

# Intersection redesign construction detour poses certain challenges

The City of Somerville held a public meeting last Wednesday to review plans for the redesign of the Powder House Boulevard and Alewife Brook Parkway intersection. Among the 70 residents in attendance, many were concerned about safety during construction.

The new intersection will feature a signalized T-shaped design with a side road for residential and emergency use only. Plans also include improvements to mobility, 22 new trees (following 6 removed trees), and better storm and sewer drain systems.

Crews are to begin work in less than two weeks with an expected completion date set for summer 2024. Streetscapes Senior Project Continued on page 4

> "Remember the guy that sharpened knives and scissors, the rag man, the fruit and vegetable truck that came to the neigh


ing ice cream, popsicles and such."

# Intersection redesign construction detour poses certain challenges

Manager, Rebecca Wright, says some work is already underway, including tree removals and protections. "Next week, the team will be out to perform some test pits [and to set up] erosion control, followed by underground utility work," Wright said.

The project requires a 24/7 detour at the intersection of Alewife and Broadway, until the end of summer 2023. At one point, Powder House Boulevard will be completely closed in both directions. The city did not disclose a timeframe on the complete closure. Thoroughfares for bikers and walkers, however, will remain viable throughout the construc-

Plans for the redesign come after city officials designated the

intersection a high crash location, with 48 crashes occurring at the site between 2014 and 2021. And while the reenvisioned intersection is safer, many Somerville residents were concerned about safety in the interim period.

The 24/7 detour diverts traffic from the closed portion of southbound Alewife onto Broadway. At an intersection mediated only by a stop light, multiple residents asked whether the city was planning to add any auxiliary signals. Residents questioned whether the simple stoplight at the detour could handle the increase in traffic, turning left across Alewife onto Broadway.

Following this community input, the city will look at improving safety at the Broadway-Ale-



# Two Somerville High School students recognized for national achievements

The Somerville Public Schools and Somerville High School administration are incredibly proud to honor two Somerville High School students who recently received academic recognition at the national level, in competition with top national and international high school peers. SHS Junior Ian Born, and SHS Senior Julian Bresler,

were both recently recognized for their respective outstanding academic achievements.

Ian Born (class of 2024) won a gold medal for his social science research paper as part of the Alpha Scholars program through Harvard International Review at Harvard University. The rigorous Alpha Scholars Social Science Research Program teaches college-level research, writing, and presentation skills to high school students in support of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

Students work one-on-one with Harvard University undergraduate mentors in advanced study and research, and their work culminates in a research paper and presentation. Ian's paper,

"Success Factors for Desalination: Qualitative Case Studies of Desalination Around the World," discusses the use of the desalination process as part of a multifaceted policy solution for water security by analyzing three successfully and three unsuccessfully implemented existing plants. His paper was published and is available on the Harvard Internation-

al Review website.

Michael Maloney, science teacher and Science League Team mentor, commended Ian for his work ethic and dedication. "Ian has a quick mind and does extremely well in class, working to fully understand the material. # **MAPS** vaccinates more than 2,500 community members against COVID-19

The Massachusetts Alliance of Portuguese Speakers (MAPS) has vaccinated more than 2,500 community members at its weekly COVID-19 vaccination clinics. The weekly clinics promoted at MAPS offices and other key community locations such as churches, community centers, and social clubs, aim to promote health equity by reaching underserved community members facing barriers to accessing COVID-19 vaccination.

"We are proud of our team for having succeeded in bringing essential COVID-19 vaccines to thousands of community members in areas where they are still not easily available", said MAPS Chief Program Officer (CPO) Alirio Pereira, MA. "We are grateful for this partnership with the Massachusetts DPH which allows us to further our mission of building healthy communities."

MAPS offers Moderna first and second doses of COVID-19 vaccines and the bivalent booster shots. The new booster protects against the original COVID-19 virus and the Omicron variants. Vaccination is available for community members 18 years old and older, and appointments are not required. \$75 gift cards are available for those receiving their shot at the MAPS vaccination clinics in February. From March on, community members



will receive \$25 gift cards.

# Gentle Giants

It has been called a buffalo, a steer, a cow, a bison or a bull, but for the familiar, this gentle giant's name is simply, the Ox. The first English livestock arrived in her American settlements in the 1630's, most being brought to the sprouting Massachusetts Bay Colony in the north.



When you refer to an acre, it is the term that was created to describe the work that oxen did in one day. As a draught animal, the ox became a favorite in clearing thousands of acres of brush, trees and notably her New England rocks. After being plowed to the surface and hauled aside, these stones were used to assemble her historic walls. It is said that the length of New England's many stone walls could equal the distance to the moon.



During the great migration west, the thousands of heavy wagons used to get there were primarily drawn by oxen. Although slower, they were cheaper to buy and feed and calmer and stronger than horses. Through the years, Somerville was witness to oxen treading up and down Milk

Row hauling her wagons and helping build her commerce. The word oxford means ox-crossing. Prince Charles once considered the name of Oxford for Continued on page 11

our city of Boston. He might have been thinking of his own Oxford, the site of the oldest English-speaking University in the world.

The first European settler of Boston was Reverend William Blackstone. He was considered a recluse or hermit by onlookers of the day. After selling his land, which became today's Boston Common, he relocated to today's Rhode Island, becoming that state's first English settler. One of his eccentricities was that he traveled on the back of his trained ox. A steel statue in Pawtucket, Rhode Island honors him and his cherished ox.

It was a fifty-six-day, oxen-driven operation through forests, swamps, ice and deep snow in the dead of the winter of 1775-76. Revolutionary Colonel Henry Knox and his men retrieved 59 heavy canons captured from Fort Ticonderoga and delivered them to Cobble Hill and other

sites where they helped motivate the British Evacuation of Boston. His volunteers and oxen hauled 120,000 pounds of bulky ordnance three hundred miles for the American cause. It was one of the greatest logistical feats of the American Revolution.

The giant lumberjack folk hero Paul Bunyan and stories of his giant companion Babe the Blue Ox have circulated across America for over a century. Through the years, from Maine to California, logging and lumbering locales promoted their areas with images of larger-than-life statues of the two friends.

The Middlesex Canal was the super highway of its time. This 26-mile-long canal flowed through the length of Somerville. Beginning in 1803 and for over fifty years, it carried the historic waters of the Concord River. Much of this incredible work was done by oxen.

The Bunker Hill Monument commemorates the first major battle of the American Revolu-



tion and honors the patriots who gave their lives. It's a 221-foot granite quarried obelisk with a 294-step winding staircase to the top. Most of its 7,000 tons were hauled 12 miles from Quincy to the site by oxen.

Somerville's central library was designed by E.T., not the Extra Terrestrial, but by architect Edward Lippincott Tilton. He also developed part of the United States Immigration Station at Ellis Island. Somerville's library architecturally mirrors part of that facility. Tilton incorporated in the library a bold decorative band of Roman-style ox heads which surround the outside of the building.

A Western Massachusetts family has a huge following on social media of their twelve-year old 3,000-pound Gentle Giant Ox named Tommy who was named after the six-time Super Bowl champion, Tom Brady.

These gentle giants remained the main beast of burden in America until the late 19th century when horses, mules and steam engines replaced them.



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

# Review of 'The Art of Burning'

A new play by Kate Snodgrass

The Huntington Theater has staged the world premiere of Kate Snodgrass' *The Art of Burning* at the Calderwood Theater at the Boston Center for the Arts. Directed by Melia Bensussen, the Artistic Director of the Hartford Stage, the play moves to Hartford at the end of its run in Boston, giving audiences all over southern New England plenty of opportunity to enjoy being among the first to embrace this great new drama.

The play runs a rapid-fire 90 minutes without intermission. It opens in a legal office with Patricia and her divorce mediator waiting for Jason, Patricia's estranged husband, so they can all sign the agreement ending the marriage. Beth, their 15-year-old daughter, has become the final sticking point in arriving at a settlement. Mark, the lawyer, has a long-standing friendship with Jason, as Patricia does with Mark's wife Charlene, relationships that reveal different approaches to the compromises that sustain – and sometimes break – a marriage.

Snodgrass opens *The Art of Burning* with Patricia recalling for Mark a play she'd seen the night before with Charlene, a production of *Medea*. Patricia defends Medea's murder of her own children as the only ways to protect them from a worse fate. Mark regards this as a sick choice. Given the vulnerability of Beth, on the cusp of adulthood in a world that seems uncertain about the rights of women, the play renders the monsters of *Medea* as extremely real to Patricia, asking what responsibility she bears to protect Beth.

Snodgrass and Bensussen have chosen to temporally jumble the narrative, revealing bits of the backstory – from how Patricia and Jason met to the ambiguous certainty between Mark and Charlene – at crucial moments of the negotiations. Rather than upsetting the narrative of *The Art of Burning*, the jumping back and forth in time holds the plays together with remarkable insights into the characters and their motivations. With the exception of Beth, the characters have no costume changes, and the minimal set changes keep the focus on the dramat-



ic resolution. Bensussen uses some remarkable strip lighting, built into the set, to enhance the emotional tug in key scenes.

The Art of Burning is also deeply funny. Every scene includes laughter, often stemming from the cluelessness of the characters. When Patricia tries to explain her concerns over Beth's emergence into the adult world, Mark asks, as though he's hip to contemporary social revolutions, "Are we talking about micro-aggressions?"


Adrianne Krstansky does a remarkable job with the role of Patricia, resolving what seems to begin as a portrayal of an unstable woman into that of a committed parent. The other performances delineate the characters with sympathy and precision. Clio Contogenis, in a relatively minor role, captures both the audience and the teenaged Beth with passion and depth.

An odd misstep in the program provided the only negative note. The fraction of an interview with Kate Snodgrass left a false impression of the play. I recommend either not reading it at all before seeing the play.

Kate Snodgrass served as the Artistic Director of Boston Playwrights' Theater for several decades and taught in Boston University MFA playwrighting program for just as long. Melia Bensussen has taught directing at Emerson College for many years. The cast includes professors and instructors from Brandeis, Suffolk and BU, so the atmosphere at the Calderwood Pavilion overspread a scent of homecoming. I hope that joyful feeling transfers to the Hartford Stage for its March 2 debut there. Riding on the strength of the *The Art of Burning* and its production, it should.
