The School Building Facilities and Maintenance Committee met online recently to discuss several items of concern regarding Somerville's public schools.

On Wednesday, November 29, Somerville's School Building Facilities and Maintenance Committee met via Zoom to discuss several potential changes and improvements to the city's schools.

This particular meeting focused mainly on the issues that are currently affecting the public the most. The first Item that was touched upon was Order #22-1528, asking the Director of Infrastructure and Asset Management, Rich Raiche, to provide an update on the status of the School Building Systems Feasibility Study.

The most recent update is that after Kennedy's existing chiller failed, Capital Projects decided to mobilize with a consulting team on the current design. Due to the issue's complexity, *Continued on page 4*



"Barbie camper and Barbie airplane. One of them, can't remember which, got two of and gave one of them to a best friend."


I got an Aurora slot car racing set which was very cool."

it was decided that they would not be able to begin working on the new chiller until next winter, so the school will have to use the current chiller for another year.

As for updates on the chillers in the Healey School and West Somerville Neighborhood School, they have completed the conceptual designs for both and are progressing into design development of mechanical and roof upgrades. This scope of work will include the roof, chiller, boiler, and control systems replacement.

While all of these changes are important and very much welcome, Committee Chair Ward 5 City Councilor Beatriz Gomez Mouakad expressed frustration as they are long overdue. "Parents are losing trust in our work and our schools," she stated. "Somerville is becoming known for its school's failing systems. I don't think any parent should tolerate disruptions to the school day."

Edgerly School Improvements for the Winter Hill Community Innovation School Several of this meeting's items focused specifically on the changes that they are hoping to make to the Edgerly School. After many students attending the Winter Hill Community Innovation School were temporarily placed at Edgerly back in August of this year due to asbestos and a failing roof, the committee realized that major changes would need to be made to Edgerly in order to properly accommodate them.

Recently, the administration was asked to provide an update on the building's kitchen equipment and to discuss the plan to serve the Winter Hill Community Innovation School youth and further city programs. Fortunately, it was shared that several electrical upgrades were made as well as plumbing modifications so the kitchen is now deemed usable. Additionally, items of equipment that have long lead times were put on order.

Aside from upgrades to the kitchen, the Committee wants the administration to work with

the School Department to discuss emergency plans for at-risk school relocation should anything like this ever happen again. While this will be kept in the committee for now there is no plan in place yet, they are working hard to create one. However, it was decided that for now, a website will be opened that will contain regular updates regarding the Winter Hill school situation, including links to publicly filed documents.

Unresolved Items

There were several more items discussed that Chair Gomez Mouakad opted to keep open and in Committee, which are as follows:

• It was asked that the Director of Infrastructure and Asset Management deliver a study showing the steps to de-carbonize mechanical systems in existing school buildings as part of the Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC) Feasibility Study, and assess potential grants and funding to help accel-



erate this process. However, they don't currently have funding to do a separate study for something of the sort.

• They wanted the Director of Infrastructure and Asset management to provide an update on the status of School Building Feasibility Study. This Item was dropped without much discussion because it was mentioned that there will be a meeting on Saturday the 9th to discuss the outcome of this.

However, the Item that prompted the longest discussion

out of these three was the Item that suggested that the Commissioner of Public Works should provide quarterly reports to the Committee on any major repairs and 311 work orders in the school buildings. The main question was what they should consider to be a major issue vs. a minor one, given that minor issues could quickly turn into major ones at any point in time. The committee was unable to come to an agreement on this subject, therefore this Item will remain open and be further discussed at a later date.

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Beacon Hill Roll Call

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THE HOUSE AND SENATE: There were no roll call votes in the House or Senate last week. This week, *Beacon Hill Roll Call* reports local representatives' roll call attendance records for the 2023 session through December 1.

The House has held 70 roll calls so far in 2023. *Beacon Hill Roll Call* tabulates the number of roll calls on which each representative was present and voting, and then calculates that number as a percentage of the total roll call votes held. That percentage is the number referred to as the roll call attendance record.

In the House, 70.6 percent (113 representatives out of 160) did not miss any roll calls and have 100 percent roll call attendance records, while 29.4 percent (47 representatives out of 160) have missed one or more roll calls.

There were 13 representatives who missed eight or more roll calls resulting in roll call attendance records below 90 percent. The four representatives who missed the most roll calls are Reps. Michelle Ciccolo (D-Lexington), Richard Haggerty (D-Woburn), Daniel Hunt (D-Dorchester) and Joan Meschino (D-Hull) who each missed 25 roll calls for a 64.2 percent roll call attendance record.

Rounding out the list of 13 representatives who missed eight or more roll calls are the following: Reps. Tram Nguyen (D-Andover) who missed 23 roll calls (67.1 percent roll call attendance record); Mary Keefe (D-Worcester) who missed 13 roll calls (81.4 percent roll call attendance record); Kenneth Gordon (D-Bedford) and Chynah Tyler (D-Roxbury) who each missed 12 roll calls (82.8 percent roll call attendance record); Tricia Farley-Bouvier (D-Pittsfield), Adam Scanlon (D-North Attleborough), Kim Ferguson (R-Holden), and Fred Barrows (R-Mansfield) who each missed nine roll calls (87.1 percent roll call attendance record); and Margaret Scarsdale (D-Pepperell) who missed eight roll calls (88.5 percent roll call attendance record.

Beacon Hill Roll Call contacted the 13 representatives to ask why they missed some roll calls. Only five of the 13 responded. The other eight were contacted three times but did not respond. The list of nonrespondents consists of Reps. Nguyen, Keefe, Gordon, Tyler, Farley-Bouvier, Scanlon, Ferguson and Barrows.

Here are the responses:

Rep. Hunt responded: "Up until this date I have not missed a roll call. Last minute, I had to go get my child from daycare because they had a fever. I've previously voted in favor of the budget line items and the tax proposal."

Rep. Scarsdale responded: "On September 27 I had to leave the chamber subsequent to roll call #49 due to a preplanned meeting with first responders in my district. This is the only day I have left the chamber during roll call votes during my tenure. I therefore missed roll calls #50 through #57. [Acting] Speaker Alice Peisch made a statement on the floor reflecting the reason I had to leave, and the fact that had I been present I would have voted in the affirmative for all eight of those roll calls, and this statement is recorded in the House Journal for the day. All eight of those votes resulted in an affirmative outcome either unanimously or by a substantial margin."

Rep. Haggerty responded: "I missed a single day of voting this session on September 27, 2023, when I was unfortunately not able to attend a session due to a family commitment. The first roll call vote was for the tax relief legislation which I had previously voted in favor of, and I would have voted in favor of again. The remaining procedural votes were overrides of the governor's budget vetoes which were budget items I had previously voted in favor of. I would have voted in favor of each of those as well."

Rep. Ciccolo responded: "This session, I was away from the House chamber during [a] formal session on a single day: September 27th, to attend a work-related conference at which I was learning about single use plastic reduction strategies through reuse and refill. This was the day the budget overrides were being taken up and H 4104 was being enacted. There were an unusually high number of roll call votes on that single day. Fortunately, the vast majority of the items voted on were items on which I had previously voted during the budget and during H 4104's original engrossment, so my record in the affirmative on these matters should be clear."

Rep. Meschino responded: "I was traveling internationally in September when the House scheduled a formal session. I made the commitment well over 15 months earlier. I had no way to know [what] the session schedule would be. The House voted [for] two conference committee reports and a series of budget veto overrides. I only missed the one day of formal session, but the House took up quite a few votes that day."

ALSO UP ON BEACON HILL

BAN HOSTILE ARCHITECTURE THAT TAR-GETS THE HOMELESS (H 3963) – The State Administration and Regulatory Oversight Committee held a hearing on a proposal that would prohibit the state, the MBTA and cities and towns from constructing "hostile architecture" that supporters of the ban say targets the homeless and tries to push them out of certain areas. The bill defines hostile architecture as "any building or structure that is designed or intended to prevent unhoused individuals from sitting or lying on the building or structure at street level."

According to Robert Rosenberger, an associate professor of philosophy at Georgia Institute of Technology, who has studied and written extensively on the subject, hostile architecture includes armrests that divide benches so that the bench is not long enough to sleep on, sprinklers that are turned on at night and certain trash cans. "Garbage cans ... serve several functions for people living unhoused," said Rosenberger. "Some people use garbage cans as a source of recyclable materials [which] can often be exchanged for a small sum of money. Garbage cans are also sometimes approached as a source of discarded food." He notes that many newer garbage cans are built so that people cannot reach inside them to obtain recycled bottles or cans or leftover food.

Supporters say that family homelessness in Greater Boston has doubled over the last decade, shelters are overcrowded and waiting lists for affordable housing are in the tens of thousands. They note that policies that sterilize the homelessness crisis in public spaces are not only inhumane, but they also only serve to mask the problem.

"Housing ought to be a human right and combating homelessness will require a comprehensive approach that includes housing production, tenant protections and bigger investments in affordability and services," said sponsor Rep. Mike Connolly (D-Cambridge). "What will not work is designing public spaces that are hostile to unhoused people. This only sends the issue deeper into the shadows."

BAN SOME ARTIFICIAL TURFS (H 3948) – Another measure heard by the State Administration and Regulatory Oversight Committee would ban municipalities and the state from installing or subsidizing new artificial turf fields that contain zinc, plastic, perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), or other toxins. It would not affect current turf fields which would be grandfathered in under the bill, but it would assure that no new public artificial turf construction would take place.

"Based on the growing body of evidence that shows that these turf fields pose a danger for athletes from heat stress, severe abrasions and toxic chemical *Continued on page 16*

During snow emergencies this winter, residents must park on the ODD side of the road only, unless otherwise posted.

As the holiday gift shopping season intensifies, it's important to remember that **our local merchants** are depending on us all to do our best to shop local. With the challenges they have dealt with over the past couple of years, let's help them to get back to business and be here for years to come.

Once a snow emergency has been declared, residents have four hours to move vehicles to the correct side of the street, or into a designated municipal parking lot.

Vehicles not moved during this window of time may be ticketed (\$100 fine) and towed (\$100 fine assessed by the tow company for the tow).

Vehicles parked within 20 feet of any intersection may be ticketed and towed. For a list of designated municipal parking lots available for snow emergency parking, visit www.somervillema.gov/ snow. Residents are encouraged to sign up for phone, email, and text alerts by visiting www.somervillema.gov/alerts.

Also, parking is no longer allowed in school parking lots during snow emergencies. Four hours after a snow emergency is called, gates to school parking lots will be closed and locked until the emergency is lifted.

Be safe and be legal. If we all cooperate and keep these simple rules and guidelines in mind, we can get through the season unscathed and happy.

Urban Waggle Bzzs to Somerville



Chocolate Holiday Cookies

These are not your traditional Italian chocolate spice cookies made for the Christmas season, but make a great tradition nonetheless. Over the years this recipe has been adjusted many times and this year's batch is the best one yet! These light and airy cookies are not too sweet and pack a concentrated dark chocolate flavor. The secret? Espresso.

Cookies

6 large eggs 1-1/2 cups granulated sugar 1-1/8 cups canola oil 3 teaspoons vanilla 3 cups flour, plus extra for rolling out the cookies 1/2 teaspoon salt 1-1/2 cups cocoa (unsweetened) 4-1/2 teaspoons baking powder

Frosting

3 cups confectioners' sugar 2/3 cups cocoa (unsweetened) 1 teaspoon vanilla 4 oz. espresso or strong coffee 1/4 cup whole milk

Holiday sprinkles for decoration (optional)

This batter can be made up to two days ahead of time. I find using a stand mixer is much more efficient, but not totally necessary. A hand held mixer is fine for the wet ingredients, but use a large spoon to incorporate the dry ingredients into the wet mixture. This dough is thick and may be difficult for the hand mixer to do the full job.

Add the eggs and sugar and blend well, about two minutes. Add the oil and vanilla and mix at low speed for an additional two minutes. In a separate bowl, add the flour, salt, baking powder and cocoa, blend well. Put the mixer on low speed and gradually add the dry ingredients and mix until fully incorporated.

Preheat oven 400°. On a lightly floured surface, roll out the dough into a long 1/2" rope. Without cutting the dough, hold in one hand and make a small circle of dough, tucking it under itself and breaking it off once tucked under the top piece, like a knot.

The cookies should be about 1-1/2''in diameter. Place them on the cookie sheet about 2'' apart from each other. Bake for 15 minutes, until the tops are soft, but firm to the touch. This batter will make approximately six dozen cookies.

Once the cookies come out of the oven, remove them from the sheet pan and place them on a cool surface. An extra cookie sheet works well or even a platter. It is important to place the cookies on a cool sheet pan when reusing the pan or the cookies will spread and come out flat. Once the cookies are cooled completely, mix the frosting as follows. Add the confectioners' sugar and cocoa to a bowl and blend slowly by hand. Once blended, add the vanilla and espresso and stir. The frosting will be dry, so add 1/2 the milk and keep stirring. Once incorporated, it may still be dry, add the rest of the milk and blend thoroughly. It should still be thick, like a brownie mix and definitely wet enough to spread on each cookie.

Dip the round part of the cookie into the frosting and use a spoon to spread

around the whole top of the cookie. Frost liberally. There may be a little left over frosting so no need to worry about running out.

Once frosted, place the cookies on a tray and decorate while the frosting is still wet so the sprinkles adhere. Let them dry completely, about an hour before placing them in an airtight container and store them in a cool dry place. They should last for weeks, that is if you don't eat them by then!



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
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US2 in Somerville kicks-off its Third Annual 'USQ Holiday Give' to benefit Somerville Homeless Coalition

exposure, and cause substantial environmental harm to the local environment," said sponsor Rep. Carmine Gentile (D-Sudbury). "These concerns have led the U.S. Men and Women's soccer teams to stop playing on turf, and have compelled towns and cities, including Boston, to issue moratoriums on new turf construction."

GUN LEGISLATION – The Public Safety and Homeland Security Committee held a hearing on several bills dealing with guns including these three:

GHOST GUNS (S 1496) – Would make ghost guns illegal in Massachusetts. Sponsor Sen. Cindy Creem (D-Newton) explains that ghost guns are unfinished firearms that allow individuals to easily build their own guns from unregulated kits. "Once constructed, these firearms are unserialized and untraceable," she said. "To address this loophole, this bill would make it illegal to manufacture, sell or purchase any firearm without a valid serial number, which would include the unfinished frames and receivers. In addition, this bill would make it illegal to manufacture, or 3D print, firearms without a license.

"I filed this legislation, because although Massachusetts has some of the strongest gun laws in the country, these laws are being undermined by the proliferation and availability of these untraceable ghost guns," continued Creem. "We cannot sit idly by as people continue to exploit this loophole to skirt our state's firearms regulations and contribute to gun violence across the commonwealth."

CANNOT CONFISCATE LEGAL GUNS (S 1513)

- Would prohibit police, other law enforcement officers and other government officials from confiscating any lawfully owned firearm, rifle, shotgun, machinegun or ammunition. A civil fine of between \$500 and \$5,000 or up to a 2.5 year prison sentence would be imposed for each confiscated weapon. The legislation does not prohibit the confiscation of a firearm from any person who has been placed under arrest, is the subject of a protection order or has had their firearm identification card or license to carry revoked or suspended.

"I filed this legislation to provide lawful Massachusetts gun owners an extra guarantee of their Second Amendment rights," said sponsor Sen. Ryan Fattman (R-Sutton). "This bill would make it unlawful for police or other government officials acting on behalf of the commonwealth to seize legally owned weapons in the event that a state of emergency is declared in the commonwealth."

RAISE THE AGE FOR GUN POSSESSION (H 2369) – Would raise the minimum age for acquiring a Firearm Identification Card (FID) from 18 years old (or 14-17 years of age with parental consent) to 21 years old. FID permits the purchase, possession and transportation of non-large-capacity rifles, shotguns and ammunition.

"So much of gun violence can be attributed to accidents that occur with minors," said sponsor Rep. David Linsky (D-Natick). "My hope is that everyone who has an FID card is responsible enough to own a firearm, and that starts with being of the appropriate age and maturity."

HOW LONG WAS LAST WEEK'S SESSION?

Beacon Hill Roll Call tracks the length of time that the House and Senate were in session each week. Many legislators say that legislative sessions are only one aspect of the Legislature's job and that a lot of important work is done outside of the House and Senate chambers. They note that their jobs also involve committee work, research, constituent work and other matters that are important to their districts. Critics say that the Legislature does not meet regularly or long enough to debate and vote in public view on the thousands of pieces of legislation that have been filed. They note that the infrequency and brief length of sessions are misguided and lead to irresponsible late-night sessions.

During the week of November 27-December 2, the House met for a total of 13 hours and 58 minutes while the Senate met for a total of 12 hours and 41 minutes.

City of Somerville announces Police Department Staffing and Operations Analysis final report

Last week, Mayor Ballantyne inform both the Administration and the Department of Racial and Social Justice announced the completion of the Somerville Police Department Staffing and Operations Analysis study. Representatives from Raftelis Financial Consultants, Inc. – the firm contracted to lead the Analysis - presented the findings to the Somerville City Council on Thursday, November 30.

The full report is available at somervillema.gov/spd-updates and will be posted on the Somerville Police Department website as well.

In March, 2022, the city's Department of Racial and Social Justice contracted Raftelis Consultants to conduct the staffing and operations analysis study as a key part of the Public Safety for All initiative. Raftelis was tasked with measuring the workload of the SPD, studying staffing, operations, and organization, and analyzing that data. This work was undertaken to support and as well as community members engaged in reimagining efforts on the city's public safety resources and needs.

"We are deeply grateful to the Somerville Police Department for their openness and collaboration in this study. This constitutes one part of many important steps toward reshaping our public safety infrastructure. Intentional strategies and collaboration are vital to the success of our shared goals," shared Denise Molina Capers, Director of the Racial and Social Justice Department.

"Keeping our community safe is one of our most fundamental duties as a municipal government, and I want to thank our Police Department for continually striving to apply evolving best practices to their efforts to serve and protect all in our community. I want to thank the Department of Racial and Social Justice as well arranging for this study," said Mayor Katjana Ballantyne. "This



report will offer one more tool to help inform staffing decisions that will support the Police Department's ongoing and unwavering commitment to keep our people and neighborhoods safe."

The recommendations included in the final report will be taken under consideration by the Administration. It is important to note that any changes pursued would be subject to collective bargaining with SPD unions and would also require approval via the city budget process. 

Somerville Artist C. Marlo Feinberg makes sure every dog has its day

I recently caught up with Somerville artist C. Marlo Feinberg. From her website:

Marlo currently focuses on working in pen and ink, and oils. Her subjects capture her own personal life and her deep interests through her own eyes. Some of those are counterculture, dogs, music, architecture, history, movement, and the abstract.

Marlo has had her art shown in galleries starting at age 15 where she sold her first painting, she has since written and illustrated 2 children's books that have sold worldwide, a poetry book, and has been designing logos/ album covers since the age of 16. She continues to do all of the above plus freelance writing for publications, and now resides in Somerville, Massachusetts with her pianist husband, Jesse Feinberg and dog Charles Montgomery.

Doug Holder: First off, how has it been for you as an artist in Somerville?

C. Marlos Feinberg: It's been incredible. I have slowly been working my way towards the Boston area for nearly two decades because of art and music. Somerville is so concentrated with art that the surroundings inspire me to produce some form of art every day.

DH: Your husband is a pianist. Does this fact influence your own work?

CMF: Yes, because I love seeing how things work and then drawing them, and he has two pianos that I have been able to study, draw, and paint pictures of. Jesse also teaches me piano and I teach him painting.

DH: You have illustrated many books. I noticed you illustrated a poetry book. As a poet, I would be interested to know how you come up with ideas for illustrating poetry?

CMF: I love this question because my father-inlaw, Michael writes poetry and he sent me an email with poems about the High Holidays. I read one called *Mountain Air* and as I started reading it, this image popped into my head of a man walking barefoot on mossy, dark green terrain, that is crinkled like the human brain. There is a blue sky, one fluffy cloud, a sun with a smile, etc. That's how my thought pro-



cess works. Old cartoons also really influenced me, especially the ones to classical music.

DH: I noticed you have a series of painting of dogs, some with vivid color and hypnotic eyes. Does your own dog inspire you? I own a cat. For me cats are eye candy. Do have the same fascination with our feline friends?

CMF: Monty does inspire me to paint! I study him frequently and he is the model for most of my dog paintings. The eyes are important to me, the windows to the soul. Cat's eyes are like marbles!

DH: You paint faces as well. Do you just conjure them up or are they real people?


CMF: Thank you. I've never actually tried studying and painting someone's face either in person or from a reference. This is all from practicing over time and memory. It may be the reason that my faces aren't exactly real looking, but I enjoy them distorted a bit.

DH: Is there any mission or message in your work? CMF: Yes, one is to be kind to animals, especially dogs. The other is resilience. I have painted, drawn, and dug my way through some very dark times and it's important to stay strong.
