

West Somerville resident Erin Turco walks her dog Wally most days and when it isn't raining, she heads to the Dilboy Stadium and Fields complex. Because of limited recreation space in Somerville, natural grass athletic fields often double as recreation spaces for residents like Turco. "These fields are disgusting!" says Turco. "They are especially gross in the spring and fall. When it rains there's mud, muck, and the rain forms pools of standing water which attracts bugs."

Phase One: The Dilboy Synthetic Turf Stadium and Track

The Dilboy Stadium and Fields Renovation Project falls under Somerville's "Fields Master Plan." The site design includes two phases: Dilboy Stadium and the natural Continued on page 4

Local indoor recreation businesses blocked from operating are asking why

It was announced that Somerville has moved into Phase 3, Step 1, allowing a few businesses to open, such as yoga, dance studios, and other fitness facilities. On September 8, Tuesday, the businesses that were allowed to open with restrictions would be able to do so. However, two known indoor recreation businesses in Somerville are forced to keep their doors closed Brooklyn Boulders and Urban Axes.

In July, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts announced that the state may reopen indoor recreations in Phase 3 Step 1 which has created weeks of missed opportunities for both of these businesses. Due to Somerville's decision to delay moving along with the state's reopening plan, an increased number of loss revenue and customers has significantly impacted Brooklyn Boulders and Urban Axes. A chance to take care of the livelihood of their employees and welcome back the Continued on page 6

Dear old Golden Rule days




September is back to school season and although this year will be very different, we are still reminded of our wild and crazy high school days.

Exposed, defiant, and ultimately arrested

Somerville Police officers were dispatched to the area of Prospect St. and Somerville Ave. last Friday evening on reports of a man exposing himself.

This call came after receiving a similar report of a man matching the same description exposing himself inside the Target store on Somerville Ave about an hour and a half earlier.

The suspect, later identified as Steve Milice, appeared to be intoxicated according to store security and he was asked to leave.

When police units had arrived,

Milice was located outside of the store. It appeared he was having trouble keeping his sweat pants up as they appeared to be loose, and he had to continually pull them up. Milice was ultimately sent on his way.

Upon arrival to the area of Prospect St. and Somerville Ave., Somerville Police dispatch updated responding units that the Milice was now at the Burger King Parking lot. It was later learned that dispatch had received a second call for this male who had now made his way to

the Burger King.

Units responded and located Milice across the street from the Burger King. Somerville Police dispatch stated that the second reporting party was standing by in the parking lot waiting to speak to police.

The reporting party told the officers that she was in the drive through at Burger King, with her wife in the passenger's seat, and their four month old child in the back seat. She happened to step out of the vehicle and observed Milice at the corner

of the restaurant with his pants down and his genitals completely exposed.

The reporting party's wife also observed Milice with his genitals completely exposed. Both parties asked Milice, at which time he reportedly made obscene remarks of defiance, then pulled his pants up slightly with his genitals still exposed and stated to the females that they could step outside.

The reporting parties told police that they could not believe what they had just seen and said they felt shocked and alarmed by what they had just witnessed. They showed the officers a photo that they had captured of Milice with his pants down.

Milice was handcuffed and placed into custody. A subsequent search of his backpack turned up a large meat cleaver.

Malice was transported to the Somerville Police Headquarters and booked in the usual manner on charges of open and gross lewdness and violation of city ordinance possession of a dangerous weapon.

grass auxiliary fields. "The fields, stadium, and track are unusable when it rains," says Arn Franzen, Somerville's Director of Parks. "These renovations will ensure the safety of athletes using the fields for football, soccer, softball, and other activities. These updates are long overdue."

The Dilboy Stadium plan focuses on resurfacing the turf field and track. Athletes will see and feel a change in the infill that's used as cushioning under the synthetic top layer. A new wood-based infill will replace

the current "crumb rubber" infill made from old tires.


Ward 7 Councilor Katjana Ballantyne has "seen crumb rubber floating in the Alewife Brook" and at a recent meeting wanted assurances that any of the new wood-based infill "will be captured by the new fine mesh screens being inserted in the drainage system."

Site designer David Warner, President of Warner Larson Landscape Architects, says, "We're not anticipating a lot of material being moved off the

field [by rain or flooding]. Brock-FILL [the new wood-based infill] adsorbs water and will stay in place," he says. "Unless it's tracked off the field by athletes." Phase Two: Auxiliary Natural **Grass Fields Improvements**

Renovations to the natural grass fields will be more extensive. The fields will be dug up and "sand slits" (a network of drainage trenches and pipes) will be installed to build a more permeable playing surface. Site designer David Warner says, "That's giving it more surface area for infiltration and absorption so that the nutrients that are applied to the natural grass are going to be absorbed into the soil, root system, plants rather than running off the surface in a rainstorm."

A 25-ft. buffer zone between the outfields and Alewife Brook will be established that meets the requirements of the Wetlands Protection Act. The plan calls for the removal of invasive species, such as Japanese knotweed, and replanting of a fourteen-plant native mix that includes Butterfly Milkweed and Switchgrass. Both the natural grass and native plants will receive a non-phosphorous fertilization protocol. Patrick Herron, Executive Director Mystic River Waterway Association, says, "The city of Somerville deserves credit for being thoughtful' on the project. However, "over-fertilization" up and down the brook is a problem. He adds, "The whole



The Yankee Sculptor By Bob (Monty) Doherty

Horatio Greenough was born in Boston in 1805, attended Philips Academy in Andover, graduated from Harvard College in 1825, spent the greater part of his life in Italy and died in Somerville. He was a member of the National Academy of Arts and Sciences which is now headquartered on Beacon Street in Somerville.




Known as the "Yankee Sculptor," he created numerous historic museum pieces honoring many notables of his time. Some of his busts and statues included:

Josiah Quincy, President of Harvard University

+ Marquis de Lafayette, America's youngest Revolutionary General

+ Samuel F.B. Morse, artist and inventor of the Telegraph + James Fenimore Cooper, his close friend and America's first novelist

community soon seemed unlikely since learning indoor recreations did not fit the city's reopening plan on September 8.

Urban Axes is a small private company with eight locations in other U.S. cities. All of their locations have successfully opened their doors in other cities however their Somerville location is the last one to open. Since the closing of Urban Axes on March 15, their staff have been unemployed and the business has had to face cancelations or reschedule reservations. 18 out of 30 of their staff at the Somerville location are Somerville residents and are eager to return to work.

The duration of the recreational activity has been reduced to one hour and a half and guests must wear masks during the time provided. Guests can book reservations online and are required to complete an online waiver using a QR code similar to ordering at a restaurant. Staff that will be assisting guests are required to wear masks and follow other newly created hygiene and safety measures that are included in their reopening plan.

Urban Axes' reopening plan was sent to the Mayor's Office in July and there was no correspondence for eight weeks. After weeks of silence, asking for feedback and a meeting, Urban Axes was scheduled to meet with the city officials from the Mayor's Office on September 10. "I still don't have any agreement from them on what the next steps are after this meeting. I don't know if they're going to allow me to open," Matt Patton, co-owner of Urban Axes explains.

Urban Axes has provided additional precautions to the Mayor's Office such as excluding the sale of food and alcohol, cutting their capacity space down by 75% from 60 to 24 people, and maintaining a distance greater than 6 ft. in their 7,500 sq. ft. space, allowing six or less people to have 1,000 sq. ft. of space to themselves, with a maximum of four groups allowed in their facility. "I've gone to the city and said, let me do one group of 10 people and the city has said no, that's not acceptable. So we couldn't have 750 square feet per person."

Although a strong reopening plan has been presented, an answer from the mayor must be given. Urban Axes' competitors outside of Somerville have been opened and are attracting their customers. They will continue to push to reopen if the silence from the city continues with a possibility of a filing formal complaint. "It's been incredibly frustrating to have the city refuse to talk to us and deny us due process."

Brooklyn Boulders have remained closed facing similar issues. With a large facility, precovid 1,000 people checked into their facility on a regular basis. A decrease in revenue in the past few months has piled up as they complied with state restrictions to shut their doors in March. Their 100 staff members and additional fitness contractors have been unemployed, 20 of them moved away from the city due to the overall impact of the coronavirus. Cleaning staff, youth staff, front desk, skilled team members, and managers have been left with the uneasiness of the city's decision to further delay the reopening for their indoor rock climbing facility.

The wait to hear responses from the city to reopen is a continuous struggle and the preparation that needs to go into training the employees with an estimated date has been unreasonable. A continuous significant amount of lost time and revenue has been unnecessary for Brooklyn Boulders as its competitors across Massachusetts opened their facilities in July. The initial number of memberships have decreased from 3,000 before March for a number of reasons including cancelations and members other climbing gyms outside the city. The facility is also generously working with members on reworking memberships to help keep people invested.

Dan Braun, general manager at Brooklyn Boulders for the Somerville location explains, "We're not being told of the metrics that they're using to evaluate the situation, we're basically left totally in the dark." Dan was also set to meet with city officials on September 10, 2020, who were scheduled to walk inside the building, evaluating the precautions they've placed. No decisions would be made by the city officials during the visit. Some of the precautions that have been made include placing extra hand sanitizer stations and signs that require all to wear masks once a guest walks in the facility, plexi-



glass that separates the front desk from guests, contactless check-ins, and floor markings to maintain social distancing.

At the Brooklyn Boulders in New York and Chicago customers have been satisfied with the cleanliness and safety. Again, the preparation has been made but an answer from the mayor is needed. "What I don't understand is what does the city of Somerville and local government stand to gain from keeping us closed," Dan said.

Restaurants, where customers





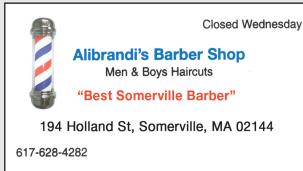

One case of West Nile Virus confirmed in Somerville

City now considered 'high risk'

Last week, the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) elevated Somerville and some surrounding communities to high risk for West Nile virus (WNV). One case of WNV has been confirmed in Somerville this year. Peak risk for WNV infection typically continues through September. Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) cases have also been confirmed in Massachusetts this season, although local risk for EEE remains low.

WNV and EEE are usually transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. While WNV and EEE can infect people of all ages, people over the age of 50 are at higher risk for severe WNV, and people under the age of 15 are particularly vulnerable to EEE. WNV symptoms and EEE symptoms tend to include fever and flu-like illness. Somerville residents are encouraged to con-



tinue to take precautions to protect themselves and their loved ones against mosquito bites and mosquito-borne illnesses. DPH recommends the following precautions:

Avoid mosquito bites

Apply Insect Repellent when Outdoors. Use a repellent with DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide), permethrin, picaridin (KBR 3023), oil of lemon eucalyptus [p-methane 3, 8-diol (PMD)], or IR3535 according to the instructions on the product label. DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age and should be used in concentrations of 30% or less on older children. Oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under three years of age.

Be aware of peak mosquito hours

The hours from dusk to dawn are peak biting times for many mosquitoes. Consider rescheduling outdoor activities that occur during the evening or early morning. Clothing Can Help Reduce Mosquito Bites. Wear long-sleeves, long pants, and socks when outdoors to help keep mosquitoes away from your skin.

Mosquito-proof your home

Drain Standing Water. Mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water. Limit the number of places around your home for mosquitoes to breed by either draining or discarding items that hold water. Check rain gutters and drains. Empty any unused flowerpots and wading pools, and change the water in birdbaths frequently. Install or Repair Screens. Keep mosquitoes outside by having tightly-fitting screens on all of your windows and doors.

Protect your animals

Animal owners should reduce potential mosquito breeding sites on their property by eliminating standing water from containers such as water bowls, buckets, tires, and wading pools - especially after heavy rains. Owners should also speak with their veterinarian about mosquito repellents approved for use in animals and vaccinations to prevent WNV and EEE. If an animal is diagnosed with WNV or EEE, owners are required to report to the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health by calling 617-626-1795 and to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) by calling 617-983-6800.

This was the nation's first federally-funded monument and became Greenough's greatest creation. Today, it is known as the Enthroned Washington; and after being moved to three different sites because of construction, it is now located in the National Museum of American History.

His famous group structure, The Rescue (1850) depicted Daniel Boone saving his family during an Indian attack. It stood on the East facade of the United States Capitol for over 100 years. Presi-

dent Lincoln took his first oath of office on

May 4, 1861 in the shadow of this statue.

Horatio pushed himself hard, and his social and work circuit was far reaching. Despite suffering from exhaustion, depression and malaria, he continued to work. He entered McLean Hospital in Somerville in 1852 where he died. He was 47 years old, a patriotic Yankee stonecutter and is buried in Mount Auburn Cemetery in Cambridge.

For many, Money Management is a lifeline to independence

Living independently is important to "Stella," but at age 78 she had growing concerns about making it work. Her eyesight was failing, making it difficult to read mail and pay bills.

Alone in her Somerville apartment, she needed help-- and found it through the Money Management program at Somerville-Cambridge Elder Services (SCES).

Money Management matched Stella with a volunteer, who visited monthly to review the mail and ensure bills were paid. They also helped Stella receive bank statements through the mail and resolve a billing issue with her phone company. The monthly visits have gone on hiatus since the Coronavirus pandemic began, but Money Management is still working with Stella, helping her set up auto-deductions for rent payments and with writing the monthly phone bill check.

The impact of this assistance goes far beyond just keeping Stella's accounts in order, explained Money Management Bill Payer Manager RachelMarta Greenberg.

"It's important to Stella that her bills are paid on time, and the uncertainty before caused her a lot of stress," she said. "She really appreciates having someone she can depend on each month."

The SCES Money Management program is a lifeline for low-income older adults in our community who need assistance managing their finances due to failing eyesight, dementia, or physical disability.

Program volunteers help with vital tasks such as bill paying, budgeting, and bank errands, and often make all the difference for older adults who might otherwise be facing eviction, financial exploitation, or loss of independence.

SCES is dedicated to helping older adults maintain independence and dignity, and Money Management is often a key piece of that puzzle. But we rely on community support to ensure Money Management remains available. By making a tax-deductible gift to Money Management, you can provide support

Clinical trials for COVID-19 using placebos raise an ethical issue. In a pandemic with thousands dying, the conventional trial method of a double-blind study in which the identity of those receiving treatment versus a placebo is concealed from both patient and administrator does not make sense. Ethically, in a pandemic where the virus claims lives at a staggering rate, can we give a person a placebo knowing that they are not protected and could die or suffer permanent severe organ damage. The purpose of a the emergency department, concealing the knowledge from the treating physician of whether the patient has received a vaccination or a placebo seems unreasonable. Covid-19 vaccine trials are not on which pill is better but on whether a vaccine actually works.

Science demands that the results of a trial show a statistical outcome to justify the vaccine; this is why the double-blind paradigm makes sense in conventional wisdom. But we have another route that could be followed that would not put the hospitalization rates, deaths, and total cases in communities already.

Instead of the double-blind trials, why not identify several of these "hot spot" communities, vaccinate a statistically significant proportion of the population and observe the results. Before vaccination, you would double test candidates. Once their negative status is confirmed, the study can track their propensity to contract the virus in the hot spots and tabulate the results statistically.

This can be done without putting any

Massachusetts, we have hot spots in the inner Boston urban areas of Chelsea, Revere, Lynn and some other suburbs. Any or all of these could provide a solid platform from which this could be implemented.

Physicians swear an oath the "first do no harm" and by eliminating the double-blind test methodology, that can be achieved. We should move with haste because we have these "hot spots" of outbreak and use these communities to the advantage of proving a vaccine. Some may feel side effects, yes, but they will not die


double-blind study is to minimize bias. However, the test for whether someone has contracted the virus is a yes/no, absolute answer. Bias does not influence the result of this test. Additionally, if test participants contract the virus and present at lives of the population at risk but deliver a result couched in scientific method without the ethical dilemma. There are numerous "hot spots" in various communities where the virus is raging. We have a wealth of data indicating infection rates, part of the trial population at risk of contracting the virus resulting from a placebo which would not be helpful. This can be a statistically sound procedure to circumvent the ethical issue and to get the results needed to prove efficacy. Where I live in from the virus. It is time for being practical to get the statistical / scientific data to verify outcomes.



Amanda Hill: An artist who wants her work out in public

I talked with Amanda Hill, the artist who created the wonderful mural at the Cambridge Health Alliance site in Somerville. A lot has been written about the mural, but I wanted to get a little more about the artist, in her own words. From her website:

"Amanda Hill is a multimedia artist and muralist living and working in Greater Boston.

Hill's work is rooted in the deep exploration of objects. Hill elevates the status of her subject matter, heightening what many considered to be commonplace. Her paintings demonstrate an interest in color theory, color relationships, and structural tension.

Hill takes a special interest in a community's ability to make and experience art, as such she regularly designs, consults, and coordinates mural and placemaking/public art projects.

Hill received a BA from Smith College (Northampton, MA), and an MS in Nonprofit Management from The New School, Milano School of International Affairs, Management, and Urban Policy (New York, NY)." **DH:** Although you don't live in Somerville now, do you still feel a strong connection to it?

AH: I lived in Somerville for about two years before I moved to Malden. I do still feel a strong connection to Somerville. I have fabulous memories from my time there, living with my partner for the first time, backyard BBQs, pottery classes Mudville, the list goes on. I still frequent a number of restaurants and cafes in the area. I also have a good number of friends who are still in the Somerville area. I grew up on the South Shore, and went to college in Western, MA, so I definitely feel a strong connection to Massachusetts and the Boston area as a whole.

DH: Do you come from an artistic family?

AH: Yes and no. A good deal of my family was drawn to music rather than the visual arts. My maternal grandmother was a concert pianist and played with the Boston Pops. She was incredible for her time. She was a professor of Music at Wheaton College, graduated from New England Conservatory of Music and attended the Fontainebleau School. She also traveled with the USO giving concerts. In terms of a career and the gig-economy, I would say her career was most closely related to mine. My maternal grandfather was a structural engineer who toyed with painting as an adult. My mom also has a natural talent for the visual arts and is quite adept at the piano. My twin brother has always had a natural talent for the piano as well, but he went into accounting and finance. One thing that my mother, brother, grandfather, and I have all had in common is a love for manipulating space. We love to be outside and often take on



been like so far?

AH: The feedback has been great so far. I had a number of visitors while I was putting up the piece who comment on how much color and levity the mural brought to the space. I haven't heard any complaints as of yet.

DH: I see that you have a strong business background and studied Business at Harvard, etc. So many talented artists complain that they don't have a business sense. This has probably helped your career as an artist, am I right?

AH: I have what I consider a very weird career trajectory. I drifted to the administrative side of the art world for about five years. I went to grad school, co-founded a nonprofit, and worked in operations and philanthropy before switching to working freelance and concentrating on my own artistic practice. Overall, my business/ non-profit background has been helpful to my work as an artist, but I would also say that sometimes that business sense does get in the way of my work. I have definitely struggled with the lack of structure my artistic practice can sometimes take whereas the business side is relatively structured and constrained. Striking a balance can be difficult.

DH: You often use unused spaces for your work. What do you look for when you pick a site?

AH: I don't often pick my own sites. I love working on all types of walls and structures. Most of the time, squarish, flat, untextured, unobstructed walls are some of the best canvases. With that said, walls that are irregularly shaped or textured can be very interesting to work on too. Mainly, I think is visibility is key, can the viewer take in a piece and see the work as a whole?

large building/gardening projects.

DH: You seem to have extensive experience with public art. In some ways is public art more vital than art in museums? Do you think it sparks interest in people who never really thought about art?

AH: I have been around/practicing public art since a sophomore in High School. My first foray into public art was with the organization Tape Art that is based out of Providence, RI. In reference to museums vs. public art, I wouldn't say that one is more vital than the other, each are equally vital. However, I do believe that museums can lack accessibility. Museums tend to carry a certain stigma (and often a large admission fee) that can make them inaccessible or even uncomfortable for some to visit. This is one reason why I went in to public art! Public art is one of the most accessible art forms out there. I do truly believe that it can spark interest in people who have never really thought about art or have had minimal exposure to art.

DH: You did the mural at the Cambridge Health Alliance building in Somerville. What has the feedback DH: Tell us about upcoming projects.

AH: Right now, I don't have any public solo projects that I am working on. As it goes, projects that I had lined up a month ago have changed course and either been postponed or cancelled. I am in the process of finishing up some work for the City of Chelsea. Since June, I have been working as one of two lead artist/coordinators. Together with the city, we have organized a number of artist calls and hosted virtual artist-mentoring groups. We will be putting up a variety of painted murals and wheat-paste pieces by local artists in mid-September along Division and Cherry Street in Chelsea, MA.

I am always looking for gigs, so feel free to get in touch if you or your community is looking to install a mural or public art piece.
