# respond to border patrol agents

Somerville officials and local organizations have been responding to the Trump administration's decision to deploy 100 border patrol agents to ten major sanctuary cities, including Somerville, in February. These officers will be assisting with run of the mill immigration arrests, in cooperation with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

Mayor Joseph Curtatone called the new plan, which will last until May, "a despicable election stunt that puts hard working people seeking to escape violence and poverty in the crosshairs." Leaders of Somerville groups like The Welcome Project, a social services and advocacy organization for immigrants, said that the tactic does more than menace individuals.

# Bringing fabric from the past to the present through art

The Somerville Media Center is now showcasing a number of contemporary textile pieces by Tori Costa, a fabric artist and former Somerville local. Costa makes collages out of recycled materials she's acquired from her travels as well as from her own home, and she says that part of the reason she began to make fabric collages was due to her lifelong love of textiles and fabrics. She is also aided by her background in quilting, a craft she began after graduating college twenty years ago.

Costa says her designs are inspired by the quilts of Gee's Bend, a group of African-Amer-

ican quilters in Alabama who are known for their contemporary quilts made from recycled cloth. The textiles in Costa's collages are mostly made from former clothing, such as denim from old jeans, pajamas, ties, and upholstery, and she uses these to juxtapose traditional designs with more modern ones. 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# **Uncooperative shoplifter relieved of the goods**

Somerville Police officers were dispatched to the Home Depot store on Mystic Ave. last Sunday on reports of a shoplifter who refused to stop for the store Asset Protection Specialist.

The alleged shoplifter, later identified as Marc Jacob, was detained behind Home Depot by a police detective.

As the additional officers arrived, they observed the detective ordering Jacob to stop tensing up and drop the bags he was holding.

A pat frisk of Jacob was sub-

sequently conducted for officer safety which turned up two sets of pliers in his pants pockets.

Jacob reportedly had a reusable TJ Maxx bag on him that contained two cutlery sets and two packaged folding knives in it.

Home Depot's Asset Protection Specialist was on the scene with the detective and confirmed that Jacob was the shoplifter in question.

Jacob was then escorted back to Home Depot's Asset Protection Office.

The Asset Protection Special-

ist told police that Jacob entered the store with a few reusable bags and a shopping cart. He then began walking around the store and place items in the bags, which were in the cart.

Jacob then reportedly took the bags out of the cart and proceeded to walk out of the door, passing all points of sale.

The Asset Protection Specialist attempted to stop Jacob, but he reportedly dropped two of the three reusable bags and continued out of the store.

When asked if Jacob had

done this before, the Asset Protection Specialist said that he did have him on camera shoplifting one time prior but he was unable to stop him.

While retrieving the stolen Home Depot goods from the bags, it was discovered that the two cutlery sets were not from Home Depot. Police checked with TJ Maxx and the manager stated that they were Bed Bath and Beyond items.

Police checked with Bed Bath and Beyond and confirmed that two of the cutlery sets were taken from the store that day. The total of the two cutlery sets came to \$212.48

While checking Bed Bath and Beyond, the Asset Protection Specialist found a record that Jacob was trespassed from Home Depot on June 16, 2018 for three years. The trespass notice was reportedly signed by Jacob.

Jacob was placed under arrest on charges of trespassing and larceny under \$1200 and taken to police headquarters for booking in the usual manner.

that this action could have negative effects relating to the upcoming census and the number of congressional seats Massachusetts has.

"We have doorknockers and other people coming from the census. Now you know that there are these tactical units that are in these communities. The likelihood of somebody answering the door is going to become less. That's going to hurt us," said Echevarria. "If they need to do a physical count for people, that's going to hurt us in a lot of ways. Because we know we have high immigrant populations, and if they're not counted, that's going to impact us financially for our schools, roadways, and a host of other things, for our congressional delegations as well." Somerville is a sanctuary city, a municipality that has policies protecting undocumented immigrants from deportation, unless they are charged with a serious crime. These cities likely have been targeted by the Trump administration for their refusal to cooperate with ICE, said Echevarria. The SWAT team-like agents include members of the elite tactical unit known as BORTAC, heavily armed officers who typically deal with violent criminals, not common cases with mild offenses.

The city will continue to uphold the rights of its immigrant communities, Curtatone explained in an email. Somerville will build trust among its constituents and work with programs, such as The Welcome Project and SomerViva Office of Immigrant Affairs, that support the immigrants who live there. The neighborhood will persevere in its efforts to preserve their safety, according to the mayor. "We will remain a welcoming city, a sanctuary city," wrote Curtatone. "We will continue to work to be sure our residents know their rights, have the full support of our community, and have access to the immigration legal support and citizenship services needed so they can secure their legal status. Congress meanwhile needs to fix our broken immigration system and create a path for the hardworking immigrants who come here for a better life and who in turn make our nation stronger."

The Welcome Project has raised its level of activity around alerting and supporting immigrant constituents, said Echevarria. The organization launched the Somerville Response Network, a text based system that notifies the community of ICE activity, in 2018. In reaction to the deployment of border patrol agents, The Welcome Project has been spreading awareness about the network through social media and flyers to ensure individuals have the information they need. The non-profit has also been working with partners, such as the American Civil Liberties Union, to make sure that lawyers are accessible, in the event of a raid.



Curtatone wrote that there is legislation that still needs to be passed, to protect Massachusetts' immigrant populations. The Safe Communities Act is a bill that respects immigrants' rights by preventing law enforcement from asking them about their immigrant status, unless required by law. It also calls for the defense of due process and the limitation of notifications to ICE.

Currently, Boston has instated the Trust Act, which prohibits police from working with ICE for civil immigration enforcement purposes, allowing them to cooperate only in the cases of serious crimes. Policies like the Trust Act have conflicted with the Trump administration's approach to immigration. Locally, Echevarria said that he would like to see more translation and interpretation services for immigrants. Diversity is an integral part of Somerville's identity as a city, said Echevarria. Without its immigrant communities, Somerville would not be the neighborhood that it is, he said.

"We've always been a city of immigrants," said Echevarria. "That's the value that we hold. It's part of who we are, in so many different ways. We believe that people have dignity and people add value to our community."

# **Legislative Matters Committee tackles** stormwater, noise and surveillance technology

City councilors JT Scott, Mark Neidergang, Lance Davis, Ben Ewen-Campen and the Committee on Legislative Matters met on Thursday, February 20, to discuss concerns regarding stormwater treatment, surveillance technology and noise in the Somerville community.

The Committee collaborated with Director of Engineering Jess Fossbroo, and Director of Infrastructure and Asset Management Richard Raiche to craft a DEP required stormwater ordinance. "The need for a stormwater ordinance has been on the back burner for a while, but we now have some impetus to complete it," said Raiche.

The new ordinance allows for

more enforcement capability, particularly regarding the separation of stormwater with sanitary water. "One change being made in the ordinance will allow us to eliminate, enforce and penalize non-stormwater discharges that may be going to our separate systems."

The goal of this change in the ordinance aims to protect separate systems such as the Alewife Brook and Mystic River from pollution by non-stormwater whereas sanitary water. Sanitary water is wastewater discharged from sinks, showers, and kitchens. For the city of Somerville, sanitary water is collected in separate pipes and goes to Deer Island for treatment. Another approved change allows the department of engineering to control erosion on construction sites larger than one acre.

Kushbu Webber from the Mayor's Office, Ben Waldrip and Jill Lathan of the Parks and Recreation Department, Hannah Pappenheim with the Law Department, and Eric Weisman of the Department of Public Works gathered with the Legislative Committee to discuss revisions to the Somerville Noise Ordinance. The request to discuss changes to the ordinance with specific attention to gas-powered leaf-blowers was approved.

Kushbu Weber broached request to ban gas-powered leaf-blowers in the city works saying; "one of the questions posed to the administration

was around the inventory of equipment that the administration utilizes relative to landscaping equipment and what are if any, impact would the addition of leaf blowers to the noise ordinance have on the administrations operations."

Eric Weisman stated that a ban on gas-powered leaf blowers for public works would have a significant impact on productivity. "If a typical park using standard leaf blowers took three hours to leaf-blow a park, we can expect it to take around six to eight with the specialized, low noise, leaf blowers." Another obstacle to banning gas-powered leaf blowers is the question of batteries which not only must be charged every thirty-to sixty minutes but also can be difficult to dispose of.

A request that the administration work with the committee of legislative matters to consider revisions to the Surveillance Technology ordinance was approved but the proposed general use policy was kept in the committee for further discussion. Councilor Ben Ewen-Campen stressed the importance of language in the ordinance that would ensure that surveillance technology is used solely for its specific purpose to prevent misuse.

"I wanted to have some kind of language that makes it clear that the surveillance technology can only be used for its specific purposes, for example, a license plate reader, a city iPad used for parking enforcement, clearly that is not to be used for any other purpose. Ewen-Campen elaborated stating that in any ordinance of surveillance moving forward, racial profiling must be strictly prohibited."

THE HOUSE AND SENATE. There were no roll ALSO UP ON BEACON HILL calls in the House or Senate last week.

This week, Beacon Hill Roll Call records local senators' votes on amendments to the "Mental Health ABC Act," aimed at making major changes in the mental health care system in Massachusetts. Supporters say the bill removes barriers to and expands access to mental health care, boosts the industry's workforce and strengthens the quality of coverage.

### PEDIATRIC MENTAL HEALTH CARE TASK FORCE (S 2519)

Senate 37-0, approved an amendment creating a pediatric mental health care task force to conduct a comprehensive analysis of the delivery of pediatric mental health services in the state and make recommendations to improve the availability, access and cost-effectiveness of these services.

Amendment supporters said there are thousands of children with treatable mental disorders who are not receiving proper mental health treatment and are falling through the cracks. They argued that the waiting period for a bed in an appropriate facility is too long and these kids are suffering.

(A "Yes" vote is for the amendment.)

### CONFIDENTIALITY FOR CORRECTIONS OF-**FICERS (S 2519)**

Senate 37-0, approved an amendment adding corrections officers to a current law that ensures confidentiality for police, fire, EMTs and other first responders who seek mental health service or referrals from a peer counselor.

"Adding correctional officers ... means they will be afforded the same protections as firefighters, police officers and EMTs when seeking confidential mental health assistance," said the amendment's sponsor Sen. Michael Moore (D-Millbury). "Those that work in corrections are subject to traumatic incidents on a routine basis, making access to confidential mental health treatment critical to efforts in preventing suicide among correction officers."

(A "Yes" vote is for the amendment.)

SUPPORTED DECISION-MAKING FOR SOME DISABLED ADULTS (H 4349) - The House gave initial approval to a bill that would empower people with disabilities to the extent possible to make their own informed life decisions with support from qualified and trusted individuals.

"[This bill makes the process] less cumbersome and more streamlined than a court appointed guardian and has been proven to allow the adults covered under the language to chart their own direction with appropriate guidance and support," said co-sponsor Rep. Paul Tucker (D-Salem).

I filed this legislation after meeting with advocates and individuals who would directly benefit and learning how this has worked well in other states," said co-sponsor Rep. Aaron Vega (D-Holyoke).

RAPE OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES (H 3427) - The House gave initial approval to a bill that creates a new crime of rape of a person with a disability and imposes up to a life prison sentence on a convicted offender.

"With this legislation in place, it will fill the gap in the statutory scheme by recognizing the increased vulnerability of a disabled person to predatory conduct," said Rep. Elizabeth Poirier (R-North Attleboro), the sponsor of the measure.

EQUAL ACCESS TO ORIGINAL BIRTH CER-TIFICATES (H 1892) - The House gave initial approval to legislation giving equal access to original birth certificates to all persons born in Massachusetts. Under current law, adoptees born between 1974 and 2008 are unable to obtain original birth certificates without a court order.

"This is a basic human right which many people are denied, that carries unintended consequences like making it harder to apply for a passport," said co-sponsor Rep. Sean Garballey (D-Arlington.) "This measure is supported by Concerned United Birthparents and similar legislation has just passed in New York."

**REPLACE "MENTALLY RETARD" WITH** "DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY" (H 4347) The House gave initial approval to a proposal that would

omy and ensure everyone, including low-income and other disadvantaged communities, can access clean solar power." — Sean Garren, Senior Director, Northeast for Vote Solar, a group fighting to lower solar costs and expand solar access.

"This funding provides an additional tool to help our Massachusetts tribes further their affordable housing goals." — David Tille, HUD New England Regional Administrator announcing that \$1.2 million in Indian Housing Block Grants will go to the Mashpee Wampanoag Tribe of Mashpee (\$813,474) and the Wampanoag Tribe of Gay Head (\$472,873) to carry out a range of affordable housing activities in their communities.

"Absent this funding, families are forced to make difficult and often dangerous choices to heat their homes. In many cases, they opt for an alternative approach such as a space heater, stove or fireplace, which increases the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning. Otherwise, they must make budgetary trade-offs that can jeopardize children's health, choosing heat over food or health care." — From a letter signed by more than 100 legislators urging the House and Senate to include \$15 million for fuel assistance in the fiscal 2020 supplemental budget.

"Employers have a duty to follow our child labor laws and protect their young employees. Wendy's came into compliance as a result of our investigation and took meaningful steps to ensure a safe and productive work environment for its young workers." - Attorney General Maura Healey announcing that the state reached a \$400,000 settlement with Wendy's that resolves allegations that the company violated Massachusetts child labor laws at its 46 corporate-owned locations across the state.

HOW LONG WAS LAST WEEK'S SESSION?

Beacon Hill Roll Call tracks the length of time that the House and Senate were in session each week. Many legislators say that legislative sessions are only one aspect of the Legislature's job and that a lot of important work is done outside of the House and Senate chambers. They note that their jobs also involve committee work, research, constituent work and other matters that are important to their districts. Critics say that the Legislature does not meet regularly or long enough to debate and vote in public view on the thousands of pieces of legislation that have been filed. They note that the infrequency and brief length of sessions are misguided and lead to irresponsible late-night sessions and a mad rush to act on dozens of bills in the days immediately preceding the end of an annual session.During the week of February 17-21, the House met for a total of 20 minutes while the Senate met for a total of 40 minutes.

### CHILDREN UNDER 22 (S 2519)

Senate 37-0, approved an amendment to ensure that individuals under the age of 22 in the emergency room who are in need of inpatient or residential psychiatric treatment are placed in an appropriate facility within 48 hours of admission to the emergency department.

"As the former chair of the Committee on Children, Families and Persons with Disabilities, I am especially sensitive to the urgency of taking care of our most vulnerable young people at a time when failing to treat them can exacerbate their issues and lead to their longer-term failure to thrive," said Sen. Joan Lovely (D-Salem). "I am pleased that my Senate colleagues unanimously voted to pass my amendment to ensure children under 22 receive appropriate emergency psychiatric treatment."

(A "Yes" vote is for the amendment.)

Sen. Patricia Jehlen Yes change language in state laws including replacing "mentally retarded" with "individuals with a developmental disability" and "handicapped" with "disability."

"This eagerly awaited bill, that I filed, would modern-Mo ize statutory language to better respect persons with intellectual or developmental disabilities," said Rep. Kay Khan (D-Newton). "We receive calls on the bill regu-Tue larly, people asking for respectful language that is essential for the dignity and humanity of all. H 4347 sends a strong message - that the commonwealth rejects outdated words that cause harm. These simple changes will move Massachusetts forward by using currently acceptable terminology and ensuring that all individuals are treated equally and fairly."

Using a sewing machine, Costa stitches different fabrics together after cutting them into geometric shapes of her liking. Then she embellishes with embroidery and detail work that she stitches by hand to add dimension and extra texture to the piece.

Many of the fabrics she uses have unique patterns or textures to add a certain flair or pop of color to the work, and Costa creates a blend of patterns in each piece. She says she adds her own style to very traditional quilting blocks by making her pieces asymmetrical and combining many different fabrics rather than the usual two or three.

"Before I sit down to sew I go through my fabric collection and pull together a number of pieces I think would go together but are different materials, patterns, and colors," Costa says. "Then I'll sit down and try to create as many collages out of that pile as I can. I really try to challenge myself to use these materials to create something that is different and will look different to people."

"It's a really great show," says local photographer Stan Eichner. "She's come to this relatively recently, and yet she makes many powerful pieces which are interesting as a group but also each one is enticing and attractive on its own."

Costa's collection at the Somerville Media Center features seventeen pieces ranging from eight-by-eight inches to eight-by-twelve inches. She says she focuses more on the fabric than the design, and each piece requires a few hours of work depending on the size, complexity, and process. She says, "Sometimes I'll be really inspired and can create three or four pieces in five or six hours, but other times it can take me weeks to create three or four pieces. A lot of it really depends on the creative vibe. Sometimes it will be really quick, but often it's just about the creative process and where I'm at."

Costa says that each piece in her collection has a story. A few of the collages are made from old ties, and Costa likes to imagine that each tie brings its own story to the art, like when it was worn to family dinners or important events. "I think that this idea that stories and a connection to the past through an art piece is



important," she says.

### Simple Asparagus

As a kid during the 1970's, I couldn't stand asparagus. The reason, asparagus was served out of a can, at least in my home, yuck!

One of the staples, usually on a Saturday, was an asparagus and egg frittata. Just picture mushy with some hard chewy watered down gray colored nastiness spread throughout the frittata. I would save up my allowance to treat myself on a Saturday for a delicious burger at the Stephen James House, or a luncheon special of chicken chow mein, chicken fingers, rice and crab rangoon at Yee's Village. Sorry for the digression. Preheat oven to 400°. Prepare the asparagus by cutting off the woody ends, about 2 inches from the bottom. For extra tender asparagus, using a vegetable peeler, peel the lower third around the whole stalk of all the asparagus. Place on a sheet pan. Add the olive oil and coat the asparagus. Add the salt and pepper and toss until evenly coated. Place the sheet pan in the preheated oven and set timer for 7 minutes.

Once the asparagus is done, it should be bright green and still have some texture to it. Add some lemon zest and a squeeze of lemon juice. Orange



Now I must say this vegetable has made it to one of my top favorites. A truly corrective emotional experience.

1-2 Bunches of Asparagus, Medium Thickness

2-4 Tablespoons Olive oil
3/4-1-1/2 Teaspoon Kosher Salt
1/2-1 Teaspoon Pepper
Lemon Zest and Juice
Maldon Flaked Sea Salt, optional

zest and juice may be substituted.

Feel free to add shaved Parmesan cheese when serving. Or add some flaked Maldon sea salt for finishing. If you really want to make it decadent, add poached eggs and add hollandaise sauce over the top for a special breakfast. I even use leftover asparagus for a salad topping. Your options are endless.

# Somerville paraprofessionals rally for fair contract

Chanting vociferously and carrying signs, throngs of rallying individuals flooded the meeting room for the Somerville School Committee at 8 Bonair Street, on February 24. The community members were standing up for the rights of paraprofessionals who work in Somerville schools, asking for a new contract that would grant them fair pay and job security.

"While we are talking about respect for paraprofessionals, you are describing them as part time employees. The gap between us has never felt wider," said Rami Bridge, president of the Somerville Teachers Association, speaking before the School Committee during public comment period. "Right here is an opportunity to prioritize investment in fair wages and to strategically invest in our schools."

The rally in support of paraprofessionals began at the basketball court of the East Somerville Community School. Speakers testified to the importance of paraprofessionals in schools, stating that programs would not be able to run without them. The gathering of teachers, paraprofessionals, and union organizers marched through the streets of East Somerville before arriving at the School Committee meeting, where they lined up to speak in protest of unfair work conditions.


The Somerville Teachers Asociation (STA) and the School Committee have been in the process of negotiating for a new contract, as the last paraprofes-

2019. The STA is proposing a contract that will call for three main provisions, an increase in salary, permanent status after four years of work, and a twoyear length for the contract. Currently, the starting salary of a paraprofessional is \$20,680, which is not a living wage, said Bridge. Many paraprofessionals have to work a second or third job to supplement this income. The STA is asking to raise the minimum salary to \$25,000. Paraprofessionals have little job security, as they must wait for a new letter hiring them back at the end of each school year. The new contract would guarantee their position, after working at the same job for four consecutive years. The STA is also asking for a two-year contract so that paraprofessionals will be able to negotiate at the same time as teachers.

The School Committee has responded to these demands by saying that the plan "costs too much," said Bridge. When the School Committee did not receive a response to its counter proposal, as there was not enough time during the negotiating session "to meaningfully discuss it," the School Committee filed for mediation, according to Bridge. The two parties do not engage in a face-to-face way, said STA vice president Megan Brady, a situation that is not ideal.

"When I look at this whole process, the School Committee routinely professes, both in writing and in public meetings, that they value the work of paraprofessionals, but that they just don't have it in their budget to pay them a starting salary of \$25,000. To me, your budget is your values," said Brady. "To say there's not the money, that it costs too much to pay the paraprofessionals, is also a reflection of who or what they value."

During the rally, speakers attested to the impact paraprofessionals have in their communities. Erika Uyterhoeven, who is running for state representative serving Somerville, stated that teachers "are on the frontline for saving public education." Councilor at large Will Mbah called the situation an issue of equity, noting that most individuals present at the rally were women and people of color. City council president Matt McLaughlin, who also sits on the School Committee, said that city money has been funneled into many projects that are not as important as the rights of paraprofessionals. The role of paraprofessionals has changed throughout the years, said chair of the Contract Action Team Margaret Whittier-Ferguson. In the classroom, paraprofessionals are responsible for everything from serving as translators for students who do not speak English as a first language to helping students with special needs. They work in tandem with teachers but are more than teaching assistants, said Bridge. While the teaching format may have been more "top down" in former years, today, the learning environment has changed. Children are more likely to be interacting with each other and engaging in small groups, said Bridge.

The process of pushing for a fair contract for paraprofessionals will continue, as the mediation schedule moves forward. The STA and the School Committee have one meeting planned for March and a pair of dates in May. Going forward, Bridge said that it is clear that the needs of paraprofessionals are not going to disappear. "When we went to the School Committee last time, 100 people who were not in the union were there, speaking in support of the paraprofessionals, speaking to the value they bring to the schools, speaking to the important role they played in their children's lives. I think that that is going to continue. I don't think that that is going to go away," said Bridge."Our position is that educator working conditions are student learning conditions. Incentivizing paraprofessionals

to go back to school and become more educated benefits students. Providing job security and a higher pay will keep more paraprofessionals in the district who are working with our students, as opposed to leaving."

# Now is the time for a Somerville-Everett footbridge

While the Encore Casino has been open and operating for several months now, the discussion about a transportation link between Somerville and Everett has recently reignited after Encore leadership floated the idea of gondola over the Mystic River. Somerville has been clear about our vision for accessibility and connectivity around the Lower Mystic basin, but we've had serious concerns about a footbridge connecting our community to the then-proposed casino. With the new proposal, now is a good time to think holistically about our region's transportation needs.

My vision for the Lower Mystic basin is simple: a complete, continuous network of safe walking and bicycling routes along and across our river. For 20 years I've worked in partnership with activists and advocates, state agencies and municipalities, nonprofit and for-profit entities to achieve this vision. And as a region, we've made great progress in the last few years.

Thanks to Governor Baker and his administration, our region received nearly \$14 million to complete the Northern Strand/ Bike to the Sea Trail, which currently runs from just beyond the casino in Everett, through Malden, Revere, Saugus, and to the Lynn line. The planned extension will extend the trail through Lynn to Nahant Beach. Last year MassDOT completed high quality biking and walking trails on the Woods Memorial Bridge (Route 16) over the Malden River.

In 2018 the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) rehabilitated the paths at MacDonald Park in Medford. And in 2020 we should see the completion of the MBTA/ DCR pathway connecting the Alford Street Bridge (Route 99) to Draw 7 State Park in Somerville. And I continue to advocate for protected bike facilities on the Wellington Bridge (Route 28) that connects Somerville to our partner communities and open spaces along the Mystic River.

Given how much work has been done to improve regional bike and pedestrian infrastructure, now is the time to revisit the need for a footbridge between Draw 7 State Park in Somerville and the Northern Strand trail in Everett. Many years ago, advocates suggested the need for a pedestrian/bicycle river crossing in this area to support a future path network. At that time, there was no development happening on the Everett side of the river in this area, and limited funding available for the project.

Then the casino came. I'll admit that I was skeptical and even opposed when Encore suggested building a footbridge connecting the Assembly Square Orange Line stop with the casino. At the time, it would have mainly served as an amenity for the casino – an easy way to get people from the MBTA to the gambling floor. But with more connections built out, the footbridge wouldn't just funnel transit riders to Encore; it would be an important link in a regional transit network.

So how do we make it happen? There's a lot to be said for private investment in public infrastructure. In Assembly Square, Somerville's private sector partners not only helped build the MBTA Orange Line station, they helped construct the magnificent boardwalk connection under the Route 28/Wellington Bridge, the Baxter State Park pathways, and the path from Sullivan Square to Great River Road. I'm not about to pretend that the folks at Assembly made this investment purely altruistically, but we were able to work with them to get improvements that were good for them and good for Somerville.

Encore could be a partner too. I'm no fan of the gaming economy, but the voters of Massachusetts spoke at the ballot box and my side was forced to focus on mitigating the impacts of the new casino. Among many mitigation measures required of the developer, they were required initiate a design process for a walking and bicycling bridge that connects Everett to Somerville. Encore has gone much further than was required of them, which I applaud. They paid to complete the design of an elegant, useful bridge structure that would serve the entire region. They performed complex permitting tasks and have secured more than a dozen federal, state and local permits for the bridge construction. They shared these designs at public meetings, and received rounds of applause from our residents and stakeholders.

Hopefully, we can work together to make that plan a reality. If Encore again wants to go above and beyond and also build an aerial gondola in addition to the footbridge, that wouldn't be a bad thing. But my priority will always remain transportation solutions that benefit the entire region, not just the casino.

Our region needs the bridge to be constructed, and we need it now. We can figure this out. I'm calling for our public and private stakeholders to focus on the bridge in 2020, to articulate a funding strategy, and to continue the generational progress we've made in the Lower Mystic communities.



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

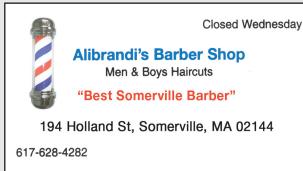

# **'XXX Poems'** By Raquel Balboni

Raquel Balboni butters her readers with luscious phrases and salted cream stanzas in her first book entitled *XXX Poems*. She churns her verses with naked abandon in an avant-garde display of unabashed kisses ingrained with unabashed cravings.

In her poem *Girl in the Picture*, Balboni meditates on the smallness or largeness of things. A blue landscape forwards into a sweetness of bright and sunny days. But, inside, weather refugees fog up windows and mark a certain heart sickness as the world's evolution inexorably continues, offering ancient songs to those avoiding the snow. The movement through the piece turns upbeat and centers on the power of the pictured girl. With a spreadable touch Balboni leads her readers into the largeness of her tableau this way,

A guideline in the blue landscape

feels like a small room that feels giant because everything is

blue.

There is no distinguisher of the shapes or walls of the room. The

blue dominates.

Leopards move outside in the dust hills

away from the means to be certain direction of translation when

the stars the moon and the sun are certain of other things.

of other things.

*Funny Place*, Balboni's poem of winking admonishments, leads its reader into a definable destination before assailing him or her with the sharp edges of extraneous, even alien images. Once set into the piece, the sharp edges become part of an overriding two-dimensional poetic cubism with its own logic. A stone altar, borrowed from nature, centers other religious implications in this strange, angularly sensual, funhouse. Consider these lines,

Over a table of stone from the edge of the forest where the

vines made you bleed

A stone from there cast upon a four legged standing statue

full of ice and dark like sleeplessness on a bus for far too long walking in the city with long hair the sky is predicted to come out tomorrow to sing a weeping lullaby my skin feels like it is moving as i crawl out from my own throat i can see the otherside of trust when i stand on the tip of my big tooth

Accept, a poem of self-recognition and indulgence, drizzles onto the page in distinct moments. In this geometric world that Balboni creates alertness is everything. The poet's protagonist flourishes by mingling with timelessness and the tolerance of night. She ignores limits. In the end the intimate details coalesce,

The night is pleasant and inside a blend of time limits A grey braid and a purple coat, trying hard not to notice the

differences

Because the pot of honey is translucent anyway, the sun shows

behind the slow drip

Staying here with her much longer and coming home to long

fingers

staying here until everything matches

Obsession sneaks into the lover like an unwritten poem. It expands, takes odd turns and seeks to control a universe of desire. Balboni's piece entitled *She* details such a compulsion. Mystery and secrecy conspire against the determined lover, creating delusions along the way. The narrator consumes bits of knowledge about the object of her affection hungrily: where she goes, what she wears, the books she reads. In the end sagacity prevails. The poet's persona finds a certain serenity but bemoans the inescapable,

all I wanted was to see her up close

to see the way her arms blended with her neck

the sweet creamy skin, the smooth organ so there and soft

although it seemed my eyes played tricks on me when i looked

at all

never will  $i \mbox{ be allowed to follow her into the secret woods}$ 

like a magic trick you ask how but never want to know the mess in realizing nothing is as special as it may seem in the blissful dank smell of moving soil peace is left to be

Beware the unsatisfied praying mantis. Or pity her in her sleeplessness and attempts to connect, not by preying, but by praying. Balboni's poem *Praying Angel Insomnia* kisses and tells. Initial sexual innuendos take flight as mystical and transcendent flame, a white light of longing. Her persona flees the indifferent world. She craves connections from ritual magic, the angelic type (I think). Here the poet's persona contemplates abandonment,

Angel in a field oh my darlin a black and white ghostly film grain oh my darling, coffee cup How can you quibble with midnight coffee? Balboni clearly delights in coffee (in this as well as other poems), among other bedside pleasures. Her poem *City and Awake* mesmerizes with a slow delineation of image and passion beginning with her black coffee, through her meditations on cutlery and monkeys, and finally love. The poem opens thusly,

with midnight coffee by my bedside i got invited to a poetry party that i did not go to poetry in my fade parade operating this body this tool this wave on the morning bedside: green juice, black coffee in a monkey mug & in the constellations mug prove it worthy a restless time to consider the cleanest cup

Don't underestimate restlessness in a poet. And especially don't underestimate Raquel Balboni and her "wakey wakey," caffeine-powered, poetic kisses. They are top drawer.

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
