MassDOT postpones safety improvements to McGrath Highway



Members of the Somerville City Council have expressed impatience with the slow pace of progress in making safety improvements to MacGrath Highway pedestrian areas.

The regular City Council Meeting held on May 13 began with a moment of silence. The remembrance was for a couple Navy veterans and longtime Somerville residents, who passed away before many felt it was their time to go.

Richard Daily Sr., age 94, was a husband and a father who leaves a legacy of 14 great grandchildren. Along with serving in the United States Navy during World War Two, he was a retired long-time employee of the school supply company J L Hammet.

Marshall Mac, age 72, served in the South Vietnamese Navy during the war in Vietnam. After being forced to spend time as a prisoner of war, Mac sought to escape the country with his family by boat. Though he had navigation skills as a seaman, Mac and his family were attacked by pirates who robbed them Continued on page 4

New underground artwork at Sacramento Street pedestrian tunnel

The Somerville Arts Council (SAC) debuts a new mural at Sacramento Street by local artists. The Council contacted local artist Hector Sanchez to search for local graffiti artists to help paint a mural at Sacramento Street's pedestrian tunnel.

Justin Diaz used color, inspiration, and expression on one side of the tunnel and Brett Cullen's used unity and peace as inspiration for the other side of the tunnel. The two selected artists brought old school hip style in combination with some influence from the local graffiti of the 80s. Additionally, they were influenced by the tunnel's history of being known as a graffiti wall from the late 90s and 2000s, hoping to invigorate the tunnel's history.

The SAC and the local artists' goal was to create inspiration for young artists in the area, hopefully becoming an ongoing project to keep the underground art in the tunnel a collaborative art space Continued on page 11

You can submit feedback and questions about information presented at the meeting online at http://bit.ly/SCSComments. The comment form will be left open until Friday, June 11.

The City of Somerville's annual Water System Flushing Program began the week of May 17 and will conclude in late October. This annual program flushes pipes at high velocities to clean water mains and maintain the highest possible water quality. Flushing will be done on Mondays and Thursdays between 6:00 p.m. and midnight to minimize disruptions to water service. In most cases, residents will not notice any changes to their water service. However, some homes may experience a temporary, slight drop in water pressure and/or discolored water. In these cases, though the water may be discolored, it is safe to drink. Until the water runs clear, it is advisable to avoid washing laundry, especially white fabrics. If any rust stains appear on wet laundry, it should not be dried, and residents can call 311 (or 617-666-3311 from cell phones or outside the city) for a free bottle of rust remover. Life in the Jimmy Del Ponte

So good, so good!



usually write about the old days of Somerville in one shape or form. It's pretty simple because I can delve into actual proven history which is

chronicled. Plus, I was usually there. It's rare for me to get a scoop, or an inside tip on a cool story. Well, the following is a hum dinger! I may have found the source of how and when the three extra " so goods" became part of the iconic Neil Diamond song Sweet Caroline.

The main subject of this tale, musician/ front man Pat Benti, has been a friend and musical associate of mine for decades. He's also performed with many other Somerville musicians and has professional and personal relationships with countless superstars. Here's more about the man who says he started the extra "so goods" in Sweet Caroline.



Pat Benti has performed in most of the former popular Somerville nightclubs in their heyday, such as The Surrey Room (behind The Rosebud) and Johnny D's. Pat and his band Sha-Boom, were the last live band that played at Winter Hill's legendary Pal Joey's. I had to take a longer look at the man who claims he is responsible for altering and adding to one of the most popular tunes in the American songbook.

Pat Benti, (Pasquale Bentivegna) from East Boston, was the leader of the band Sha-Boom, a very popular Boston band in the '70's and 80's. Pat and Sha-Boom opened for The Righteous Brothers and Roy Orbison to name a few. They also had a long run of warming up the huge Oldies 103 Concert Series audiences. They performed Celtic Pride Day, June, 10, 1986. (see color crowd photo)

2021 marks Pat's 50th year in the music business and he wanted to share this very special story about how he believes he started the popular "so good, so good, so good," in Sweet Caroline.

I conducted a few interviews and got Pat's lifelong friend Mike Capozzi, who was there, to share his recollection of the Pat Benti/Sweet Caroline connection.

"Back in the late 80's, the city of Boston ran an event during Halloween season called the Monster Dash. This was a road race in which individuals and or teams



dressed in costume and ran a race on the city streets. People would gather at City Hall Plaza at the end of the race to be entertained by Pat Benti and his Sha-Boom band, performing at a platform in the plaza. During the performance, the band got around to playing Neil Diamond's hit single Sweet Caroline. In the Benti version, Pat got the crowd into it with the "so good, so good" refrain. As far as I know, this refrain was a brainstorm of Benti's, as I had never heard any other band perform the song in this manner.

Years later, during the 2003 season of the Boston Red Sox, and under their still new ownership, I attended a late season game. During the break between the top half and bottom of the eighth inning, the music played over the loud speaker system was Neil Diamond's Sweet Caroline. Well, wouldn't you know it, the fans (as always, a mostly sold-out Fenway) spontaneously did the "so good, so good, so good" refrain. Could it actually be true that thousands of fans in Fenway that night might have learned the refrain from having attended the Monster Dash years earlier? I called Pat Benti on his cell number from my seat in the (Fenway) park and told him that the crowd was doing his version of the song.

Finally, what goes around comes around. In the aftermath of the Boston Marathon bombing in 2013, as part of the healing process for Boston, its residents and fans, the Red Sox invited Neil Diamond to sing Sweet Caroline at a home game. Benti version of his own song, getting the began, I can't begin to know when..."

crowd going with the "so good, so good, so good" refrain. The following are Pat's own words:

"Basically, it was a medley, that began with I'm A Believer. At The Monster Dash, in front of around 15,000 costume dressed people, I announced the composer, Neil Diamond. Then I went into, Sweet Caroline. Then I just started improvising by throwing in the "so good, so good, so good." The year was 1986. Yes, when the Sox were in the World Series."

To sum up the story, here are comments by longtime Sha-Boom guitarist Tony Baglio:

"Having performed with the Sha-Boom Band for many years, I can tell you, Pat Benti knows how to "read the room," whether it's a small club, concert hall or huge event like the Monster Dash. While I can't swear he was the first to do the "so good, so good, so good" refrain, I can tell you the first time we performed at the Monster Dash was the first time I'd heard it, and knowing Pat's penchant for whipping up a crowd, I'm convinced he was and is the "so good, so good" originator. So, there you are."


Was East Boston's Pat Benti actually the one who started the infamous tradition of adding the three "so goods" to Sweet Caroline? Sounds to me like a pretty solid case. Will we ever find out for sure? And wouldn't you know, Neil did the Pat In Neil Diamond's own words, "Where it

Rent it and wreck it not in the agreement

Somerville Police officers were dispatched to a Windsor Street location last Friday evening on reports of a motor vehicle accident with unknown injury.

Upon arrival, the officers observed a vehicle with significant damage and total airbag deployment, and a man, Lamont Sands, of Holbrook, pacing back and forth outside of it.

Sands told the officers that he was driving the vehicle westbound on South Street, and when he attempted to stop at the intersection of South Street and Windsor Street the vehicle would not stop and he struck the wall of the building straight ahead.

Sands reportedly told the officers that he was uninjured except for a small cut on his forehead and other small cuts on his knuckles from the airbag deployment.

While questioning Sands, dis-

patch advised the officers that the rental vehicle was reported stolen. Additional queries confirmed that it was reported stolen out of Lynn on April 23 by Enterprise Rental.

The officers asked Sands if he could show them the rental agreement, which he was able

to provide. However, there was no end date listed on the paperwork to prove that he should still be in possession of the vehicle.

Sands was placed under arrest and transported to the station for booking on a charge of receiving a stolen motor vehicle.

of their supplies, including their boat's engine which left them adrift in the ocean for 10 days.

The Mac family was rescued by a cargo ship that took them to a refugee camp in Thailand where they awaited sponsorship for travel to the United States.

After decades of living for the community, Mac suffered life threatening injuries in a horrific traffic accident while he was crossing McGrath Highway on April 13. Mac passed away while in a coma on April 29.

"This individual was a survivor. It is an indescribable tragedy that he was killed while crossing the street in Somerville. We must do everything we can to make sure that this does not get repeated," said Ward 5 Councilor Mark Niedergang.

Referred to by many as the "Corridor of Death," the thoroughfare of Mystic Avenue and McGrath Highway has seen three residents killed by cars in just the last two years.

According to the City Council, MassDOT is set to begin safety improvements for pedestrians soon, though the most impactful improvements have been pushed back to begin in 2023. This is in addition to the fact that Mass-DOT is fast tracking a major steel viaduct rehabilitation project on I-93 in 2022.

The steel rehabilitation project is being expedited in the same area where pedestrian fatalities continue and safety improvements have been postponed.

"It's shameful that MassDOT is putting private property in the form of cars over the lives of people," said Councilor At-Large Wilfred N. Mbah.

According to Niedergang, city officials and state representatives have been persistent in asking MassDOT to build sound walls along I-93. This would protect residents from fine particle air pollution produced by cars which are known to cause serious health consequences with long term exposure.

Although the steel rehabilitation as a large-scale project provides the prerequisite opportunity in which the sound walls could be built, MassDOT has not added them to the construction plans.

"(Steel rehabilitation) is clearly MassDOT's priority. They don't seem to care nearly as much about our residents who are being killed crossing the street," Niedergang said. "Pedestrians have to cross at Mystic and Mc-Grath, they don't have a choice."

The Somerville Alliance for Safe Streets is sponsoring Highway Justice for People: Mystic and McGrath on May 26 at 6:00 pm. The event will demand that MassDOT prioritizes the safety of people over the movement of cars. Members of the media will be present at the rally.

In other business, City Councilors submitted another resolution with regards to the treatment of the Tufts University dining hall staff. A student activist group known as the Tufts Labor Coalition backs the resolution and states that it stands in solidarity with the dining hall workers.

"I really admire the young people who live in our community, and certainly the students up at Tufts who have had the back of the Tufts workers on this," said Ward 7 Councilor Katjana Ballantyne.

A student from the Tufts Labor Coalition was present at the meeting and stated that the Tufts Administration had shown its true colors during the pandemic, exposing the administration's supposed stance on social justice as mere rhetoric.

According to the student, dining hall staff were left guessing about the status of their compensation at the height of the lockdown. He said that one worker even reported having to use her own sick time just to bury her husband who had passed away from complications from Covid-19.

Also, the mayor communicated a Proclamation for Women's Advancement, Equity and Opportunity in Somerville.

"This proclamation comes as a result of a resolution I wrote and submitted in February which

was prompted by the fact that women lost three decades of progress in under a year due to the pandemic," said Councilor At-Large Kristen Strezo.

According to Strezo, women reported all the job loss claims in January 2021. Many women were employed in some of the industries hardest hit by the pandemic, such as retail and hospitality.

Additionally, the Council submitted an order to appropriate a bond in the amount of \$5,000,575. The bond will

be used to acquire the Armory Building located at 191 Highland Avenue. After discussion in the most recent Finance Committee meeting, the Council voted unanimously to acquire the property at 191 Highland Avenue as well as to approve the bond cost.

And in celebration of the 56th anniversary of the passage of the Older Americans Act by the United States congress, the Council passed a resolution to make May, 2021, Older Americans Month.

City moves to acquire Somerville Armory building

Mayor Joseph A. Curtatone submitted a \$5 million proposal to the City Council to acquire the Somerville Armory building at 191 Highland Ave., which the Council approved by a unanimous vote at its May 13 meeting.

The city would be acquiring the property via eminent domain and would preserve the facility for arts uses. It would be the first publicly owned arts and culture center in Somerville, a city known for its vibrant arts community.

The building is owned by the Highland Armory Realty Trust and the site has served as the home for the Center for Arts at the Armory and smaller co-tenants, mostly arts-related organizations, since 2005. The building has however been operating under a financial model that is not sustainable and the pandemic has intensified the financial strain.

By acquiring the property, the city will stabilize the financial situation and develop a financially sustainable operating model that will reduce revenue pressure on arts activity, and allow the building to remain as a community arts center.

"Our city is proud of its commitment to its arts community and this is a chance for us to make a tangible investment in a permanent public space for arts activities," said Mayor Curtatone. "We'll be taking a historic building in the center of our city and making sure it is preserved as a civic institu-



tion. Projects like this are how we make sure the arts thrive in Somerville and remain accessible to all residents. It's a practical investment in an essential portion of our community."

"I am thrilled and delighted that the City Council has voted to support the mayor's request to take the Armory by eminent domain. The Armory is one of the most important places in Somerville for community events and gatherings of all kinds and, of course, for arts programming. Losing the Armory as a community space and a center for the arts would be a devastating blow to culture and public life in Somerville," said Ward 5 City Councilor Mark Niedergang. "I look forward to the Armory and the Center for Arts at the Armory thriving even more than they have in the past with financial support from the city."

Because of overhead costs, it is often difficult for arts organizations to find a permanent home. state laws limit the ability for the city to provide operating subsidies to cover a non-profit organization's operational costs. An acquisition by the city would create needed permanently affordable arts space that will both support local arts and artists during the pandemic recovery as well as strengthen arts activity for the long-term.

"It is important to proceed quickly at this site," Mayor Curtatone said. "Our arts community needs help now. Artists have been hit hard by the COVID-19 pandemic and the sooner we're able to establish a city-owned center for the arts, the sooner we can start providing opportunities to artists. Fortunately, we are also in a window when it's most advantageous for us to go out to bond for projects like this, meaning it will cost the city less in the long run to acquire this important site."

Now that the City Council has approved the bond, the city can execute the eminent domain filing. The city must assume control of the property within 30 days of the vote.

Olympia was her name ... fencing was her game ... and acting was her fame.

Her immigrant mother and father came to America from Greece and named her after the fields of Olympia, the site of the ancient games. As a young girl, she grew up in the tough ethnic neighborhoods of Lowell and Somerville and learned to be a scrapper while living here before, during, and after World War II.



She volunteered at Christmas time to ring Salvation Army bells; and with her love of books and reading, she haunted the Somerville Library. She diverted her aggressions to basketball courts, and later by taking up fencing with the Boston Fencing Club, the oldest in the nation. In this arena, she found that she fit like a glove, winning the New England Fencing Championship three years in a row.

This energy was paramount in her life-long development into the Oscar-winning actress of today whose star decorates Hollywood Boulevard. After her high school years, she trained for and survived the dangerous occupation of physical therapy. It was risky, because this was during the country's worst Polio epidemic years. She then returned to school at Boston University, pursuing her life-long passion of acting.

Olympia perfected her craft and won the laurel-wreath of acting, an Oscar, for the movie Moonstruck. This opened the floodgates to other acting opportunities, in movies such as Working Girl, Steel Magnolias, Mr. Holland's Opus and Look Who's Talking. These and many other opportunities also came her way.



She became so popular that she was selected to introduce her cousin, the past Massachusetts Governor and then Democratic Presidential candidate to the Democratic National Convention. Another leaf in her laurel cap was the naming of four Greek salad dressings after her. To some, this put Olympia on the same table as Newman's Own.

Applause and laurels to Somerville's actress and champion, Olympia Dukakis. Touché!

Beacon Hill Roll Call



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THE HOUSE AND SENATE. There were no roll call votes in the House or Senate last week. This week, Beacon Hill Roll Call reports local senators' roll call attendance records for the 2021 session through May 14.

The Senate has held 28 roll calls so far in 2021. *Beacon Hill Roll Call* tabulates the number of roll calls on which each senator votes and then calculates that number as a percentage of the total roll call votes held. That percentage is the number referred to as the roll call attendance record.

In the Senate, 39 of the 40 members did not miss any roll calls and have 100 percent roll call attendance records. It is a Senate tradition that the Senate president only votes occasionally. Senate President Karen Spilka follows that tradition and only voted on 11 of the 28 roll calls while not voting on 17 of them. Sen. Spilka's office did not respond to repeated requests by *Beacon Hill Roll Call* to comment on her voting record.

We specifically asked if Spilka was in the Statehouse building for all the formal and informal sessions; how the tradition developed that the president rarely votes; has she ever thought of breaking that tradition and being recorded on all roll calls; and how does she choose on which roll calls she will vote?

The vast majority of the 40 senators are not in the Senate chamber during a session because of the COVD-19 pandemic. Most are watching and listening to the session from their home, business or Statehouse office and voting remotely. Senators' votes are communicated to Senate officials during the session or prior to the session if senators are informed in advance that there will be a roll call vote.

If a member wants to speak on an issue under consideration, they do so on a separate "debate phone line" and their voice is then heard in the Senate chamber and by anyone watching the broadcast online.

ALSO UP ON BEACON HILL

\$950,000 IN GRANTS TO PROTECT HOUSES OF WORSHIP – Gov. Charlie Baker announced that

53 faith-based organizations and houses of worship will receive a portion of \$950,000 in grants to strengthen on-premises safety and security and fund safety enhancements to protect attendees facing potential increased risk of violence.

The grants began in 2018 when Massachusetts established the Commonwealth Nonprofit Security Grant Program to allocate state funding to nonprofit organizations selected through a competitive grants process managed by the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security. Since its inception, the program has provided

about \$3 million in funding to 124 organizations.

"Our administration remains committed to ensuring that all of the commonwealth's residents can worship freely and safely," said Baker. "These grants help equip houses of worship with additional tools to keep the faith communities they serve safe."

"Security, preparedness, and emergency management depend on all of us working together to protect public spaces," said Lt. Gov. Karyn Polito. "The Commonwealth Nonprofit Security Grant Program delivers critical safety resources to nonprofit and faith-based organizations to support that ongoing effort."

"Public safety professionals at the municipal, state and federal levels are deeply committed to working together for the safety of places of worship," said Secretary Thomas Turco of the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security. "This program is one of many ... initiatives that engages community leaders and empowers organizations across our 351 cities and towns to keep people safe while [they] carry out their unique, community-based missions of service."

PROHIBIT LOCAL BOARDS OF HEALTH FROM UNILATERALLY BANNING THE SALE OF TOBACCO (H 2287) – The Public Health Committee held a virtual hearing on legislation that would prohibit local boards of health from banning the sale of tobacco without a vote by a town meeting or vote of a city council.

"The local board of health should only be able to recommend a community-wide ban of such products to the community's governing body, and not have the authority to make a local bylaw change themselves," said the bill's sponsor Rep. Paul Frost (R-Auburn). "This legislation came about after the Town of Westminster with a three-person Board of Health voted to ban all tobacco sales in the community in 2014. One member changed his mind and it didn't go through."

COVID-19 AND WORKERS – Several proposals relating to COVID-19 and workers were aired at a virtual hearing by the Labor and Workforce Development Committee including:

PROHIBIT FIRING OF EMPLOYEES WHO CANNOT WORK BECAUSE OF LACK OF CHILD CARE (S 1207) - Prohibits an employer from firing an employee who cannot physically report to work because to a lack of childcare. Allows employers to require that these employees utilize paid time off including vacation, sick and personal time to offset their unavailability and requires that employers provide reasonable accommodations to employees lacking childcare including telecommuting and flexible schedule arrangements. Another provision makes a terminated employee without childcare who has exhausted all of his or her paid time off benefits eligible for unemployment benefits until 90 days following the termination of the March 10, 2020 state of emergency and requires that they then be entitled to return to their position.

"We have seen a mass exodus of women, many of whom shoulder the responsibility of childcare, from the workforce during the past year." said sponsor Sen. Adam Hinds (D-Pittsfield). "This legislation is critical to supporting women and closing a gap of inequity for those who are responsible for childcare. Until childcare is affordable and accessible for all, our workplaces must be accommodating to child caretakers."

HEALTH CARE WORKERS AND COVID PRE-

SUMPTION (S 1194) – Stipulates that any frontline healthcare worker who contracts COVID-19 acquired it at work and making that individual eligible for workers-compensation benefits. Also would prohibit employers from requiring healthcare workers to use their own sick time or other earned time to quarantine, treat or recover from COVID-19. Another provision requires the employer to allow the worker to return to their previous position at the end of their leave.

"Our healthcare system did a lot right during this pandemic," said sponsor Sen. Paul Feeney (D-Foxborough). "But we cannot simply bury our heads in the sand and forget the many workers, especially our bedside nurses, who were exposed at work and who got sick and suffered just because they were doing their jobs. As a matter of policy, we should be doing everything we can to ensure that nurses who expertly perform their jobs in the most challenging of circumstances are not only celebrated and thanked but they are protected and kept safe."

HOW LONG WAS LAST WEEK'S SESSION?

Beacon Hill Roll Call tracks the length of time that the House and Senate were in session each week. Many legislators say that legislative sessions are only one aspect of the Legislature's job and that a lot of important work is done outside of the House and Senate chambers. They note that their jobs also involve committee work, research, constituent work and other matters that are important to their districts. Critics say that the Legislature does not meet regularly or long enough to debate and vote in public view on the thousands of pieces of legislation that have been filed. They note that the infrequency and brief length of sessions are misguided and lead to irresponsible late-night sessions and a mad rush to act on dozens of bills in the days immediately preceding the end of an annual session.

During the week of May 10-14, the House met for a total of two hours and 48 minutes while the Senate met for a total of two hours and 46 minutes.



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Somerville sets out on road to supervised consumption

Plan to launch nation's first supervised consumption site is back in motion following pandemic pause

Supervised consumption sites otherwise known as overdose prevention sites - have been implemented with demonstrable success in Canada, Australia, and much of Europe. Such sites allow people to consume substances - including intravenous drugs - under the supervision of trained professionals, who can administer or arrange life-saving care in the event of a medical emergency.

Despite evidence that this model of harm reduction saves lives, supervised consumption sites have yet to appear in the United States. The major snag is the Controlled Substances Act, which bars any individual or group from "knowingly and intentionally maintaining a place for the purpose of illegal drug use," according to the Department of Justice. Citing this act, the Trump administration sued to halt the opening of a supervised consumption site in Philadelphia in February 2019.

In August 2019, Somerville Mayor Joseph Curtatone braved the hostile federal climate to announce plans for a supervised consumption site in his city. His initial goal was to have it done by the end of 2020, though the arrival of COVID-19 made that timeline untenable.

Now, Somerville's Director of Health and Human Services Doug Kress said the city is back on track to potentially realize its trailblazing vision within the year.

It's good timing, too: many supervised consumption advocates are hopeful that the Biden administration will take a more temperate stance on the issue than its predecessor, with which the Third Circuit sided in the Philadelphia case this past January. The new administration's actual position remains to be seen, of course; Biden has been reticent to speak on the issue.

"We don't mind being the leader in this," Kress said on Somerville's precedent-setting status. "We know that part of what we're looking at here is trying to set a roadmap for others to follow as well."

In setting this roadmap for the US, Somerville may import some wisdom from Canada. Kress said his team hopes to visit a supervised consumption site in Montreal and receive a lesson in best practices.

Somerville is also seeking wisdom at home: on May 25, the city will host a Supervised Consumption Site Town Hall to share its plans with constituents and make space for discussion.

"At the meeting, you can learn more about how SCS work, see data from a recently

conducted needs assessment and evaluation, and ask questions of city officials and public health experts," the event's webpage advertises.

Kress said the forum will help his team understand "how we need to move forward in order to make this actually happen." The city is seeking input about the location of the site itself, as well as what programming and social services it should offer.

"You want to make sure that the community itself is buying in," Kress emphasized. "We realize that this isn't for everybody, but there's no one thing that fits everybody. This is just another tool in our toolbox that we can have for our community members."

Somerville lost 14 residents to opioid overdoses in 2020, according to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. Between 2015 and 2020, the city's death count totals to 93.

FCC offering Emergency Broadband benefits

Starting Wednesday, May 12, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) began accepting applications for its Emergency Broadband Internet Program. The program is part of the American Rescue Plan Act passed earlier this year and will offer a credit of up to \$50 a month for residential Internet connections and \$100 toward the purchase of a computer or tablet. Only one monthly discount and one device discount is allowed per household. The program is temporary. It will continue until funds are exhausted or until six months after the federal Department of Health and Human Services declares an end to the COVID-19 pandemic emergency, whichever is sooner. Any one of the following qualifies you for the program:



- Income at or below 135% of Federal Poverty Guidelines
- Enrolled in SNAP, Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income, Federal Public Housing Assistance, or Veterans and Survivors Pension Benefit



Doug Holder: You start your new poetry collection Ash with a quote from Lidija Dimkovska, "The monster is sitting next to me, and it's so crowded in there, the membrane between me and the events of the world are going to burst." Have things for you burst? Is the membrane no more?

Gloria Mindock: When I read her quote, I had to use it. The world is so full of chaos everywhere you look. There are atrocities, Covid, social justice issues, power struggles, border woes, economic trouble, death, hate crimes, and the list goes on. Whatever membrane there is, it is quickly disappearing. For me, I cling on to hope that things will get better. There are so many wonderful people out there. I hang on to that.


DH: You are known as a dark poet, but do you have a sense of ugly/beauty, and gallows humor amidst the carnage?

GM: Yes, I am known as a dark poet in my writing, but I am a happy person, cheerful, and find humor in so many things. There are so many beautiful places in this world to see and be a part of. In my life, all my friends are positive, loyal, and caring. Being a publisher, has brought so many people into my life from all over the world. This is one of the best things that has ever happened to me. We all are bridging the gaps between countries and learning about one another.

I also give time to the things that need to change and be a voice for the people who have no voice. This is my calling. Right now, many of us are working to help a writer in Africa because the government is after him because he speaks his mind. He loves his country but has no freedom. I cannot say too much about this because he is in hiding.

I can find humor but to deal with the ugly, the carnage, I keep things in perspective. I do all I can to change the bad but live my life. I love to bring joy into this world and shine light in the dark corners of the world.

DH: In your title poem, Ash, with an ashes to ashes, dust to dust theme, you speculate that your ash may be part of a child's toy, or a piece of trash blowing in the wind. You were brought up a Catholic. Do you have any personal sense of the afterlife? GM: I consider myself spiritual. I was raised Cath-



olic and (Saint) Pope John XXIII is my relative on one side of my family and on the other side, there are many priests. I do believe in an afterlife, angels and God. I respect all religious beliefs and have also taken some of those beliefs into my life too.

DH: Poet Flavia Cosma opined that you know nothing heals. Do you agree with that statement? Is there ever a balm that heals our wounds?

GM: Everyone is wounded in some way or another. It could be a little wound or a big one. Being a counselor and clinical director in addictions for almost 40 years, I have seen the wounded. Dealing with many veterans at times, I have seen the wounded. Watching the news, I see the wounded. The fact is the world is wounded, but you learn to live with it. When you help others and show kindness, this helps the wounds heal, and make wounds easier to live with.

DH: The "sky" in your poems seem more than just a place for ash to drift down. It seems a place of transcendence, a place where you can fly.

GM: I have always, since a young girl, seen the sky as heaven. It is so beautiful. The stars at night so gorgeous. It is a place of calm looking at us. It too has a violent side, bad storms, floods caused by rain, and tornadoes. There is beauty with the storms, but it is horrible when people lose their homes or die. Everything seems to have another side to it. No matter what, it is transcendence, and the universe is where you fly. Ash is just a memory the rest of us have. We never forget those we love that have passed on.

DH: Many of your books deal with atrocities, what draws you to this?

GM: As mentioned above, I try to be a voice for those who don't have a voice. It is important for me to bring awareness to what is going on. It is surprising how many people don't know what is happening or are not interested in being involved. When innocent people are getting slaughtered, how can you turn away and live with yourself? So many countries over the years ignored the atrocities happening. The UN does not want to call situations a genocide because they will have to get involved. This infuriates me. So many countries turn a blind eye. You see this happening over and over. So no, I will never shut up about it. I am currently writing about Syria. I do have first-hand accounts of the horror. So I continue.

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
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
