Limited Phase 3 Step 1 business reopenings taking place this week



The long awaited Phase 3 Step 1 reopening of specified local business, such as fitness clubs and gyms, began on Tuesday of this week.

Last week, Somerville Mayor Joe Curtatone announced that certain Phase 3 Step 1 businesses, including fitness clubs and gyms, may open with restrictions in Somerville on Tuesday, September 8. Somerville is the last city in the state to do so.

According to city guidelines, all businesses seeking to open are required have a city-approved health and safety plan and meet stringent COVID-19 safety requirements. The requirements, which are designed to decrease the risk of virus transmission, include all state requirements as well as measures that exceed State standards such as mandatory face coverings for all staff and patrons at all times. The city continues to encourage and support outdoor alternatives as additional safer options for gyms and fitness centers. Continued on page 4



Our first rides



Remember when driving was our biggest thrill? We couldn't wait to get our drivers licenses.

We would pile out friends into the car and just cruise all

day and night. If you had wheels you were a popular person.

When I got my license at The Armory on Highland Ave. in 1971 gas cost about 40 cents a gallon. I was so happy when the that scary Registry cop gave me my temporary license (pink slip) I ran home and begged my dad to let me use his car. I had flunked two previous road tests so I didn't tell anyone about the third one in case I failed.

Some of my friends took Drivers Ed at the high school and some went to Andersen or Pleasant Auto, where I learned.

Some of my Somerville friends shared their memories of their first cars:

"Mine was a 1970 green Buick Estate Wagon. You probably got into a few accidents with my father driving home after gigs with it." (I was in a band with his dad)

"1963 Chevy Biscayne. 3 speed on the column."

"65 Corvair... should have kept it!" "1968 Buick Skylark convertible."

"I had a 65 Chevy Bel Air. Paid \$50 and had it for 2 1/2 years. Thanks Gramma and Grampa!"



"This is an actual picture of my first car. A '62 beetle I bought in '76 for \$50. This is when I lived in Maine."

"1966 Ford Fairlane, bought it for \$100. Five payments \$20."

"1983 Silver Dodge Daytona, with sun roof. Thought I was a big shot, got my first speeding ticket on Lake St., Arlington, with the radio blaring."

"64 valiant slant six, pushbutton trani." (the 225 slant six was one of the easiest motors to work on)

Although I was thrilled to get my dad's '67 Dodge Dart free, the best car deal I ever got was my 1973 Cadillac Fleetwood Brougham complete with foot rests in the back seat. After admiring this car, which was parked up my street for three years, the owner sold it to me for a whopping \$30. Bully with a knife taken off the streets

Somerville Police officers were dispatched to the Star Market on McGrath Hwy. shortly after midnight on September 1 on reports of a man with a knife threatening the reporting party's husband.

Upon arrival, the officers made contact with the victims. The male victim was frantically saying that a man had just threatened to stab him and took off on a bike heading through the parking lot by the ice skating rink.

The victim was able to provide the officers with a picture of the suspect that he had taken on his phone. The officers sent out the picture to all east end units responding and provided an updated detailed description of the suspect.

The victim's wife told police that while she was waiting in front of Star Market for her husband, a man, later identified as Paul Phaneuf, of Woburn, approached her and began harassing her about a bag of medication that he had left there.

When the woman stated that she did not know what he was talking about, Phaneuf reportedly started tossing around shopping carts, then walked away.

When the victim showed up, his wife told him what had just happened. The victim then said that as he was putting groceries into his van, Phaneuf approached the van and the victim asked him why he felt the need to harass females.

At this time, Phaneuf reportedly took a knife out of his backpack, brandished it at the victim and stated, "I'll stick you."

Phaneuf then reportedly went around to the other side of the van, opened the driver's side door and while the woman was seated in the front passenger seat brandished the knife at her and stated, "I'll stick you."

The victim grabbed a tool from inside his van and ran around the van chasing Phaneuf away from the vehicle.

The victim said Phaneuf put the knife back in his backpack, grabbed a bike from the parking lot, and took off through the parking lot by the ice skating rink.

The two were eager to leave and go home, and they were

advised before leaving the scene that Phaneuf had been found and detained by police. Using the photo taken by the victim, the arresting officer was able to confirm that the man they had detained was the suspect that brandished the knife.

Police recovered a knife from Phaneuf's backpack. The knife was logged into evidence and a picture of it is attached to the report.

Phaneuf was placed under arrest and booked on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon.

Businesses eligible to open in Somerville on September 8 include:

fitness facilities and health clubs including gyms, yoga studios, and other fitness centers;

motion picture and television streaming productions; martial arts and dance facilities; non-athletic instructional classes (such as arts, music, language, etc., classes).

City staff will continue to work with specialty indoor recreational facilities with more unique safety challenges such as ax throwing or indoor rock climbing to consider potential openings on individual timelines. But at this time they will remain closed. Movie theaters and museums, including the LEGOLAND Discovery Center, will also remain closed until further notice.

Somerville safety requirements and enforcement that exceed State guidelines include:

Face coverings must be worn at all times by patrons, staff, and any other individuals present. There are no exceptions beyond standard medical and disability exemptions or age exceptions for infants under age of two. State exceptions, for example, for persons at a greater distance or engaged in vigorous exercise, will not be permitted.

To ensure state or local capacity limits are not exceeded, businesses must require patrons to register in advance for specific classes or time slots, including for open gym time.

All businesses must submit a health and safety plan to the City, which must meet all requirements for their business category. Plans must be approved by Inspectional Services, and must be available at all times to patrons and the public. Plan templates and requirements are available at somervillema.gov/ phase3reopening.

Due to the risk of aerosol transmission of the virus, all businesses must adhere to new COVID-19 safety recommendations for air quality management issued by ASHRAE, the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers.

Capacity must be limited to ten or fewer people including staff at any given time for martial arts and dance facilities, non-athletic instructional classes, and motion picture and television streaming productions.

Inspectional Services will carry out spot checks and respond to complaints. City staff will support businesses in maintaining compliance, but in cases of willful disregard endangering public safety, individual closures may be ordered.

Somerville also continues to



hold the limit on attendance at gatherings to stricter levels than the State with no more than 10 persons allowed until further notice. This applies to both indoor and outdoor gatherings of any kind unless otherwise specifically permitted in City activity-specific guidelines.

Phase 3 Health and Human Services categories opened in Somerville according to statewide plans on July 6. Phase 3 grocery store capacity limit increases also went into effect in tandem with the State on July 17. Regulations currently in place for Somerville youth and adult league sports remain the same. Review: Ball Square's vegan taco restaurant expands and starts serving alcohol

Taco Party, Ball Square's vegan taco restaurant located at 711 Broadway, has expanded to the space next door and is now serving alcohol and beer. Whether by luck or design, or both, owner Keith Schubert is well-positioned to benefit from a rare shift in the restaurant industry. Large swathes of eat-in restaurants are closing due to COVID-19 measures but many Mexican and vegan restaurants, well-versed in takeout culture, are surviving.

"I like thinking about possibil-

ities and this space opened up and I was like, well, it would be nice to maybe get some alcohol sales in the mix, and have some more seating and so we just went for it," says Schubert. "I think people are feeling like they want to eat healthier and many are experimenting with vegan and vegetarian a couple of days a week. I think that's helping."

Walk into Taco Party's newly expanded takeout space and bar and you can't help but notice the light-hearted décor. Freshly decorated, it's a dash of retro, shot of Mexican, and dab of casual diner-style. But, it's the simple, delicious vegan taco creations

that keep people coming back.

Holland Sweeney and her four-year-old son, Oscar, are regulars. "I would, hands down, eat any taco they have," says Sweeney. "My favorite used to be the crispy tofu taco, but these days I like the chorizo seitan taco for that little extra kick and the salsa they put on it is great."

Designing a vegan taco menu takes creativity. For example, Taco Party's flavorful Jackfruit Tinga Taco (Shredded Jackfruit cooked in spicy tomato sauce, cabbage slaw, avocado, chipotle mayo) is a favorite. Jackfruit, with the texture of pulled pork, is commonly used in vegan recipes as a meat substitute. The Chorizo Seitan Taco (Spicy Ground Seitan, Green Cabbage, Chipotle Salsa) is a popular,

spicy option. Seitan is also used as a meat substitute. Imaginative sauces, salsas, and slaws make every dish something special.

"If people are curious about it, I tell them about it," says Schubert. "My idea was to offer good food that happens to be vegan and then hopefully people will come and enjoy it. I prefer to let the food do the talking."

The menu is simple and uncomplicated with six tacos, torta sandwiches, salads and nachos

as well as tequila-based cocktails, local beers and a few side dishes. The price is right too. Pair a PBR or White Claw (\$5!) with two tacos (\$4.02 each) for under \$15. Or pair a Party Margarita (\$9) and a torta sandwich (\$7.94) for under \$20. Currently, there is no indoor seating, but you can get drinks and food to go and there's outdoor seating on the sidewalk.

"They're such a joy," says Holland Sweeney of Taco Party's atmosphere. "It's a warm, community feel and it's not just the food. Since they opened, we've been there at least once a week. In fact, Oscar and I will be going there today for lunch."

Dorothy's Corner

Ricotta & Marmalade divided Bruschetta

I had some leftover ricotta from another recipe I made this week. I also had some brioche that needed to be used up. Immediately I knew what I would make. I remember this snack from my childhood. My Sicilian uncle made this often and it soon became one of my favorite snacks growing up. Don't skip the black pepper, it really melds the flavors together. Give it a try, you won't be sorry.

2 pieces of brioche 3/4 cup of ricotta, (whole milk) 1/4 teaspoon lemon zest

2 tablespoons orange marmalade,

Freshly ground black pepper

Toast the brioche. In a small bowl, mix the ricotta and lemon zest. Split the ricotta mixture between the two slices and spread on the toast. Add the marmalade to each slice of toast. Add about 2-4 turns of freshly ground black pepper to each slice. Serve it with a double espresso and enjoy! You can use whatever bread you want. Ciabatta is a great vessel for the creamy goodness too. You can make smaller bruschetta for snacks or even an addition to your brunch menu. Serves 1-2.

Fluff Festival will be virtual for the first time ever

While no events will be held in Union Square on Saturday, all the video content found on the Fluff Fest website was filmed in Union Square businesses, such as Play Union and Parkour Generations. Restaurants and shops worked with Union Square Main Streets to stay involved in the annual event that usually brings about 20,000 people to the Somerville square, using employees and business owners as models in the game demos.

"What we wanted to do as much as possible with Fluff Fest this year is spotlight businesses," USMS director Jessica Eshleman said. "So a lot of this programming is going to be streaming from Union Square businesses."

During the livestream, local bands will be performing, with a dynamic lineup of vocal performers that span musical genres. "To tell the story of small businesses in Union Square, what we did was we've recorded these performances in Union Square venues," Eshleman said. Performances were

recorded at Sally O'Brien's, the Jungle Community Music Club, and New Alliance East to spotlight Somerville venues that have been closed since the pandemic began.

Fluff was invented in 1917 in Somerville by a man named Archibald Query, and since 2005 the Fluff Festival has honored him with an Archibald Query impersonator who hosts the "Shenanigans Stage" where messy games take place. Though the games and festivities are virtual this year, the beloved impersonator will be featured in the videos to explain games and challenges to participants.

To conclude the event, Aeronaut brewing is hosting virtual Fluff trivia at 8pm. Aeronaut founders Ronn Friedlander and Dan Rassi developed a trivia app specifically for Fluff Fest to allow anyone to play along and answer questions about Union Square businesses and Fluff.

"The irony of this – or the beautiful thing, I would say – is the name of this festival this year is the 'What the Fluff Festival: a tribute to innovation in Union Square.' And so for Aeronaut to be able to respond so quickly in a COVID climate, to create this trivia platform, is this beautiful illustration of the type of innovation that this festival celebrates," Eshleman said. "You look at Greentown Labs, Artisan's Asylum - we have these communities of incredible makers and innovators who are innovating every single day, and this trivia platform is just such a complete illustration of it. It's really fitting for us to be incorporating that into this year's festivities."

Businesses that offer Fluff themed menu items can be found on the website as well, and Somerville residents are encouraged to order take-out or delivery from the restaurants and shops involved in the Fluff Festival. Many local stores are already selling Fluff items, such as Union Square doughnuts with their Fluffernutter donut. An online marketplace of vendors will also be featured on

the website, where retailers will be selling Fluff items like pins and t-shirts. Supporting these businesses is always a priority for Fluff Fest organizers, but this year they really worked to involve the community in the virtual festival.

The morning of the event Fluff organizers will be posting actively on their Instagram and Facebook, where the community can ask questions.

Organizers want to emphasize to viewers that activities are to be done at home, and people should not gather for events. Order some take-out from Union Square, buy a couple tubs of Fluff, and enjoy the festivities and celebration of innovation from home.

New Shared Streets route coming to Davis Square area

Somerville's Shared Streets initiative will add a new route, weather permitting, starting Thursday, September 3. Shared Streets open up low-volume or residential side-streets to pedestrians, cyclists, and other users while still allowing vehicle access for residents who live on the street or who need to use the street to get to their homes, their guests, and service vehicles such as first responders, delivery drivers, sanitation trucks, and street sweepers.

The new route will include Morrison Ave., Winslow Ave., and Clifton St. between Morrison and Winslow. This new Shared Streets route joins a network of routes opened over the summer throughout the city that help residents safely get outside and reach essential services.

You can find a map of Shared Streets routes at https://somervoice.somervillema.gov/covid19mobility. Feedback on routes can also be submitted on Somer Voice.

Safety measures along Shared Streets routes include signage and flexible barriers to alert all users to the shared use of these streets. Somerville's program will use temporary materials that can be modified based on our experience and feedback from residents with the pilot. Seven new "pinch points" will be installed along Morrison Ave. that will narrow traffic down to one lane to help slow vehicles and make the road safer for all users.



Signs will alert motorists when a pinch point is coming up so they can yield tor other vehicles if needed. Motorists allowed to use a shared street, such as abutters, should drive slowly and expect to see people in the street on these routes. People walking, rolling, and biking should remain alert and aware and make room for these allowed vehicles.

Please note that cyclists, using caution, can ride in either direction on a Shared Streets route.

Protect yourself from mosquito bites as summer winds down

As the Labor Day weekend and cooler temperatures approach, residents should continue to take precautions to protect themselves against mosquito bites and mosquito-borne illnesses. Somerville and surrounding communities are still at moderate risk of West Nile Virus (WNV), and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) cases have been confirmed in Massachusetts.

WNV and EEE are usually transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. While WNV and EEE can infect people of all ages, people over the age of 50 are at higher risk for severe WNV, and people under the age of 15 are particularly vulnerable to EEE. WNV symptoms and EEE symptoms tend to include fever and flu-like illness.

Residents can take steps to protect themselves and their loved ones from illnesses caused by mosquitoes.

Avoid Mosquito Bites

Apply Insect Repellent when Outdoors. Use a repellent with DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide), permethrin, picaridin (KBR 3023), oil of lemon eucalyptus [p-methane 3, 8-diol (PMD)], or IR3535 according to the instructions on the product label. DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age and should be used in concentrations of 30% or less on older children. Oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under three

Be Aware of Peak Mosquito Hours. The hours from dusk to dawn are peak biting times for many mosquitoes. Consider rescheduling outdoor activities that occur during the evening or early morning.

Clothing Can Help Reduce Mosquito Bites. Wear long-sleeves, long pants, and socks when outdoors to help keep mosquitoes away from your skin.

Mosquito-Proof Your Home

Drain Standing Water. Mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water. Limit the number of places around your home for mosquitoes to breed by either draining or discarding items that hold water. Check rain gutters and drains. Empty any unused flowerpots and wading pools, and change the water in birdbaths frequently.

Install or Repair Screens. Keep mosquitoes outside by having tightly-fitting screens on all of your windows and doors.

Protect Your Animals

Animal owners should reduce potential mosquito breeding sites on their property by eliminating standing water from containers such as water bowls, buckets, tires, and wading pools – especially after heavy rains. Owners should also speak with their veterinarian about mosquito repellents approved for use in animals and vaccinations to prevent WNV and EEE. If an animal is diagnosed with WNV or EEE, owners are required to report to the Massachusetts Division of Animal Health by calling 617-626-1795 and to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) by calling 617-983-6800.



'Toxic Cookout'

by Rob Dinsmoor

Toxic Cookout By Rob Dinsmoor Big Table Publishing San Francisco, CA

I have rarely been a fan of big novels because I usually found the books too long and I could not even finish one on a transcontinental flight. Short stories, on the other hand, have allowed me to read and absorb a few stories on the same flight. The stories from old masters such as Malamud, Fitzgerald, Nabokov, and Porter can be quite lengthy. Short story authors tend toward a shorter story running from three or four pages to seventeen to twenty pages.

One writer of this shorter form who spins wonderful tales that encompass a broad range of issues is Rob Dinsmoor, a writer readers will enjoy and enthusiastically recommend to others. Dinsmoor's Toxic Cookout falls into the shorter category and makes reading his stories enjoyable. While science fiction is Dinsmoor's forte, the breadth of his writing is both visual and easy to comprehend. The back cover says, "[Rob Dinsmoor] has written dozens of scripts for Nickelodeon and MTV. He has published stories in many literary magazines, two of which were nominated for Pushcart Prizes."

In Toxic Cookout, Dinsmoor, in addition to specializing in science fiction, displays knowledge of astronomy, the environment, yoga, chemistry, psychology, GPS systems, life in New York city, pyramid schemes, animals and so many more aspects of everyday life we may never think about.


What makes Dinsmoor so interesting is the often subtle, sometimes it is the dark humor which pervades his work. For example, in the opening story Selfies, two young girls are in a swimming pool taking selfies. They go to the bathroom for more photos of each other and one of them reveals the truth about herself.

In another story, Kundalini Yoga at the Arkham YMCA, the narrator teaches yoga at the local YMCA and discovers a room unused for years. He takes his class in there and what happens to them is what follows.

A story for lovers of science fiction and horror is Howard at Ravenswood, about a rather odd young boy who grows up in his self-made world to become a writer many readers will recognize. Is the story true or another creation from Dinsmoor's fertile imagination?

In The World In Gunnar's Barn, a tinkerer becomes the creator. A whole world inside a bell jar with an ending that leaves the creator's friend with more than worries.

Times Are Different In Port St. Joe is a time trav-



el story of a different kind of trip that Dinsmoor creates, a mystery at the beginning with an ending that reminds you to always answer your cellphone.

And there is the truck stop in the middle of the desert where a purple streak lands and a mysterious encounter ensures the finale readers do not expect.

The title story is a tale that can take place in anyone's back yard as the following excerpt will show:

"Hope dumped a big pile of generic-brand charcoal briquettes, which look like they'd been reconstituted out of old tires, into the large charcoal grill. Then she squirted the coals with charcoal starter, maintaining such a long stream that it reminded me of a big, drunken sailor taking a leak. Then shup the can down next to the grill, open. It tipped over, draining charcoal started into the grass. She produced a long-barreled grill igniter, pulled the trigger, and set the pile of reconstituted tires ablaze with a "whoosh!" and a wave of heat that I felt on my eyelashes. The flames shot up about six feet, calling to mind of bonfire, and sent up a plume of black smoke reminiscent of oil fields burning in Kuwait, which may have caused countless health problems."

The story contains many references to the environment without being didactic. In fact, Dinsmoor is such a writer. However, for those who prefer the realism of life and love, Dinsmoor has included two stories, Falling in Love While Clinically Depressed and On the Brink of Total Immersion.

Reading Rob Dinsmoor's Toxic Cookout, I became determined to read more of his work and I wait impatiently for the next volume of stories. In the meantime, I enjoyed this book so much that I will probably reread it very soon.


