


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Lyndell's, a bakery steeped in history

Opened 135 years ago, Lyndell's Bakery has been a staple of Ball Square for more than a century. Known as the "Godfather" of scratch bakeries in all of New England, the small local bakery has become renowned.

Its current owner, Bill Galatis, has owned the bakery for the last 23 years and is the fourth person to ever own the bakery. From Lyndell's treats as a kid to the COVID pandemic, we sat down with Galatis to talk about Lyndell's history and his time as the owner of one of the oldest bakeries in New England.

Birger C. Lyndell, a Swedish immigrant, opened Lyndell's in 1887, seven years after coming to the United States. The bakery has survived everything from rationing during World War II to various ownership changes.

Galatis, born and raised in East Somerville, just down the street from Lyndell's, Continued on page 4

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Free walk-in flu and COVID-19 vaccination clinics continue through March

The City of Somerville continues to host weekly walk-in vaccination clinics for residents through the end of March, with both flu vaccines and the bivalent Moderna COVID-19 booster available. Clinics will take place each Wednesday from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. at the City Hall Annex, 50 Evergreen Ave., through March 29.

The City's COVID-19 booster appointments are open to individuals aged six years and older, at least two months after their last dose. The city's flu vaccine appointments are open to everyone aged



six months and older. The flu vaccine and the updated COVID-19 booster dose are provided at no cost, regardless of health insurance or immigration status.

Advance registration is recommended to save time but not required. Pre-register online at somervillema.gov/vaccineclinics or by calling 311 (617-666-3311). Flu vaccines and updated COVID-19 boosters are also available at many pharmacies and other locations. Find a provider at vaccines.gov.

Free COVID-19 test kits also continue to be available by request at all Somerville public libraries, at City Hall, and at the City Hall Annex.

Not so sweet smell of larceny

Somerville Police officers were dispatched to Sephora at Assembly Row last week on a report of a shoplifting in progress.

While en route, dispatch informed the officers that the suspect had left the store and loss prevention was following him.

When the officers arrived

on scene, they were met by the loss prevention officer who told them that the suspect was now in the Reebok store and that he had stolen at least thirteen bottles of cologne.

The loss prevention officer led the officers inside the store and pointed to the suspect, later identified as Kenny Rivie.

The officers were able to clearly see inside the yellow shopping bag Rivie was carrying and that it was filled with cologne. His jacket was also stuffed with square and rectangle objects consistent with the shape of cologne.

The officers asked Kenny if he

had a receipt for the cologne, to which he replied, "No."

The officers placed Kenny under arrest and handcuffed him. After searching him, they were able to recover twenty-six bottles of cologne.

The officers radioed for the transport wagon and Kenny was

transported to the Somerville Police Department to be booked on a charge of larceny over \$1200.

The property was returned to the Sephora loss prevention officer and he was able to print out an inventory receipt of the cologne which totaled \$4,110.81.

spoke fondly of his childhood memories of the bakery.

"My mom, who was a working mom in the '60s, used to tell myself and my two younger sisters at the time, 'Get your homework done on Saturday, clean up, get in front of the TV to watch The Jackie Gleason Show by 8:00 o'clock and you'll get your treat from Lyndell's," Galatis said.

Then in 1999, the bakery was put up for sale by former own-

ers Herman and Janet Kett who owned Lyndell's since 1968. By now, Galatis owned various restaurants and Dunkin' Donuts across Boston. Once he bought the bakery his mom had a particular reaction.

"She was overwhelmed, she was thrilled. She said, 'You don't know anything about the bakery business," Galatis said, "So I said, 'Well, that's true, but I have enough business experience in

the industry."

Like many businesses across the United States, the COVID pandemic was a cataclysmic event, but for Lyndell's this period of time was one of hardship. But according to Galatis, the bakery was suffering before the pandemic as the bridge that connects Ball Square to the rest of Somerville was closed for the construction of the Green Line Extension.

Now that the new Green Line Extension and its stop at Ball Square are now open, the benefits of it have been felt greatly by Lyndell's.

"The first day it opened, we gave away a free cup of coffee and a donut just so people who don't realize that we were there could now realize that we were there. According to our staff, they said that they saw some faces in there for the first time," Galatis said.

"At this moment, the opening of the Ball Square T stop has been a plus for us."

After owning the bakery for 23 years, Galatis hopes to continue providing great service to his consumers for the next 23 years, and with the decades of experience his bakers have, this high level of quality is easy to maintain.

"We do things the old-fashioned way and it still counts," Galatis said.

Happy Birthday SOMERVILLE!

This past week on the third of March she turned a sprightly 181 years young. It is said that the Egyptians were the first to start the practice of honoring anniversaries and birth dates. Before that time, people didn't always acknowledge the date of their birth. The Greeks were next to follow, adding religious candles to the day of remembrance, and the Romans later celebrated not only the birth of their gods but also the birth of the common man. The Germans later brought sweet treats to the party.



In this country and the world, the American Bald Eagle is unhesitatingly identified as a patriotic symbol of our nation's independence and freedom. Its majestic image can be found in Somerville as in other cities on our government buildings and at patriotic celebrations. The eagle covers its terrain by displaying itself in our illustrations, on our coins and stamps, surmounting our statues, and perching itself atop our flag poles.



Many eagle-embossed memorials have been created throughout our city. They salute the sufferings endured and the sacrifices its citizens made throughout its history. These sacrifices were realized by men and women from native born to new arrivals and make up the international patchwork quilt

that is who we are.



Somerville man found guilty of charges related to Capitol breach

A Somerville man was found guilty in the District of Columbia of felony and misdemeanor charges for his actions during the Jan. 6, 2021, Capitol breach. His actions and the actions of others disrupted a joint session of the U.S. Congress convened to ascertain and count the electoral votes related to the presidential election.

Noah Bacon, 29, of Somerville, was found guilty after a trial in U.S. District Court on Thursday, March 2, of obstruction of an official proceeding, a felony, and the misdemeanor charges of entering or remaining in a restricted building or grounds, disorderly or disruptive conduct in a restricted building, entering and remaining in the gallery of either House of Congress, disorderly or disruptive conduct in a Capitol building, and parading, demonstrating, or picketing in a



Capitol building. The jury reached unanimous verdicts on all counts. A sentencing hearing is scheduled for June 14, 2023.

According to the government's evidence, on January 6, 2021, Bacon was among a mob of rioters illegally on the Capitol grounds. He entered the Capitol Building at approximately 2:15 p.m., through the Senate Wing Door, and remained inside for about 50 minutes. While inside the building, Bacon moved through areas including the Crypt, Hall of Columns, Rotunda, the East Rotunda Door vestibule area, the Senate Gallery, and the Senate Chamber where he sat for approximately 10 minutes.

While in the East Rotunda Door vestibule area, Bacon attempted to keep the breached door open as other rioters streamed inside. He also used a "Don't Tread on Me" flag to cover a security camera before using the stairwell to move to the Senate Gallery hallway. After rioters prevented United States Capitol Police officers from securing the galleries, he entered an unlocked senate gallery. Bacon was arrested on June 30, 2021, in Somerville.

The charge of obstruction of an official proceeding and aiding and abetting carries a statutory maximum of twenty years imprisonment. The five misdemeanor offenses carry a combined statutory maximum of three and half years of imprisonment. All charges carry potential financial penalties. The court will determine any sentence after considering the U.S. Sentencing Guidelines and other statutory factors. The case is being prosecuted by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia. Valuable assistance was provided by the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Massachusetts.

Honoring Sal

This Saturday, so many present and former Somerville folks will gather to honor and commemorate an icon of progressive politics in our city. Sal Albano, who died recently, will be celebrated on March 11, his birthday. Sal was all about building a fair and liveable Somerville, about giving back and standing up for what is right and just.

As you would expect, not all Somerville residents remember when Sal was a figure in city government here. Maybe even fewer knew him as a neighborhood activist and organizer. Sal was often the first to understand our community's unmet needs. His response was to work towards solutions, always with the input of those affected and with lived experience.

Growing up in Somerville meant you were stereotyped by many outside of the city as troubled, families were reluctant to have their kids visit you at home for fear of safety. East Somerville was worse off than the rest of the city - it had a higher poverty rate, few services, such as health and food - the neighborhood still fights for fairness. East was cut off from easy access by the McGrath, the barrier of I-93 yet our strong interpersonal commitment and ties bound us together and created a strong sense of community.



Sal Albano provided the drive that brought together people who felt excluded and marginalized. He organized a community to have the confidence to push for change. But he did so in his unassuming way - one friendship, one kindness at a time.

I first met Sal Albano at the Teen Center that was above the old Broadway theater in East Somerville (it's Mudflat studio now). Though I had grown up in that neighborhood, I was still very young - shy, awkward, and unsure about how to fit in. Sal was the leader at the Teen Center and he made the transition easy and fun for me - he taught me how to play ping pong!

Sal was fierce about injustice. He could see how city neglect caused widespread problems. Yet he didn't assume that he had all the answers - Sal listened to what neighbors, clergy, teachers, and service providers had to say about the difficulties and dangers in their lives.

This way of being a leader was the first thing I learned from Sal (well, maybe after ping pong.) His generous outreach got scores of people involved in getting the city government to pay attention to our voices. His life was a model for compassionate leadership that didn't back down from official indifference or resistance.

Sal got my whole family involved, as did his family, in the movement for reforms in Somerville. We worked together to get a healthcare clinic in underserved East Somerville. When most Somerville elected officials supported the construction of I-93; we stood together and opposed the demolition of our neighbors' homes, the pollution and the blatant environmental injustice. We fought for rent control and were successful. We were the first to demand a progressive city, a sanctuary city- welcoming all.

I was proud to work with my family and neighbors on these efforts, and on Sal's political campaigns which grew out of them. The call for change that started in East Somerville had become a city-wide movement, bringing people together to discover they had the same goals. Eventually we started electing other leaders like Sal, who started to turn our neglected city around.

On March 11, Sal's birthday, we will gather to honor Sal. His legacy of progress still prevails! Sal was larger than life not just because of his grand stature but because of his warm loving heart.

Trance Ending Times: Reimagining Life Beyond A-Z

As a young college student, Neal Klein was confused about what to do. He had failed two classes and knew his major was not for him. Looking at his transcript, Klein noticed he had one B, which was in psychology. At that point, Klein began his journey in that field.

Holistic psychology is what Neal Klein researches, teaches, and lives. He describes it as "life philosophy. "Holistic psychology focuses on different areas of a person and how they are interconnected. For example, a holistic counselor will examine their clients' spiritual, environmental, psychological, and physical characteristics. Also, Klein has authored two books centered around holistic psychology. Recently Klein has been trying to reach new audiences with his YouTube channel Trance-Ending Times (http://www.trance-endingtimes.com/), with over 200 subscribers.

What drew him into psychology was his deep curiosity to understand human behavior. However, he was rejected from six different graduate schools before he decided to take a break. He decided to take a gap year and work as a freelance photographer.

Boston University graduate school accepted him. Part of his

graduate program was working as an assistant teacher, where he found his calling to be a professor. He became an assistant professor of holistic psychology at Lesley University in Cambridge, Massachusetts. As a professor, Klein focused on counseling, holistic health, and cross-cultural psychology. He would later work as a full-time professor and have his own private counseling practice for over 30 years.

While working as a professor, Klein has formed great bonds with his students. David Roos, a graduate of Lesley University and Klein's former student, credited Klein for being the most impactful professor he has had. Roos said, "Klein is a Continued on page 13

Naval Academy's Memorial is the oldest military monument in America and commemorates the sailors who died in the Tripolitan War. It has been alternately referred to as the Tripoli Monument, the Naval Monument, or the Somers Monument which honors our city's namesake,

Master Commandant Richard Somers.

- The tallest Somerville memorial is the eagle-clad Amelia Earhart Dam on the Mystic River. It honors both the famous aviator and women's rights.
- + The **oldest** Somerville memorial is the 1863 eagle-crowned

Civil War Monument. This was the first Civil War memorial in the nation and is located at the Milk Row Cemetery on Somerville Avenue. The names of 68 Somerville volunteers who fought and died to keep our nation united are listed there.

• The greatest Somerville me-

morial, in my opinion, is the city itself. Its eagle-shaped border was created when it separated from Charlestown on March 3, 1842. It is 4.2 square miles, making it the largest eagle in America, soaring and greeting people from across the nation.

professor who truly cares about building relationships with students, and it comes through in how he speaks with them and not at them." Roos said Klein often tells his students to call him Neal instead of Dr. Klein, creating a comfortable and open class environment.

Cacky Mellor was just a senior in high school when she met Klein during orientation day at Lesley University while he was presenting the holistic psychology program. He left a great impression on Mellor and became her mentor, so much so that she said that Klein inspired her work now as a professor at Lesley University and as the person she is today.

One of the things Mellor enjoyed most was class discussion. She said, "In class, he always wanted students to take what they learned and apply those tools to their lives." Mellor noted that Klein wanted to see what impassioned his students. He wanted to embolden them with tools of holistic psychology rather than lecturing in class concerning what he believed.

Klein incorporates experiential learning into the courses he instructs. He described one assignment where students teach concepts from his self-authored textbook, Me, Myself and Mindfulness, to their friends and family. This assignment aims to take the ideas the students learn inside the classroom and helps them share the knowledge with other people.

Besides his work as a holistic psychology professor, Klein is also well-known for teaching

West Coast Swing dance courses. The course is offered to Lesley University students of any major to take. Many of Klein's students who were not psychology majors met Klein through his swing dance class. Klein acknowledges that the course structure is unique because it has a wide range of different materials incorporated together. These elements include physiology, anatomy, and mindfulness studies. The course size ranges from 30-40 students. In 2011 Klein also co-founded a swing dance group called The Dancing Fools, which occurs every Wednesday night and averages 125 students per night.

"On the surface," Klein's former student David Roos said, "West Coast Swing dance seems easy, but the dance is filled with

spins and fun movements. It is a high-intensity dance, and people often 'sweat bullets' after finishing it." Nevertheless, Klein often outdoes the 20-year-olds at dance venues despite his age.

When Klein is asked what he enjoyed the most about swing dancing, he says it is the beauty of two strangers dancing together for the first time. Neal said, "Not a single word is often said, just them using their senses of sound, touch, and sight." He compared seeing people light up while dancing to being the equivalent of magic and that no words compared to witnessing it firsthand.

Klein even does this with his hobby, his YouTube channel. He believes society needs to feel a sense of connection. His videos have a wide range of topics from

"how to pick the right therapy and right therapist". Klein saw his students feeling alone and isolated and thoughts his videos could be a great sense of bonding among his students. He also shared that his favorite videos are his newer ones and that he is always working on and refining his videos. Klein refuses to delete any of his older videos because he wants his students to see his journey through his educational struggles, which was not easy.

As for what the future holds, Klein sees himself continuing his work of meeting with his dance students and working as an Assistant Professor. Klein said that the capacity of how much he does might change, but everything he does, he believes, is within his "alignment."

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



'Unaccustomed to Grace'

Unaccustomed to Grace Stories by Lesley Bannatyne 2022, 161 pages Kallisto Gaia Press \$14.95

The title of this collection of short stories invites us to ask, what is grace? Do we have it in our own lives? What would it be like to be unaccustomed to grace – to be a stranger to life's blessings, to the genuine goodwill of others?

Bannatyne's luminous stories introduce readers to a number of seemingly ordinary characters. These are the sort of people we might meet in our own neighborhoods, without giving them much thought. They might seem unusually wary, or conspicuously needy, but largely unremarkable.

How to account for the way that these stories pull us in? Many of them start by confounding our expectations, setting us a little off balance. The opening number, titled *Corpse Walks into a Bar*, typifies the sort of dissonance that keeps us wanting to know more.

The questions hover: is this title a joke? Is our narrator, Thomas McGahan, too sloshed to have a grip on reality? Turning pages, we come to understand the toll that grief and guilt can take on a mind's stability. Thomas takes a night journey through his own private hell, a burial ground with "Tombstones pissed on by feral cats. Weeds. St. Pauli Girl bottles." The reader journeys with Thomas until dawn brings its mild reconciliation.

Other stories in this collection also demonstrate how suffering in isolation often leads to distorted perceptions. These fictions portray distortion not just as an on/off switch, but as a spectrum. Short of the extremes of fantasy and hallucination, we see the lesser gradations of misperception: unwarranted distrust, suspicion, fear, despair –poisons that interfere with an open response to human caring.

Bannatyne's gift is to acquaint us with the varieties of loss which can afflict the spirit, often invisibly. We meet a bullied student, a foster child placed in too many temporary "homes," a girl who seeks open-end-

ed help without mentioning physical abuse by her father. We encounter parents who have lost children, children who have lost parents, a woman who loses most of one hand.

Yet in these lucid tales, nothing is pat or formulaic. "High school smells like canned corn..." one protagonist notices. A bereaved grandmother makes elaborate plans to soot a man as soon as he is released from prison. A young man torments his brother: "What kind of guy gets beat by a girl?"


We are privy to the pain and struggle of people like us, people who could be us. They reveal their inner lives in situations described in fresh language that demolishes clichés and easy stereotypes. We learn that a pregnant teenager hates "the bullet of flesh and cartilage lodged in her uterus [that] was going to cripple her."

In an emergency room, one nurse dispassionately observes another lifting the hair of a head-lice-infested boy "with a tongue depressor, like she had a dead rat on the end of a broom. There was a father and son burned by a barbeque smoker ... Continued on page 15

the tall guy with the pretty face who comes in all the time begging for Oxy." A young tarot card reader, sensing her mother's disappointment, asks her "if she wants a sage cleansing and she gives me a look that could wither a trucker's dick."

Through the lives of Bannatyne's characters, we see clearly that the wounds of the mind are the hardest to heal. Yet we also encounter the cumbersome effort of

communication, which sometimes can draw closed-up hearts open. These little dialogues, however sharp or clumsy, reveal themselves to be the kind of grace that leads to healing.



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
