sal's on Cross Street? Johnny's on Thurston St. always gets mentioned when discussing subs. I'm pretty sure their famous "Johnny's special" cost 50 cents. A shop called My Uncles was in Continued on page 11

# PROHIBIT SUSPENSION OF ROLL CALLS (H

House 29-126, voting strictly along party lines, rejected a Republican-sponsored rule prohibiting the House from suspending a roll call already in progress. The only exemption would be quorum calls, used to gather a majority of members onto the House floor to conduct business, in which members simply vote "present" in order to indicate their presence in the chamber.

Supporters of the new rule said there is no reason to cancel a roll call vote once it is in progress.

Opponents offered no arguments. (A"Yes" vote is for the new rule. A "No" vote is against it.)

# **MUST SEND ELECTRONICALLY (H 2013)**

House 29-126, voting strictly along party lines, rejected a GOP-sponsored rule requiring that certain reports be made available to members electronically rather by any other means.

Supporters of the new rule said it is time to ban the archaic practice of sending members time-sensitive hard copies that are often slow to arrive. They argued that e-mailing and texting are the way to go.

Opponents offered no arguments. (A "Yes" vote is for requiring that reports be sent electronically. A "No" vote is against the requirement.)

# **ALLOW DEBATE (H 2013)**

House 29-124, voting strictly along party lines, rejected a Republican-sponsored motion to allow debate whenever a motion is made to allow the House to remain in session beyond 9 p.m. Current rules prohibit debate on the motion.

Supporters of the new rule said the rule prohibiting debate is undemocratic and restrictive. They challenged opponents to stand up and explain why they support stifling debate.

### ALSO UP ON BEACON HILL

### REVENUE COMMITTEE HEARING ON APRIL

2 - The Revenue Committee, formerly the Taxation Committee, will be holding a hearing on April 2 on dozens of bills including a controversial one allowing cities and towns the option to replace a portion of their property tax by a local income tax (S 1304).

Other items on the agenda include proposals to provide an income tax credit of up to 50 percent of the cost of the purchase of an alternative fuel vehicle (S 1355); allowing cities and towns to freeze the amount of property tax owed by seniors age 65 and over who have owned a principal residence in the municipality for at least 15 years (S 1453); allowing the state to impose a graduated income tax with higher rates on taxpayers in higher income brackets and lower rates on those in lower ones (S 17); allowing municipalities to exempt persons age 75 and older from paying the portion of the community's property taxes used for local education (H 2488); and allowing a city or town to include on its property tax bills a check-off box permitting taxpayers to voluntarily donate \$1 or more to a rainy day fund for the community (S 1408).

EDUCATION COMMITTEE ANNOUNCES DATES OF HEARINGS - The Education Committee has three hearings coming up on Beacon Hill in April and May, at which the public may weigh in on proposed laws.

APRIL 9 AT 10 A.M. in Room A-1 - A slew of bills to abolish, modify or weaken the state requirement that high school students must pass the MCAS test in order to graduate will be considered. MCAS opponents, including some teachers, say the requirement is unfair and misguided, arguing that no single test should be used as a graduation requirement. MCAS supporters say the tests are useful, reasonable and objective and will ensure that the billions of dollars spent on education are producing results.

MAY 7 AT 10 A.M. in Room A-1 - The focus switches as the committee will hear testimony on several bills making changes in the state's charter schools. Proposals include establishing a moratorium on the establishment of new charter schools (S 257); prohibiting the management of charter schools by for-profit entities (H 345); and investigating the possibility of establishing a charter school for students diagnosed with autism (H 362).

MAY 14 AT 10 A.M. in Room A-1 - Health and sex education takes center stage. The agenda includes bills that require health education classes to cover eye health and exercises (S 201); provide child exploitation awareness education, including child abduction or child sexual abuse, to students in grades 2 through 8 (S 274); and make an exemption to the current state law requiring parental notification of any sex education classes and allowing parents to excuse their children from them (H 509). This bill would exempt from the notification "any material designed to promote tolerance and respect, including difference in sexual orientation, when sexual implications are not discussed."

"It's important that our residents are not learning how to work the system, but learning how to get out of the system and get out of poverty." – Senate President Therese Murray on welfare abuse.

# HOW LONG WAS LAST WEEK'S SESSION?

Beacon Hill Roll Call tracks the length of time that the House and Senate were in session each week. Many legislators say that legislative sessions are only one aspect of the Legislature's job and that a lot of important work is done outside of the House and Senate chambers. They note that their jobs also involve committee work, research, constituent work and other matters that are important to their districts. Critics say that the Legislature does not meet regularly or long enough to debate and vote in public view on the thousands of pieces of legislation that have been filed. They note that the infrequency

and brief length of sessions are misguided and lead to irresponsible late night sessions and a mad rush to act on dozens of bills in the days immediately preceding the end of an annual session.

During the week of March 18-22, the House met for a total of 27 minutes while the Senate met for a total of 13 minutes.

of well designed, multi-modal areas spend more time in their neighborhoods and get more enjoyment from those neighborhoods. It also shows that people who walk, bike and take transit to local business districts visit more frequently and spend more money in those districts.

Cycle tracks are relatively new, but Beacon Street is unique. It is part of the busiest bicycle commuting corridor in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts (extending through Cambridge and across the Longfellow Bridge). At peak times, a quarter of the traffic on Beacon Street is bicycle traffic, and that number is increasing. At the same time, vehicle traffic has decreased across the Boston region, as well as on Beacon Street (13% from 1999 to be exact). Again, this is our chance to keep to our plan, to plan today with an eye on tomorrow.

We know the cycle track will maximize safety for everyone: cyclists, pedestrians, transit users and motorists. It is also the best way of meeting the future demands of everyone who will be travelling along that road. It will create an orderly and more predictable flow of traffic.

Yes, we will lose parking spaces as a result of these changes, and whenever the prospect of fewer parking spaces comes up, people worry about the local businesses. I can assure you, no one worries about our local businesses more than I do.

We hear your concerns. We understand them. And in order to respond to those concerns, we've changed the design to keep more parking spaces and we're negotiating to provide more off-street parking opportunities. We can assure you that there will be enough parking on Beacon Street when the project is completed.

With an eye toward a future that is so clearly defined in SomerVision, we will create a Beacon Street that is even more livable, an even stronger neighborhood and a more active business district. And we will continue to do this in every corner of our great city. We have become the model city we are by seizing opportunities like this, not by passing on them.

Beacon Street's time is now.

sign appears on the building of your rehearsal space or when the developer submits plans to turn your studio with amazing light into luxury condos. Be proactive and start exploring seriously the formation of artist co-ops to buy land and buildings in the City. Back in the 80s Somerville's Brickbottom proved an early

example of creative professionals, working together, to reclaim an underused building for live-work. Today's artists on Vernon Street, on Joy Street, on Boston Ave, on Central and Washington and elsewhere, couldn't you do the same for your workspaces?

Create a legacy. It's not only about saving this generation

of creatives in Somerville but about maintaining the environment that will allow artists and makers to continue to live and work in Somerville. Just as the City of Somerville has a trust for purchase of affordable housing, a similar mechanism could be established to form a cultural trust to purchase and maintain affordable creative workspaces.

Twenty years ago our arts community showed audaciousness when they declared Somerville "The Paris of the 90s" and named Union Square "The New Left Bank." It was initially spoken in a self-mocking way because Somerville had more than its share of naysayers.

But working closely together,

with lots of pluck, ingenuity and a can-do spirit, this community proved the tongue-in-cheek moniker to not be so ironic. The same kind of attitude that kept Somervillians from acting like victims when we were down, can serve us well in today's upswing.

# Baseball looks to be competitive in strong GBL

With a strong core of veteran players returning and a talented young cast arriving, the Somerville High baseball team has the lofty the goal of making it to the postseason after finishing with a 4-13 record last year.

Head coach Mike DiCato, in his second season at the helm, knows it won't be easy since his squad competes in the highly competitive Greater Boston League. But the Highlanders seem to be ready to throw at least as many punches as they may receive.

"We certainly look to improve

upon last year's 4-13 season," DiCato said. "So far, the team chemistry and attitude has been great and we look to compete in the GBL and qualify for the state tournament."

Dicato said the GBL is very strong this year, with Malden and Medford returning nearly all of their starters from talented teams in 2012. The coach said that GBL defending champion Everett is a very good team, despite losing their all-state catcher and GBL MVP pitcher/first baseman to graduation last spring. He also noted that Cambridge "is always a well-coached and a tough team to beat" that

also returns a sophomore GBL All-Star pitcher."

The Highlanders will be led by co-captains Quinton Hawkins and Jonathan Santana, both returning starters.

Hawkins, a senior, is a catcher who plans on playing college baseball next year.

"He has been attending various camps and showcases throughout the year to gain experience and exposure, and it has paid off as he already has some options [to play college ball]," Dicato said. "Quinton is a talented catcher who works hard and is a leader for us."

Santana, a centerfielder, is only

a junior, who also plans on playing college baseball after he graduates from Somerville High.

"He has unlimited potential as a baseball player and will be key to our team this season," DiCato said.

Sophomore pitcher Ryan Nolan, meanwhile, was a GBL All-Star as a freshman. Junior Nathan Pacheco will play "a big role at either first or third base, and will be an important part of the [batting] lineup," DiCato said. Sophomore outfielder Matt Collins also figures to make an impact.

DiCato also said the squad looks to get support from soph-

omore newcomer Jorge Santanta along with Cody Fitzgerald, a talented pitcher.

"This team has a healthy mix of experienced varsity players and rookies," DiCato said. "We still have some holes to fill in the outfield and a couple infield positions, so we are hoping some of the new guys can step up and do a good job.

"I project our pitching staff to be a little deeper this year due to more experience and more student-athletes getting involved with the baseball program. We also have one or two freshmen that may contend for a varsity position."

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

# Home invasion suspects arrested

Police responded to a reported breaking and entering in progress at 60 Derby St. Monday morning.

Responding officers were advised that two males had kicked in the door of the residence and were armed with handguns.

As the police units approached the residence, they observed two males - assumed to be the suspects in question running from the area, according to reports.

Officers then gave chase, on

foot and from police cruisers.

One of the suspects, later identified as Derrick Paul, was collared by one officer, while the other suspect, later identified as Anthony Paulino, was spotted hiding behind a vehicle by another officer on the scene.

Paul resisted efforts to restrain him by the officer who caught up with him, but was finally subdued when the additional officer on the scene lent his assistance in the struggle.


During this time, Paulino reportedly escaped from the area on foot and the search for him was resumed, police said.

Several officers engaged in the pursuit of Paulino as he ran through the neighboring streets of the area.

A reported sighting of Paulino entering an apartment building at 15 Memorial Rd. triggered a full-scale quarantine and search of the building by Somerville and State police.

Residents were ordered to vacate the building for their own safety, but one family refused to leave their apartment, according to reports.

A search of the apartment turned up Paulino as he was hiding under a mattress. A gun





was also found lying near him. Paul and Paulino face a number of charges, including armed robbery, home invasion, resisting arrest, and carrying firearms without licenses.

travel along Pan Am Railways a combination of several MBTA lines - ending-up at Global Petroleum, the coastal oil facility, located on Chelsea Creek in Revere. This expected rail route begins on the Fitchburg Commuter Rail Line and connects to the Haverhill Commuter Rail Line.

"Global Oil Company will receive all the benefits in transporting ethanol by train," said Ellin Reisner, president of Somerville Transportation Equity Partnership. "But the cities and towns and its residents will receive all the risks."

Existing MBTA tracks would serve as railways to transport the ethanol trains through urban communities. Along the potential ethanol rail route, 14 schools are within a half-mile of the red zone radius, as well as many nursing homes, businesses and residential neighborhoods.

State legislators gave the Massachusetts Department of Transportation the job of conducting an impact study to access the safety risks. Yet, the DOT had no authority to shut down the ethanol train, even if they had determined the means of transport unsafe. Now the study is complete, and the future of ethanol by rail is contingent on the X factor: a "waterways license" known as a chapter 91 license.

"We're in kind of a tough position," said Paul Nelson, project manager at MassDOT. "We really don't have any regulatory authority. All the legislation is at the federal level. We're basically preempted from doing anything."

Instead, it is Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection that will decide whether or not to allow the

ethanol train to pass through Somerville and other communities. If the train is deemed safe, Global's license will be amended, allowing them to upgrade their facility and transport ethanol by the proposed rail delivery.

Despite repeated attempts to contact Global Petroleum, The News was unable to reach a spokesperson for comment.

"Global must think it's logistically easier and more cost-effective," said Wig Zamore, a community organizer and Somerville resident. "There will be some noise and vibration

disruption that will be of a real concern to residents who live abut," he said. "The rest of the city probably won't notice it, unless there's an accident."

Zamore explained that in the worst-case scenario, if a rail car is punctured, and an ethanol fire starts, firefighters would pumpout special chemical foam to cut off the fire's oxygen supply.

"In a really dense city like Somerville or Chelsea or Cambridge, you can't really let it burn out, because there's a real danger of the fire getting to a house, school or senior center," said Zamore.

own inner motivation, and developing one's own life passions and goals.

Ideally, children need to have spaces in which they have control of the play in order to develop essential life skills. That's where the adults come into play.

"Somerville has the assets to re-design our public play spaces," said mayor Joseph A. Curtatone. "The craziest ideas are usually the most helpful."

Somerville may truly require some crazy ideas since finding safe spaces where kids can wriggle out from under the shadow of authority can be like finding a unicorn in Davis Square.

Most of those in attendance were Somerville parents, so Lanza had each person fill out a sheet listing the most common barriers they found to establishing a safe play space. Of those who responded, 64% listed car traffic as the number one barrier. Concerns over bonds with neighbors and dealing with the social stigma of outwardly creating a play space where there was not one previously were the other top barriers for those in attendance.

The bonds with neighbors and the stigma concerns can be overcome with confidence and perseverance; traffic presents a more immovable barrier, according to Lanza.

Lanza insists children have three main places in their social lives: the family, the school, and then the informal hangout. He claims the third space has become both more virtual (internet, television, videogames) and more private (bedroom, family room, or even if time is spent outside, it's in the backyard) with this current generation of young children; and those in attendance, the majority of whom were Somerville mothers, nodded in agreement with the author.

"We need to make it a compelling place with action," said Lanza, who emphasized it all starts at home. "Kids 8-18 average eight hours of digital consumption a day."

That traffic problem, though, with Somerville's high popula-

tion density, presents a unique challenge, and thus usually results in unique solutions.

"We actually have lots of spaces," said one Union Square resident in reference to the multitude of playgrounds in the area. "It's a matter of getting the kids there.

Discussions of email list servers, park get-togethers, and walk to school coordination quickly evolved amongst the residents in

Some city programs have already taken action. The Somerville library has a Dean's room that older Somerville students use as that essential third space for informal organization.

Check out the Shape Up

Somerville website, you can find health programs and bike and park maps for Somerville children; Shape Up Somerville will also be starting a "walking school bus" program to ensure physical activity for students.

It was determined that Somerville's unique population demographics and traffic density requires increased creativity and commitment from all. The city's official department heads will meet to discuss the results of this meeting, yet they can only do so much. As discussion coordinator and SomerPromise leader Stephanie Hirsch said to conclude the meeting: "It's all about our own leadership."


