Pedestrian crossing flags under consideration for Somerville



It is possible that pedestrians in Somerville may be waving colorful flags while traversing crosswalks in hopes

While many crosswalks in the city of Somerville may be regulated by traffic signals, a good many others are not. And even when obeying the respective reds, yellows and greens, there can be instances when pedestrians fall victim to oncoming vehicular traffic due to poor visibility or inattentive drivers.

Several cities and townships across the U.S. have adopted the use of "pedestrian crossing flags" to help increase the visibility of those who cross streets properly and legally.

Such a program was brought up at the latest regular meeting of the Somerville Board of Aldermen as an order was put forward asking for the Director of SPCD to report to the Board on the possibility of installing containers of the small flags at key pedestrian crossings to aid in pedestrian safety.

Chris Trapper brings his music to The Burren in Somerville

Singer-songwriter Chris Trapper's non-musician jobs have included "selling chocolate chip cookies to tourists in Boston's Quincy Market" and "food and beverage guy" for Copley Plaza Hotel.

That was before the Buffalo native found success as the leader of The Push Stars, which formed in Cambridge, MA and released four albums and an EP between 1996 and 2004.

Songs that Trapper wrote for the band appeared in movies such as There's Something About Mary, Me, Myself, & Irene, and The Devil Wears Prada. The trio also toured 10-20,000-capacity venues with Matchbox Twenty in 2003. (The band recently reunited - although it never officially broke up - to record 3 Feet in the Air, which came out on September 21 of this year.)

As a solo artist, Trapper has 10 recordings to his credit. These include his 2002 debut, one of all original Christmas songs, Continued on page 14

It wasn't just tacos he was after

Police officers were dispatched to the Taqueria Tapatio restaurant on Broadway last week on reports of a dispute in progress.

Upon arrival, the officers spoke with a woman who stated that a man, identified as Francisco Resate-Reyes, who had attacked her over the summer inside the restaurant had come into the restaurant that evening and began threatening her and yelling incoherently.

The victim provided the officers with paperwork from the probation department at Somerville

District Court, outlining conditions for Resate-Reyes, who was ordered by probation to stay away from the woman and to not abuse alcohol or drugs.

The victim and witnesses pointed out Resate-Reyes, who was seated inside the nearby Coco Flow Style barber shop. The officers approached Resate-Reyes and noted that he appeared to be heavily intoxicated.

The officers spoke to Resate-Reyes in English, and one of the barbers was able to translate to Spanish to ensure a clear

line of communication with him. Resate-Reyes was told to stay away from the restaurant and the victim, and he reportedly stated that he understood.

The victim was advised to contact 9-1-1 if Resate-Reyes returned, and that police would be contacting his probation officer.

As the officers returned to their cruiser, they reportedly observed Resate-Reyes exit the barber shop and stumble around in the middle of Broadway and Franklin St., after which he walked directly toward the door of the

restaurant.

Resate-Reyes ignored the officers' verbal commands to stop and continued walking towards the door of the restaurant.

As an officer grabbed Resate-Reyes, preventing him from entering the restaurant, he reportedly tensed up and pulled away from and attempted to taunt the victim. Other patrons inside the restaurant appeared to be afraid of Resate-Reyes.

The officers informed Resate-Reyes that he was under arrest and to place his arms behind his back, at which time he reportedly turned around to face the officers and tucked his arms tight to his body preventing them from placing handcuffs on him.

After numerous unsuccessful attempts to make Resate-Reyes cooperate, he was eventually taken to the ground, where he continued to resist but was in due course placed into handcuffs.

Resate-Reyes was subsequently taken to the station for booking on charges of disorderly conduct, trespassing, and resisting arrest.

Pedestrian crossing flags under consideration for Somerville

Ward 6 Alderman Lance Davis suggested that containers of small flags at both sides of key pedestrian crossings could help pedestrians cross the street. Pedestrians could use a flag to gain

the attention of motorists.

"Some folks may have seen these up in Arlington on Mass Ave., the new sort of traffic patterns they have up there. They've just got little cans attached to the poles, and the little orange flags," Davis explained. "So when you're trying to cross the street you have a better way to get driver's attention."

Davis said he didn't know if they work or not, or if the flags disappear every Friday and Saturday night, but he felt that is is an intriguing idea that should be explored further.

Ward 5 Alderman Mark Niedergang asked for the order to be referred to the Traffic and Parking Committee, and told the Board that he thought the program is a great idea.

"One of the most shocking statistics that I've heard as an alderman was in the ResiStat meetings last spring," said Niedergang. "One of the data points that they put up was that 48 percent of pedestrians who were hit in Somerville by automobiles are hit in the crosswalks. I couldn't believe it when I saw that. It's a very disturbing number, and I think shows that anything that makes pedestrians more visible to drivers is a good thing. Especially short people, children, etc. So I'm very interested in pursuing this."

The order was subsequently approved and referred to the Traffic and Parking Committee for further review and recommendations.

Beyond the March: Visions of a more woman-led America

Rebecca Kopycinski grew up in Lowell, MA, runs a video making business, and is a multimedia and performance artist. She speaks with the calm reflectiveness of someone skilled at introspection.

"I'm very fortunate with my business, I have a lot of flexibility and freedom, and I have many clients with missions I believe in. Of course, there's also work for tech companies that offsets the non-profits, but I feel fortunate I have the talent to help promote missions I believe in."

"As a personal project, I'm currently working on *Reagan Esther Myer*, a 90-minute multimedia one-woman show. There's live music, video, and theatrical performance, all employed to tell this twisted tale of a universe featuring elements terrifyingly reminiscent of our own social zeitgeist. The show touches on themes of socio-political power dynamics, feminist resistance, and trust – while maintaining levity with off-brand campy humor."

What was your experience of the Women's March?

"I went down to the Common with a group of friends. We couldn't really see very much, but we were just so amazed to see how many people were there. It was so amazing to be in that sea of people still fighting for a world that's loving, caring, accepting, kind, a come one come all world."

"So many people fighting for that. I really felt that we have a lot of people in our corner. I know this is a blue, progressive state, but it was like putting a salve on a wound. A feeling of, I don't feel so hopeless now. That feeling of togetherness imbued me with hope."

What's your perspective on the #metoo movement?


"I feel really grateful that I've never been sexually assaulted. Now that women are feeling more safe to tell their stories, there's so many stories. It's so pervasive. 'I'm so grateful no one has attacked me' shouldn't even be a sentence! It's been good to see women feel safe and supported in telling the truth."

"So many people in our culture slip so easily into anger – if you're getting mad that someone is just telling their story – maybe you've done something questionable yourself."

What do you think a more woman-led society would be like?

"So much better. I know it's a dangerous thing to think that — being a woman is not a guarantee you'll be a good leader. I was not a Hillary supporter, I was for Bernie. I mean, I did vote for her. But where has she been since? Nowhere. She's not out there fighting for women."

"Our problem now is that it's all one group. There just should be equal representation. I mean, I do think women are more

empathetic. I think women are stronger. They've been put down so much during history, they've needed their strength."

"But I think it's only a matter of time before things change. I'm very hopeful about the generation that's coming into voting now, and are pretty fed up with what the government is doing now."

What would you like to say to women in America today?

"To female artists, make it happen. You're worthy and good enough. In the arts so many areas are male dominated, music, film making, visual art. It's another

area where women need to make a stand for themselves."

"To women in general, be vigilant. Be vigilant in your relationships. With the men around us – professional relationships, friends, family – there's so many micro aggressions that happen. It's important to notice them and defuse them."

"It's not up to us to educate men not to be a misogynistic jerk. But you need to deflect the negativity that damages your self-worth. There's so many ways we're told we're lesser. Be vigilant. Just notice them and disrupt them."

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Beacon Hill Roll Call



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THE HOUSE AND SENATE: There were no roll calls in the House or Senate last week. This week, Beacon Hill Roll Call continues a series of reports on how local legislators in 2017-2018 voted on roll calls raising, lowering or creating new taxes.

This week: Part two of a two-part series of reports on Senate members' votes on tax-related proposals.

REGULATION AND TAXING OF SHORT-TERM RENTALS (H 4841)

Senate 30-8, approved a bill that extends the state's current 5.7 percent hotel and motel tax and up to a 6 percent local option room occupancy tax to short-term rentals offered by Airbnb, HomeAway and VRBO while leaving the regulation of these rentals including registration, licensing and inspections up to local cities and towns.

The measure also allows local cities and towns to impose a local impact fee of up to 3 percent on operators who rent out two or more professionally-managed shortterm rental units within a municipality.

Other provisions create a central state registry of short-term rentals and require that a city or town dedicate no less than 35 percent of revenue generated from the new local option fee to either affordable housing or local infrastructure needs.

The measure was approved by both branches and sent to Gov. Charlie Baker who offered amendments to it. The Legislature never acted on the amendments and the bill remains in limbo.

(A "Yes" vote is for the bill. A "No" vote is against it.)

21-DAY EXEMPTION (S 2381)

Senate 11-26, rejected an amendment that would exempt from the new short-term rental tax people who rent out their unit for 21 or fewer days per year.

(A "Yes" vote is for the 21-day exception. A "No" vote is against it.)

BAN DISCRIMINATION IN SHORT-TERM RENTALS (S 2381)

Senate 37-0, approved an amendment that prohibits discrimination in short-term rentals based on race, color, religious creed, national origin, sex, gender identity, sexual orientation, genetic information, ancestry or status as a veteran.

(A "Yes" vote is for the amendment.)

INCREASE DEEDS EXCISE TAX FROM \$20 to \$50 (S 4)

Senate 38-0, approved an amendment raising the state deeds excise tax from \$20 to \$50. The deeds excise tax is paid by the seller of a property and funds the state's Community Preservation Act Trust Fund that "matches" the money raised by local cities and towns which are allowed to impose a surtax on real estate sales to fund projects like affordable housing, preservation of historical resources and open space.

(A"Yes" vote is for the hike.)

HIKE CAR RENTAL TAX BY \$2 TO FUND PO-LICE TRAINING (H 4516)

Senate 36-0, approved a bill imposing a \$2 tax on car rentals to fund municipal police training.

(A "Yes" vote is for the \$2 tax to fund police training.)

SALES TAX HOLIDAY (S 4)

Senate 14-24, (On May 22, 2018) rejected and then 31-6, (On July 25, 2018) approved an amendment allowing consumers to buy most products that cost under \$2,500 during a two-day weekend sales tax holiday in August without paying the state's 6.25 percent sales tax.

(A "Yes" vote is for the amendment. A "No" vote is against it. Both roll calls are listed below. The first one is on 14-24 rejection. The second one is on 31-6 approval.)

ALLOW NEIGHBORHOODS TO BAND TO-GETHER AND FORM A DISTRICT(H 4546)

Senate 22-15, approved a local option bill allowing a city or town to authorize the creation of community benefit district which would permit owners of contiguous property in a city or town to form a district and require property owners to pay for additional services, improvements, events and other projects and activities within the district. The districts would be operated by a nonprofit board.

(A "Yes" vote is for the bill. A "No" vote is against it.)

REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION TAXES (S 1551)

Senate 27-10, approved an amendment that would allow cities and towns, with the approval of local voters on a ballot question, to increase taxes on payroll, sales, property, fuel or vehicle excise tax. The funds could be used only for transportation-related purposes including maintaining, repairing, planning, operating, improving and constructing public transportation and transit systems, including roads, bridges, bikeways and pedestrian pathways.

The measure allows a city or town to act on its own or join other cities and towns to form a regional alliance and pool the revenue.

(A "Yes" vote is for the amendment. A "No" vote is against it.)

ALSO UP ON BEACON HILL

CREDIT REPORTS (H 4806) – The House approved a new version of a bill that would prohibit consumer reporting agencies, like Equifax, Experian and TransUnion from charging fees for freezing and unfreezing a person's credit information. Under current law, companies can and have charged up to \$5 per freeze or unfreeze. A freeze makes the report inaccessible until the consumer unfreezes it. Since banks and other lenders require access to the borrower's credit report before giving a loan, this greatly reduces identity thieves from

getting a loan or credit in another individual's name.

The proposal gained momentum following the 2017 crisis when, from May to July, the personal information including names, social security numbers, addresses, driver's licenses and credit card numbers of 145 million Americans was stolen from Equifax's systems. Equifax didn't reveal the breach until September and consumers lost valuable time to act.

Other provisions of the bill prohibit businesses from obtaining a consumer's credit report without obtaining written, verbal or electronic consent from the consumer; and improve notices and consumer information the companies are required to give.

"I am pleased the House moved legislation forward today that will help protect Massachusetts consumers from security breaches," said Rep. Tackey Chan (D-Quincy), House Chair of the Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure. "We have worked hard to ensure that consumers have access to the resources needed after a breach occurs, while also making sure that the commonwealth is in step with federal data security regulations."

BUSINESS TELEPHONE LISTING (H 184) – On

July 20, 2017, the House gave initial approval to a bill that would prohibit a business from listing a local telephone number in a phone directory if calls are routinely forwarded to a non-local number and the listing does not give the true physical address of the business. The measure has been stuck in the House Bills in Third Reading Committee since its approval more than a year ago.

HOW LONG WAS LAST WEEK'S SESSION?

Beacon Hill Roll Call tracks the length of time that the House and Senate were in session each week. Many legislators say that legislative sessions are only one aspect of the Legislature's job and that a lot of important work is done outside of the House and Senate chambers. They note that their jobs also involve committee work, research, constituent work and other matters that are important to their districts. Critics say that the Legislature does not meet regularly or long enough to debate and vote in public view on the thousands of pieces of legislation that have been filed. They note that the infrequency and brief length of sessions are misguided and lead to irresponsible late-night sessions and a mad rush to act on dozens of bills in the days immediately preceding the end of an annual session.



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5 ways to help older adults avoid problems with contractors

I am a huge fan of independent contractors, because they do vital work that most of us can't or won't. But finding good contractors and managing them is not always easy - and older adults sometimes face unique challenges in this department.

I recently worked with an elderly woman who has significant memory impairment.

She lives in an older home quite happily most of the time but recently had a problem with bedbugs, which was a huge issue for both her and the live-in aides she relies on.

We needed the problem fixed immediately. But, as often happens, the first treatment didn't eradicate the problem, and the exterminator was not in a hurry to come back and do a second one.

We were told that it was a busy time. But it felt like we were being put on the back burner, behind customers who had yet to write a check for that first payment.

The exterminator was part of a national chain. After several unsuccessful calls to the local office, I took her problem to the regional office and things eventually got sorted out. But it required a good deal of follow-up and assertiveness.

I don't claim to know the contractor's motivation, but the assumption an older person won't speak up if there is a problem, or that they can be ignored if they do.

Do you suspect that an older adult is facing similar issues? Here are five ways to help older adults avoid problems with contractors:

Well-Being Checks

Knowing what's going on in the person's home is the first step toward being able to help, and visiting for regular well-being checks can be key. In addition to spending time with your friend or family member, it's a chance to note the condition of their home. If there seems to be an issue that's not being addressed, try tactfully approaching it in conversation. Don't surprised if it takes more than once to get to the bottom of things, and remember to be respectful of their boundaries.

If home visits are impractical, well-being checks by phone can also be helpful. Pay special attention if they mention issues around the house, such as things breaking, and try to discuss their plan for fixing things. And remember to tactfully follow up; don't assume things worked out. Do Your Research

Take some time to learn about your options. Ask friends and family in the area for recommendations, or consult websites that offer customer reviews. You can also determine if potential Massachusetts Office of Consumer Affairs and Business Regulation.

Know the Scams

The Better Business Bureau (BBB) advises that people aged 45-65 are at greatest risk for home improvement scams.

A common scam is a doorto-door contractor who claims they're in the neighborhood with extra supplies and offers a bargain repair, only to raise the price midway, possibly threatening to walk. These are typically high-pressure sales pitches, where they want a quick answer.

A better approach is to get a second opinion before hiring a contractor, and the BBB advises checking references and insisting on a written contract that includes price, materials and timeline.

Know your Rights

Hiring the right contractor is a crucial first step, because if you get a bad one the focus can easily shift to trying to contain the damage.

Some communities, such as Cambridge, have a consumer's council, to help mediate complaints without recourse to legal action. Another potentially helpful resource is the Attorney General's Consumer Hotline (617 727-8400), which can provide guidance on whether there's grounds to file a complaint.

Hire a Professional

Trapper's final two performances of 2018 will be on consecutive nights at The Burren. He spoke by phone to The Somerville Times from his home in Westwood, where he lives with his wife and two children.

The Somerville Times: When were you enshrined in the Buffalo Music Hall of Fame and who are some of your illustrious fellow inductees?

Chris Trapper: Just a couple of weeks ago, actually. The Goo Goo Dolls. Natalie Merchant. Rick James is one of the most notorious. And the barbershop quartet from the film version of The Music Man. They were called the Buffalo Bills, and I was a barbershop nut back in high school, so I loved those guys. That was probably the coolest thing for me, to be with the most famous barber shop group of all I just wait for inspiration to

time. Ani DiFranco, too.

TST: How would you describe your music to someone who has never heard it?

CT: I would say it falls comfortably in the singer-songwriter vein of say, Paul Simon. He always experimented with different eras of music. I'm a big 1950s music nut, so I'll always throw in one track on every record that's kind of 50s-inspired. It's lyrically driven singer-songwriter, because the lyrics dictate where the song goes and where the production goes.

TST: Do you usually include Push Stars songs in your set lists?

CT: I try and have a few of the more popular Push Stars songs. I'll play those. The nice benefit of never having a bona fide hit song is that you can play stuff from every record and the crowd doesn't leave.

TST: How long after a new release do you begin working on the next album?

CT: There's no specified time.

strike. When I wrote my last record, what was happening was I'd written a song for a film called August Rush, and the producer from that was working on a new movie. And he called me one day and he was like, "I'm working on something new. Can you write some songs for it?" I was like, "Yeah, I can." So he started sending me scenes and sending me the script. And one a scene, he's like, "Selma Hayek gets undressed in this scene. We need a song in the background." And I was like, "Well, yeah, you can send it to me, I guess." So I got this advance copy of that scene, and I wrote a song for that. At the end of that process, I'd written maybe eight songs for the film. And that became Symphonies of Dirt & Dust (2015). And then I wrote a few additional songs.

If I get a little melody idea, no matter where I am - if I'm at a party or one of my kid's soccer games - I'll duck into a corner and sing into my phone. Then I'll go back later, listen through them and see if anything sounds interesting or unique or catchy. And then that's usually where a song starts from.

TST: Has your career been negatively affected by piracy, file sharing, or streaming services?

CT: For me, longevity is such a gift that I embrace whatever's new because I'm just glad to still be around. So yeah, people expect free music, but honestly with Spotify for the past couple years, I've gotten songs of mine on a couple playlists that have had huge followings. So I have a lot of plays and then you get a check in the mail that's, like, pretty nice. And you didn't have to ship anything, you didn't have to pack anything, you didn't need postage. It's just like money from thin air. And that's a beautiful thing. I think with technology there's always something gained and something lost.

TST: What has been one of your most memorable Spinal Tap moments?

CT: That's a great question! I was just telling somebody recently that one time our band was booked in Virginia Beach. We had just toured with Matchbox Twenty, opening for them. Some towns didn't have small rock clubs, so we got booked in this metal club on a Tuesday night. And we pull up and our name is written in the marquee as "The Punishers," as opposed to The Push Stars, which told you what kind of thought went into promoting the show as well. Usually, if the club doesn't know the band name, that's not a good sign. So we went from arenas to being The Punishers the next tour. There've been a billion moments like that. It's actually fun to think about those. And they still happen on a regular basis!

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

The issues with bus timing

Imagine you are an eighth-grade student. You and your friend are on the cross country team, and you need to take a bus to get to a meet. You get dismissed early and are ready to run. You head on over towards the bus stop. You grab a seat on the bench and wait for the bus. And wait. And wait some more. About 30 minutes have passed when the bus finally pulls up at the stop, and you're too late for the meet.

Our group from the West Somerville Neighborhood School, in collaboration with Generation Citizen, is working on tackling this issue in order to benefit the community. Students in need of transportation are not the only ones that face this problem. Most bus routes in Somerville are also facing issues such as inconsistencies in timing, useless routes, or schedules that do not fit the needs of the public. The statistic shows that as of November 28, only 68% of people believe the bus services provided by the MBTA are reliable. This may not seem that bad until you see that the MBTA has an average of 355,000 riders every weekday. This means 113,600 people out of those 355,000 riders are unsatisfied by the reliability of the buses.

There are many complaints online about the MBTA, specifically on Yelp. Most complaints are focused on routes 87, 88, and 89. The 89 bus only runs about every hour to hour and a half depending on the day. This is a significant struggle for students living on the west side of the city. This is unusually harsh during the cold and nasty winters here in New England. The 87 and 88 run more frequently than the 89 but don't run at the times when they are needed. The overall rating on Yelp is two stars, which is not good considering the sheer amount of people using this service.

Many people are not happy with bus routes and schedules. However, the MBTA could be dramatically improved as a whole with just a few steps. For one, the MBTA could put out surveys to optimize bus routes and schedules to see what the community needs. The MBTA is currently working on a new system that will allow people to pay on both ends of the bus, which should speed up buses by not having to wait for people to pay and reload their card. This would dramatically improve buses as well as improve overall public satisfaction with the MBTA.

OFF THE SHELF

Somerville writer Shariann Lewitt:

A Darkly Clad Scribe of Science Fiction

A darkly clad figure with long black braids loomed outside the Remnant Brewery at the new Bow St. Market in Union Square. I approached her, she smiled and joined me at my well-appointed table that had a handsome view of the market's courtyard. My guest this afternoon was Shariann Lewitt, a prolific creative writer who works in a number of genres. Her writing includes, but is not limited to: literary science fiction, young adult fiction, and military science fiction. For years Lewitt has taught writing at MIT. Lewitt lives with her husband in the Highland Ave. area of Somerville, that is in walking distance to Union Square.

Lewitt told me she came to the "Paris of New England" from Washington, DC in July of 2000. She is enthusiastic about the city stating, "I love it in Somerville. We own our own home, the Board of Alderman is fabulous. I like the mayor. Somerville has great energy." But not everything is a bed of roses for this writer. She reflected, "I am also concerned about the lack of affordable housing, and how the diversity and uniqueness of the city is likely to suffer."

Hewitt has not been stingy with her writing. Under the pseudonym Nina Harper, she wrote two books: Succubus in the City and Succubus Takes Manhattan. Both deal with a fashionable, urbane and seductive woman who is an agent, not for an upscale real estate agency, but for the devil. This woman lures often boorish men into sexual liaisons, and after the deed is done she leads them to an even hotter destiny – Hades itself.

Lewitt describes her work as speculative fiction,

meaning science fiction or generally fiction that does not deal with the here and now. She has written in the genres of military science fiction that specifically deal with intergalactic wars. She also has written space operas. According to the *Encyclopedia of Science Fiction* this genre consists of "colorful and dramatic stories (sometimes melodramatic, like ... well ... a TV soap opera) that deals with interplanetary or intergalactic conflict." Lewitt has taken a hiatus from publishing, but has expressed an interest in more historical writing rather than speculative.

Lewitt, who graduated from Yale Drama, was first published at the tender age of 23. She had a number of early influences, like the iconic science fiction writer Philip K. Dick, whose work inspired the movie *Blade Runner*. She also considers folks like Samuel R. Delaney as influences as well.

Lewitt told me, "Although these guys were sexist in their writing I still admire their work. I mean they were coming up in the 50s and 60s and this was the status quo back then. Of course, I don't endorse that sensibility."

The writer told me she loves teaching at MIT. She is the recipient of the university's Levitan Award for excellence in teaching. It is presented by the School of Humanity Arts and Social Sciences. And to her credit she was nominated by students.

After our chat, I separated from this dark figure and headed away from the wilds of Union Square. I looked behind me and saw her black hat bob up and down in the wind like a brimmed omen of yet more fiction yet to come.

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
