The Somerville Redevelopment Authority meeting began without any comment from the public on Wednesday, May 19. Greg Karczewski, President at US2, was a guest presenter at the meeting. US2 is the Master Developer for the Union Square project which is currently under construction.

TWENTY-FIVE CENTS

US2 is responsible for the development of a couple sites, including D2 and D3.1, which will complement the new MBTA station being built in the Union Square area.

"With regards to the D2 site, if you've been around there anytime recently you will have noticed increasing levels of activity. Current tasks on site include foundation work, utilities and we will begin work on the T station elevator soon," Karczewski said.

Bringing art to the **Blessing of the Bay Boathouse**

Blessing of the Bay is a slice of nature right here in urban Somerville. The boathouse is home to a canoe and kayak rental plus a rowing club. Now they are adding some great art.

This sign and art installation celebrates Blessing of the Bay Park's ecological and recreational importance to Somerville and the Mystic. A "wave façade" of blue ribbons will echo the surface of the water. A pattern of shapes that resemble an eye, leaf, fish, or boat will cover the installation, each featuring an image of the river captured by members of the community.

On Sunday, May 23, artists hosted an on-site, socially-distanced workshop for members of the public to contribute photographs and original artworks of the Mystic to be integrated into the wave façade.

The project is being done in partnership with artists, Carolyn Lewenberg and Jessica Finch, Selbert Perkins Designs, and is being funded in part by a challenge grant from Mass Development's Commonwealth Places Program.

Life in the VILLE by Jimmy Del Ponte

Cruising in the 80's



This is the true story of a car that had a life and personality of its own. A vehicle that transported colorful characters, and made the rounds in more ways than one

way, on the streets of 1980's Somerville.

There was a former policeman that lived up my street and he owned a very cool black 1973 Cadillac Fleetwood Brougham. Every time I went by this car I marveled at its elegance. I actually daydreamed about owning a car like that. If I was walking home I'd always stop and take in its sleek lines, look in the windows, and fantasize driving it to Las Vegas or Fort Lauderdale or Revere Beach!

Then it happened. Around 1982, I heard my neighbor was selling it. He put a lot of miles on it and it didn't want to put any more money into it. My heart



started beating like mad. But he didn't want to sell it to me because it needed a lot of work like a radiator, the A/C was broken and it had some rot. It wouldn't even start!

Because we were friends, he would only take ... \$30! 30 bucks! My pals pushed it from his house on the top of the street down to our driveway with me steering, and very excited about my Caddy. My Dad was on the phone in the kitchen when it rolled into the driveway. Looking out the window, I heard him loudly say, "My son just parked the biggest (expletive) Cadillac I've ever seen in the drive-

One of my friends helped me install the used radiator I bought at Nissenbaums junk yard, and I was off and running, and stalling occasionally, but it was a blast. I was in the band The Echos at the time so that was on my front plate.

I turned 30 years old in 1983. To celebrate, we had a rolling party. My dear friend and fellow Somerville musician Dave S. volunteered to be the designated driver. Seven of my friends, including the driver, piled in for a rolling birthday party. Because I was very immature, and also a theater buff, I had a collection of silly hats, goofy sunglasses, and colorful kerchiefs. My friends wore fedoras, scally caps, army helmets, and a motorcycle cop helmet with a built-in microphone.



Of course, we were making silly comments out the window to pedestrians. Gas was around \$1.25 a gallon back then. We gassed up and hit the streets of Somerville to celebrate my thirtieth birthday on July 28, 1983.

As I said, my pal Dave S. was the designated driver that day and I loaded the best of the best of my pals - the craziest of the crazies – in for a rolling party. There were childhood friends, a fraternity brother from Emerson, and bandmates.

Among the birthday guests were Jay, Dave E, John, and Archie. There were two more guys with us that I can't really remember. I think it was Mark A., Charlie V., Ron B, Jerry A., Jimmy M., or Jimmy L., I can't recall. It was 37 years ago!

We were all decked out in our kooky helmets, bandannas, sunglasses and other various obnoxious attire. The birthday crew looked like a bunch of nuts (and we were). Dave chauffeured us from one establishment to another encompassing most of Somerville. Some of the places we hit were The Venice Cafe, Johnny D's, The Rosebud, The Coronet (currently Redbones) Khoury's State Spa and, of course, The Embassy Lounge on Somer-

I remember when we pulled up right onto the sidewalk in front of Primo's or Mama Leone's. Our driver and lifetime friend Dave S. reminded me on the

phone this morning that we were picking up and dropping people off all day. Such a great day!

You can imagine the looks we got when we piled out of that limo-like Caddy dressed ridiculously, all over the city. That 1973 Fleetwood Brougham was like driving around in my living room. What a birthday, what a car, what great bunch of friends. What a year 1983 was.

I just found out that a very good Somerville friend also had a black Fleetwood Brougham around the same time. She was given the nickname "Gangsta Mom."

A few years later the old beast was starting to fail but it was still fun cruising in it. We had a phone on a cord that led to nowhere, just for looks. When the air conditioner broke, we drove around with the windows up so people would think we had A/C.

In 1983, Dirty Laundry, Sexual Healing, and Separate Ways were on the radio. With our competent designated driver, we went Steppin 'Out, but always tried do the Safety Dance. However, occasionally the cops still had to tell us to Beat It.



Angry customer takes it out on barstool

Somerville Police officers were dispatched to Fasika Ethiopian Restaurant on Broadway last Saturday evening on reports of a dispute.

As units were responding to the location, Somerville Control informed responding units that the defendant, Javier Fabian-Dubon, fled the scene heading in the direction of Stop and Shop on McGrath Highway.

Fabian-Dubon was located on Mystic Avenue behind the Stop and Shop, hiding in the bushes near the loading dock. He was detained by officers and hand-

Police officers spoke to an employee of Fasika, who stated that Fabian-Dubon walked into the bar and requested to be served an alcoholic beverage. Due to Fabian-Dubon's level of intoxication, the bartender refused to serve him, at which time he became extremely angry.

Fabian-Dubon reportedly picked up a bar stool and threw it behind the bar at a wall of glass shelves which held numerous bottles of alcohol. The glass shelves broke/shattered and the bottles fell onto the counter and floor. At the time of the incident, three patrons and three employees were in Fasika.

the D2 property closed in December of 2020 and has been under construction ever since.

"I understand the timelines don't align with the station slated to be finished in October and the elevator is not, do you have any sense of how long that gap will be?" asked Patrick

Though the elevator will not be completed at the same time as other site amenities, US2 believes that the surrounding lab facilities should be ready to open by the first quarter of 2022 and that residential units should be ready by 2023.

"We're working every day with the T to manage that critical path for the elevator. We're hopeful that after the first of the year we will have the elevator running," Karczewski said.

In the interim without an elevator, Karczewski says that US2 will be working with the city and the MBTA on providing access for pedestrians from the north side of the station with a temporary ADA path and an alternative access point from the Charlestown and Allen Street intersection. There will also be bike facilities for T workers and commuters.

In other news, the Redevelopment Authority is overseeing the progression of a project centered around creating a public-private partnership development of a site located at 90 Washington

The Covid-19 pandemic is included in the list of complications which have plagued the multi-phase process so far, and though the project has already been approved and the property at 90 Washington Street has been acquired, there have been some delays in the phase 3 early decision of project delineation.

"The Building Committee has not done an effective job of communicating to the SRA or the City Council about any decisions they've made about a standalone project or a vertical integration project," said Direc-

tor of Economic Development Tom Galligani.

While studying options for potential building approaches, city Planning and Public Safety staff noticed logistical challenges to some of the construction plans.

"In particular, there's a cost

premium for building vertically," Galligani said, "You're basically building the public safety portion of the building, and then a separate building on top of it, they don't get to share a central core which increases costs."

Galligani informed the Redevelopment Authority that the Building Committee would pursue a standalone design for the Public Safety building, which will be accompanied by private retailers in the surrounding space.

PILOT ordinance draft moves forward

On Thursday, May 20, the Somerville City Council's Legislative Matters Committee meeting began with a discussion on the proposal to draft a PILOT ordinance. This effort is inspired by the PILOT ordinance which is currently being implemented by the City of Boston.

The proposed Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) ordinance draft looks to establish a Task Force which will formalize a fair and transparent annual reporting procedure, that would see larger non-profit organizations pay a determined amount of the taxes that would be due if they were not designated as non-profits.

Though large academic, medical and scientific institutions are labeled with the designation of non-profit, the owners of these tax-exempt properties accrue benefits in the form of city services, infrastructure and amenities.

Similar to the Boston PILOT ordinance, non-profit entities owning tax-exempt property valued at \$15 million or higher in Somerville would have to submit an annual report to the PILOT program Task Force.

The PILOT ordinance draft presented at Thursday's meeting

differed from the expectations of some councilors which were established in discussions from previous meetings about the proposed legislation and raised several questions.

"This ordinance simply creates a Task Force to study the issue and doesn't mention the 20% tax as a presumed threshold, or mandate anything like we discussed," said Ward Five Councilor Mark Niedergang.

The Purpose of the Task Force is to make recommendations for a more equitable and consistent PILOT program which takes the community into consideration, and compensates the city for lost revenue from tax-exempt properties.

"There is no mandate that the city can impose under the law for penalty of taxes on non-profit organizations," said Assistant City Solicitor David Shapiro.

In addition, some key distinctions between the Boston ordinance and the Somerville draft were noted by the council.

"Looking at the Boston ordinance, there are some pretty significant differences on how the Task Force would be constructed, if someone could point out the reasoning there?" Ward Six Councilor Lance Davis asked.

With regards to the composition of community members

on the PILOT Task Force, the Boston ordinance differs from the proposed Somerville draft in that the mayor of Boston, the Council President of the City of Boston, the PILOT Action Group and neighborhood groups representing areas with substantial amounts of tax-exempt property all get to nominate two representatives from the community to be on the PI-LOT Task Force.

The medical, academic and scientific community is also given a representative member on the Task Force in Boston.

This is in comparison to the Somerville PILOT Task Force that is only set to seat three non-government community members, which will be appointees from the mayor, City Council and School Committee chair respectively.

"We're asking for a function similar to what is in the Boston ordinance, which is that two seats be authorized by community groups who have been working on this issue," said Mary Anne Wells.

Though councilors voiced their support over the question of community involvement in comparison with Boston's ordinance, this policy outcome did not appear to be in line with Somerville's past approaches to



similar situations.

"As a practical matter, having those on a task force from a particular specified group is not typically what we have done with task forces," Assistant Solicitor Shapiro said. "We typically would look for those who have qualifications and expertise in a wide range of areas, not just from a designated group."

The PILOT ordinance was kept in committee for further discussion. If approved, the Task Force is set to meet on a regular quarterly basis.

In other business, the Council reviewed a request from the mayor to approve a surveillance technology impact report from the Office of Strategic Planning and Community Development (OSPCD).

The OSPCD will be own-

ing and operating a set of small drones for their audio and video capabilities. "What we use the drones for is aerial photography for neighborhood planning," said Director of Planning and Zoning Sarah Lewis.

The drones have been used to photograph the outdoor dining layout of Davis Square. According to Lewis, FAA license holder Victor Nascimento will be the primary drone operator.

"They're only used at higher elevations so we can see things like urban form and the network of streets. We're looking at urban scale, not zooming in on people," Director Lewis said.

Images captured by drones will not be shared with the Somerville Police Department. The City Council voted to approve the mayor's request.

Carolicious Venezuelan Food



\$400 MILLION FOR NEW SOLDIERS' HOME IN HOLYOKE (H 3770)

House 160-0, Senate 40-0, approved and sent to Gov. Charlie Baker a bill authorizing \$400 million to fund the construction of a new Soldiers' Home in Holyoke. The push to construct the new home follows the deaths of 77 veteran residents last year as a result of a COVID-19 outbreak at the current facility. A House-Senate confrence committee hammered out this compromise version after the House and Senate approved different versions of the measure.

The bill also provides \$200 million to increase geographic equity and accessibility of long-term care services for Bay State veterans with a focus on areas that are not primarily served by the soldiers' homes in Chelsea or Holyoke. The Baker administration and House and Senate leaders have urged speedy passage of the proposal in order to meet deadlines to apply for as much as \$260 million in funding from the federal government, which would leave state taxpayers with a \$140 million bill.

"Rebuilding the soldiers' home in Holyoke and increasing access to services for our veterans is necessary and long overdue, especially after tragically losing many residents of the soldiers' home to a COVID-19 outbreak last year," said Sen. Cindy Friedman (D-Arlington) who served as the lead Senate negotiator of the conference committee. "This funding will ensure that the commonwealth's veterans are met with the services that they deserve and that address their unique and changing needs."

"Our veterans throughout the commonwealth deserve the very best in care and treatment as they age," said Sen. Paul Feeney (D-Foxborough) another member of the conference committee. The bill that we enacted today will ensure that their needs are met for generations to come in a safe, comfortable and welcoming soldiers' home. Additionally, it is critical that this vital taxpayer-funded facility be built efficiently by a local, well-trained, safe and diverse workforce that provides a career pipeline for skilled craftspeople in Western Massachusetts. The bipartisan and collaborative bond authorization bill we sent to the governor is reflective of our values and consistent with our focus on providing equitable and top-notch care to every veteran in the commonwealth."

"As the senator for the city of Holyoke and the Soldiers' Home, I know what this new home means to so many in our community," said Sen. John Velis (D-Westfield), Senate chair of the Committee on Veterans and Federal Affairs. "This has truly been a long and emotional process that started well before this legislation was first filed. From the very start, families and veterans gave me a very clear message: 'Get this done.' We could not let them down and I am proud to say that we have not let them down ... The funding authorized in this bill will ensure that the future residents of the Holyoke Soldiers' Home and veterans across our commonwealth receive the care with honor and dignity that they have earned in service to our nation. Today's vote brings us one step closer towards fulfilling that mission."

ALSO UP ON BEACON HILL

UNEMPLOYED CLAIMANTS MUST LOOK FOR WORK – Gov. Baker announced that effective June 15, 2021, the work search requirements will be reinstated for all regular Unemployment Insurance (UI) claimants. Massachusetts temporarily suspended these requirements in March 2020 when the pandemic began.

Under the reinstated regulations, claimants must attest each week that they are making at least three worksearch activities and provide proof of that activity to the Department of Unemployment Assistance, if requested, in order to maintain eligibility for UI benefits. Examples of valid work-search activities include completing a job application in person or online with employers who reasonably may be expected to have an opening for suitable work; registering for work and reemployment services with a local Mass Hire Career Center; and using other job search activities, such as reviewing job listings on the internet, newspapers or professional journals, contacting professional associations and networking with colleagues or friends.

"This is very good news for everyone," said Paul Craney executive director of the Massachusetts Fiscal Alliance. "Businesses, workers and customers all need to get back to normal and this is a good first step toward that. Businesses are having a hard time hiring workers because the unemployment benefits are so generous. Customers cannot enjoy their favorite businesses because these businesses are dealing with a shortage of workers."

"I am completely opposed to Gov. Baker's move to reinstate work search requirements for UI claimants starting June 15th," said Rep. Mike Connolly (D-Cambridge). "This adds an additional layer of complexity to a UI system that has greatly struggled to deliver benefits in a timely fashion for many residents. Moreover, we've just experienced one of the biggest disruptions to the labor market in history, so imposing these requirements right now will tend to perpetuate systemic racism and other inequities by pushing some of our most vulnerable residents into accepting underpaid work or work in unsafe conditions."

FAKE SERVICE ANIMALS (H 1565) – Sponsored by Rep. Kim Ferguson (R-Holden), this bill heard by the Judiciary Committee would make it a crime for anyone to misrepresent that a dog or other animal is a service animal. First-time offenders would be required to perform 30 hours of community service for an organization that serves individuals with disabilities and/or up to a \$500 fine. Subsequent offenses would be punishable by 60 hours of community service and/or up to a \$1,000 fine.

Ferguson said the bill seeks to protect service dogs and their handlers from people who are abusing the rights afforded to them under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). "This has become an increasing problem throughout the country, so much so that 27 other states

have had to pass laws such as this," said Ferguson. The law will reinforce the ADA and also provide guidance to business owners and the public, as well as training to law enforcement regarding what can and cannot be done if someone is in violation of the law."

SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING (H 543) -

Rep. Ruth Balser (D-Newton) sponsored this bill heard by the Education Committee that would require, as a provision of initial certification and recertification, that all educators and administrators must have training in "strategies to develop students' social-emotional learning competencies, including self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills and responsible decision-making."

Supporters said that mounting research evidence shows that high quality social and emotional learning practices in schools help children to develop the social, emotional and academic skills they need to thrive. They noted that many students come to school having experienced trauma that impacts their relationships, behavior learning and that school officials report that the numbers of students with anxiety, depression and suicidal ideation is increasing at an alarming level.

"It is important to recognize that children's learning is, in part, dependent on their emotional state," said Balser. "This bill requires teachers and administrators to receive training in social-emotion learning strategies."

HOW LONG WAS LAST WEEK'S SESSION?

Beacon Hill Roll Call tracks the length of time that the House and Senate were in session each week. Many legislators say that legislative sessions are only one aspect of the Legislature's job and that a lot of important work is done outside of the House and Senate chambers. They note that their jobs also involve committee work, research, constituent work and other matters that are important to their districts. Critics say that the Legislature does not meet regularly or long enough to debate and vote in public view on the thousands of pieces of legislation that have been filed. They note that the infrequency and brief length of sessions are misguided and lead to irresponsible late-night sessions and a mad rush to act on dozens of bills in the days immediately preceding the end of an annual session. During the week of May 17-21, the House met for a total of ten hours and eight minutes while the Senate met for a total of six hours and 22 minutes.

Investing in Women and Families: Alternatives to a New Prison

Massachusetts is at a crossroads: will the state build a new women's prison and continue to invest in the cycle of incarceration, or go another way to support communities? The Commonwealth has one women's prison, in Framingham, a facility built in 1877 that is incredibly outdated and is becoming more uninhabitable each day. This presents an opportunity to rethink how we address criminal justice, particularly for those who suffer from addiction, acute mental illness, or are victims of trafficking. We have a unique moment to invest in communities, in mental health supports and substance use programs, education that is transferable, and safe housing for women and families to address the root causes of criminalization and stop the flow of incarceration.

The state's Department of Correction (DOC) under Governor Baker is continuing on the course of creating more prisons. While ignoring over a year of concerns and protests from advocates and state legislators, DOC appears to be moving forward with a plan to upgrade a facility in Norfolk to create a new site for a women's prison. This approximately \$50 million dollar project is moving swiftly through the planning stage, with the Baker Administration recently selecting the firm HDR Architecture to design the updated facility. Massachusetts has one of the lowest rates of incar-

ceration in the country and the current population at Framingham has dropped to under 200 women; yet the DOC is continuing to invest in prisons for future generations.

Black and Brown women are disproportionately incarcerated compared to their white counterparts. A recent report highlighting disparities in the Massachusetts criminal justice system details that Black people are imprisoned at a rate 7.9 times that of white people and Latinx people at 4.9 times that of white people. As the Commonwealth continues to address systemic inequities, we must consider alternatives in the criminal justice system.

As Co-Chair for the Task Force on Justice-Involved Women, I have been listening to and working with formerly incarcerated women to understand the needs and supports for women and their families. The Task Force supports policies to divert women from the criminal justice system, advocates for changes to discriminatory sentencing laws and increased community support programs, and seeks to move away from systems of punishment by instead providing opportunities for support and recovery.

Mental health services and supports are a clear opportunity for intervention where prisons are not able to support the needs of women and their families. Women who are in prisons and jails have higher rates of mental health and substance use disorders than men, and women are often incarcerated after expo-



sure to trauma. In December 2018, the Massachusetts DOC reported that 74% of women had open mental health cases, 15% had a serious mental illness, and 56% were on psychotropic medication. Mental health needs including accurate diagnoses, treatment including medication management for all conditions including substance use disorders, therapy and beyond should be a top priority.

Prison is not an environment conducive to treating a person's mental health issues. In November 2020, the Massachusetts DOC was found to have violated the constitutional rights of incarcerated people by forcing restrictive housing stays and providing inadequate supervision and mental health care. According to a report from January about prison-based therapy, jails and prisons are not suitable sites for effective trauma-based interventions. Mental health issues are often only exacerbated in prison, when women are isolated, not provided with adequate care to support their mental health, and separated from their families.

In addition, the majority of women who are incarcerated are mothers and primary caretakers; the national percentage is approximately 80%. It is critical for children to be with their mothers, especially in early development years. Family separation affects the mental health of both mothers and children, who face significant emotional burdens and are at risk for developing behavioral issues, thus increasing their likelihood of continuing the cycle by ending up incarcerated themselves. To ensure that women and their families receive the care that they need, it is imperative that we invest in mental health care and community-based gender-responsive alternatives to prisons.

As we continue to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic and reckon with systemic racial injustice, we cannot continue to ignore the harm the era of mass incarceration has inflicted on our communities. Our decisions now about how to move forward will impact communities for years to come. Undoing the damage for communities in Massachusetts means focusing on achieving justice that is transformative--justice that does not seek to punish, but rather promote the healing and wellbeing of individuals and their communities-by providing each and every person with the resources they need to thrive.







Somerville's Kevin McIntosh: **Author of 'Class Dismissed'**

Kevin McIntosh met me at the outdoor patio of the Neighborhood Restaurant in Union Square to chat about his new book, Class Dismissed, as well as his life as a writer and teacher.

Originally from Illinois, McIntosh counts Ernest Hemingway as one of his earliest influences. After all he grew up in Oak Park, Illinois, where the great man spent his early years.

McIntosh has a wide range of experience as a teacher. He has taught in inner city schools, and at high-toned suburban academies.

McIntosh, as a young man, had a bit of the wanderlust, as he taught in Oakland, New York City, and in Dover Massachusetts, and held a variety of jobs before that. I asked him about his Somerville experience. He told me, "My wife and I had lived in Newton, Massachusetts for twenty years. We wanted to downsize and be close to the city. We have been here for six years and we love it."


McIntosh noted that some of his favorite spots in our burg are the Common Grounds Coffee Shop in Ball Square (where he likes to write) and the Burren, an Irish pub in the heart of Davis Square.

McIntosh, a man in his late 50s, who sports a professorial beard, and a casual manner, has written a novel, Class Dismissed, that is very loosely based on his own experiences as a young teacher.

The 30-year-old protagonist of the novel, Patrick Lynch is from the hinterlands of Minnesota, and is adjusting to the mean streets and schools of New York City. Due to an unfortunate classroom incident with a student, he finds himself in the notorious "Rubber Room."

The New York school system's Rubber Room, which was exposed by the media in the early 2000s, (and may still be in use) is a sort of Twilight Zone/limbo space. Here, teachers who are held for various infractions wait for judgment from above about their exoneration - or not. They are in essence paid to sit. This can go on for years.

McIntosh's protagonist sits in this room, while his relationship with his girlfriend goes South, not to mention, that his life in general takes a downward spiral. McIntosh, who has never experienced such a fate, said that the room was, "Like a scene from Waiting for Godot, with this monstrous bureaucracy rattling on, keeping the teachers in suspended animation." Throughout the book McIntosh brings in the intricate aspects of the classroom experience, the students, the mmcintosh.com.



teachers, and the institution.

McIntosh explained to me that in his career teaching English he found the inner-city kids just as creative as the kids he taught in the toney suburbs. He explained, "The kids in the suburbs were more grade conscious, bright kids, but narrowly focused. In New York City the kids were more open and seemed to be more spontaneous. There was a genuine joy for learning."

McIntosh, like may Somerville creatives I have interviewed, has an eclectic background. He was an aspiring playwright in his younger years. His play, a musical, By George, about the Gershwin brothers, was produced at his Alma mater, Carleton College, and had a staged reading at the Playwright's Center in Minneapolis. In this time at the center, he often saw the great African American playwright August Wilson walk the halls.

It is always a pleasure to interview people at the Neighborhood Restaurant patio, with its tangle of vines, comfort food, and friendly vibe. And I was glad to connect with McIntosh here, in the Paris of New England.

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
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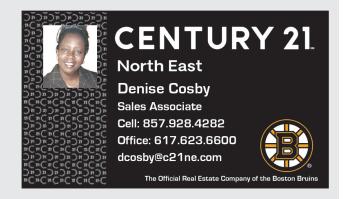
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
